### The Journey of a Toy Car

A few months ago, Jim Meyers, who paints wheels and jump rope handles here at IFAHC, offered a thought in our morning prayer meeting about the number of people involved in the production of a simple wooden toy. With his permission I offer my version of the process that he described. For our purposes let's say that the wooden toy is a car. While these steps follow that toy car through the most "stops" possible, it is meant to illustrate the number and variety of individuals that give of themselves to deliver a wooden toy car to a deserving

child. Wood Cutters – Our wood cutters are the one group in our work force that do their job almost entirely off site. Our wood cutters are a dedicated assortment of workers who, in their basement, garage or workshop, cut a wide variety of shapes and sizes of toys for our center. They do this almost entirely using wood that they procure on their own. This is where our toy car begins its life.

Sanders – Using sheets of sandpaper, a small bench top belt/disc sander, and most often, a Dremel-type tool with a sanding drum, our

sanding crew spends their days transforming rough cut wood into paint-ready car bodies (as well as animals, puzzles, airplanes, etc.). Base painters – While not everyone is an aspiring artist, we have an ongoing need for base painters. This is the most common activity among our drop-in volunteers and off-site group projects. This step is essential to provide a clean and colorful canvas in preparation for details to be added in our toy car's next stop on our assembly line.

Detail painters – For those aspiring Rembrandts, we are always in need of detail painters. These painters add the lights and windows to our toy car.

Clear Coat Painters – Yes, a third step in the painting process. Providing both protection and a professional looking gloss finish to our little car, we have a few volunteers that take care of the bulk of this step in our car's journey through our assembly line. Wheel painters – While we use pre-manufactured wheels (that we purchase by the thousands), these wheels come to us as nature intended, as raw wood. Our dedicated team of wheel painters paint the thousands of wheels that we use on a yearly basis. While most are painted black, we do use wheels in every color in the rainbow. Our toy car will be receiving a shiny set of black wheels. Wheel Clear Coat Painters – Yes, our little wheels deserve the same protective, shiny finish coat so that they will look great on their new car.

Wheel installers – One more step that is handled by a just a few of our volunteers, installing wheels takes skill to ensure that our car is ready to roll for many years to come.

Inspector and Labeler – Not every toy car that makes it this far will pass muster. Each car is inspected to ensure that it is completely painted and top coated as well that the wheels are working properly. Next a label is affixed to each car to remind parents that their child's new car includes small parts. Finally, each car is placed in a plastic bag and set to our inventory area/warehouse. Warehouser – We have a pretty remarkable inventory area/warehouse at the Idaho Falls Area Humanitarian Center. There, nestled among quilts, jump ropes, folder games and other wooden toys, our toy car awaits the call from an agency that seeks to take

Order filler - The Order Fillers in our Community Room take the requests from our partner agencies and fill their requests, pulling items from our warehouse, in this case, our toy car, to box it up

care of a child's desire for a new toy.

and send it on its way.

Delivery Driver – We even have individuals that spend their time, in their own vehicles, making sure that our toy car makes its way to the requesting agency.

Agency Partners – Over 100 agencies with direct access to those in need in our area are at the front lines in our effort to make sure that our toy car makes its way into the hands of a deserving child. It truly takes a village to do what we do. You, our volunteers, are that village. We look forward to the smiling faces that come to our center and help in the work of building toy cars, quilts, jump ropes, folder games and the myriad of items that we produce. But we would not be able to do what we do without the ongoing assistance of the innumerable community members that provide about two thirds of the hours that are donated through the center. Thank you for being part of our village.
