We had the pleasure of having Sylvia Belford from Answers, LLC speak to us in January. Answers is a mental wellness clinic serving Eastern Idaho. They have 8 therapists. Answers serves over 700 clients through therapy and community based

services. Their cliental includes children as young as 3 years old and those much older. Answers offers several different types of counseling, and they excel at play therapy. "Sometimes counseling is designed to help specific mental illnesses while others help individuals overcome traumatic events like childhood abuse or guide them through marital issues."

The Idaho Falls Humanitarian donates weighted blankets to Answers. Sylvia explains, "Weighted blankets help calm clients and provide a way for them to be more receptive to therapy. They also use puppets furnished by the Center to help children relate to life and aid in communication.

Answers is a huge asset to our community. Thanks for coming to speak to us Sylvia!
