Greetings, ya'll. I've been asked to tell you all a little bit about myself – OK.

I was born in Salmon, Idaho. Lemhi county on 3-3-43. My mama, daddy and 3 year old brother welcomed me and helped me enjoy my new life on earth. My Dad, Mom, big 3 year-old brother and mom's mother, Sylvia Rose, lived 55 miles away in the beautiful Pahsimeroi Valley. Grandad ran the ranch there. They had to have a little house in Salmon so they could have a place to send 6 younger kids to grade school and high school. My oldest brother and I welcomed 2 more brothers.

There was a 2 room grade school in May, then after that we rode on the bus into Custer County and Challis High School.

There was about 30–35 kids in each of the 4 classes. I went to Ricks College, even though I wasn't a member of the LDS Church, but you could still come by walking on dirt and pavement roads, taking shortcuts, which came out in Thornton (near Rigby).

I was baptized May 17, 1962.

At Ricks College I had wonderful roommates, teachers and friends, who helped me understand the L.D.S. teachings and all.

We had our 2<sup>nd</sup> son and had to take him to Albany, N.Y. (100 miles away) for his baby blessing. "Home" became Moreland, Idaho where we raised our 3 sons. All three served a mission: one in Paraguay (*is there such a place?*), next on in Argentina, and next to Brisbane, Brazil.

The boys' father – my husband – had a very bad liver. We traveled to the Mayo Clinic 2 times, but he passed a month before our youngest son would be home from Brazil.

Now I've enjoyed – *loved* – been helped by 6 granddaughters and more grands and greats to come. The Humanitarian Center and all of the fine folks and Don and Mozelle and many more wonderful examples help us enjoy and turn out wonderful, helpful and needed products.

I had been to the Humanitarian Center many times to serve and donate items. (In 1999 I made 44 quilts in 18 months and my dear husband finally stopped asking me how much longer the quilting frames were going to be up in the family room. In 2003, I made 25 guilts at home for the Humanitarian Center. We had made many guilts and receiving blankets for the Center in Relief Society, and I loved the Center.) I had just purchased some packages of onesies a few days earlier and handed them in the day before because I heard they were in need. We completed my mission papers, and they sent me to the Humanitarian Center to talk to Mozelle. I immediately loved Mozelle and still do. She gave me a copy of the current newsletter as I left. When I arrived home, I sat down and read it. On the front page there was a small article "Speaking of Onesies" and after reading it, I shed tears because I was the one who donated those onesies. And I felt like this was a confirmation I needed to know that I was doing the right thing at this time."

"I like to remember that each of today's donations will have an impact on the one who receives them. Sometimes we can't do a lot on a bigger scale, but on a smaller scale, we can make a difference in our own corner of the world, here at the Humanitarian Center. Helping someone in need at any scale is a way to become more like the Savior. It gives us the opportunity to lift people that are suffering. That's what Christ did. And it's a meaningful opportunity for that reason. So, my friends, Let's just go to work and keep on loving, caring, and serving in this HAPPY PLACE, the Idaho Falls Area Humanitarian Center!"



On 6/27/23 IFAHC welcomed guest speakers Erica Farnes and Penny Espindola, representing SEICAA: Southeast Idaho Community Action Agency, which serves Pocatello and the seven surrounding counties. SEICAA's mission is to give people a hand up, not a handout. Programs and agencies benefitted by SEICAA include self-help housing programs, which assist first-time home buyers in building a new 3-bedroom home. They also support Meals-On-Wheels, and The Community Service Area, and several agencies which are organized into "closets": The Working Closet (clothing for the work force), The Birthday Closet (brand new clothing for birthday boys and girls), and The Hygiene Closet (personal hygiene items, serving over 1000 participants in 2022). They also help students with school supplies, help in paying fees, and financial aid for students working toward their GED. Other Aide provided via SEICAA includes financial assistance with utilities, assistance with rent, aid to those elderly and disabled who live in apartment buildings, assistance to veterans, and extra help at Christmas time. (Families must qualify within specific family-size and income parameters.)
