BIRTHRIGHT VISITS IFAHC

Director Cyndi Garnier of Birthright Idaho Falls recently presented information about the organization's mission and impact. "Birthright began in Canada in 1968 when Louise Summerhill, mother of seven, felt something should be done to help women facing unplanned pregnancies. By offering love, hope, support, and resources (www.birthright.org/learn/),"

Birthright has grown to become an international non-profit pregnancy support service fostering respect for human life through non -judgmental, confidential service regardless of client circumstances. In Idaho Birthright has offices in Coeur d'Alene, Meridian, and Idaho Falls. The local office is a 100 percent volunteer, interdenominational service providing emotional support, practical help such as pregnancy tests and education and community referrals for pre-

natal care, financial assistance, legal advice, counselling, adoption services, and much more.

Birthright orders IFAHC newborn kits and hygiene kits. Pre-COVID the agency served about 100 clients annually and continued to serve clients remotely during COVID. The agency offers follow up care after delivery with referrals and

assistance such as diapers and children's new or gently used clothing up to size 4T. "We help anyone in need [who has] a child," Garnier said. There is no typical client, since ages range from teens to those 50 and older.

Clients can call or walk in the office located in the Heritage Plaza building on 17th Street. New clients receive a free pregnancy test and needs assessment followed by referrals to community resources for both mom and baby. Garnier explained that Idaho law does not require a parent to sign for adoption at the beginning of the pregnancy, unlike other state. A signature is not required until after the child is born, so referrals to adoption agencies are offered.

Louise Summerhill said, "It is the right of every woman to give birth...and the right of every child to be born." Garnier feels Birthright is accomplishing its mission if they are helping children and mothers. "If we have saved just one child, we have done God's work. Working in the Idaho Falls office since 2010, Garnier knows of five children whose mothers would have chosen abortion without the services of Birthright.



POLICY #1009: TIME AND MATERIALS

From time to time it is good to be reminded of our policy regarding time and materials at IFAHC. Our Board approved policy #1009 states: All volunteers who sign in for volunteer hours will work exclusively on manufacturing IFAHC production items to be entered in to IFAHC inventory. Volunteer time and materials from the Idaho Falls Area Humanitarian Center (IFAHC) may not be used for personal profit or gain. All materials taken from the Idaho Falls Area Humanitarian Center must go through the established check in and check out process. No equipment or materials from IFAHC may be used for personal projects. Items that are not used at IFAHC may be found in the designated bin (Give Away Tote) at the front of the Conference Room. These items are available for volunteers to take home for their personal use. Personal projects may not be sold at IFAHC.
