This year the Cox Arboretum Foundation provided funding for the major renovation of the Allée and Arbor, preliminary planning for the Barbara Cox Center for Sustainable Horticulture, the addition of magnolias and lilacs, thousands of bulbs planted on the grounds and potted for the Zorniger Education Center spring display, funding in partnership with the DP&L Foundation for the Butterfly House programming and funding in partnership with The Virginia W. Kettering Foundation for the PLANT school tour program. This Spring we sent out a survey to current, lapsed and dropped members of the Cox Arboretum Foundation. A total of 74 people completed the survey, which is a response rate of 10%. The James M. Cox, Jr. Arboretum Foundation

The foundation was established in 1963 with the purpose of providing financial support for Cox Arboretum MetroPark in a unique public-private partnership with Five Rivers MetroParks. The Foundation's priorities are:

- To protect the historic essence of Cox Arboretum through careful master planning
- To restore native ecosystems
- To use resources responsibly

Together, the Cox Arboretum Foundation and Five Rivers MetroParks will use these priorities to guide their work and frame their long-term goals.

Pollinator Party

To celebrate the grand opening of the Butterfly House for the 2014 season, Cox Arboretum Foundation members were invited to a members-only Pollinator Party on June 30.

More than 90 guests attended the exclusive event and learned about the monarch migration from Mexico all the way to the United States. Foundation members had the opportunity to put together seed packets to create their own butterfly habitat to help save the Monarch Migration.

Allée

The highly anticipated arbor at Cox Arboretum MetroPark is here!

The Crabapple Allée was a prominent feature in Cox Arboretum MetroPark until the crabapple trees reached the end of their productive years. The remaining trees were removed last year to create the ideal environment for the new Allée.

This spring, double rows of Kousa Dogwood (Cornus kousa) trees replaced rows of decaying crabapple trees. As the trees mature, they will develop a graceful vase structure of branches arching over the lawn panel. The flowers, actually bracts, will resemble those of our native Dogwood but will bloom later and have a longer effect. The flowers will be followed by a reddish fruit relished by birds in the fall and winter. As the trees mature, they will develop a beautiful mottled bark completing the four seasons of interest.

The new arbor was installed at the north end of the Allée and is complete with benches, electrical access and surrounded by more Dogwood trees.

The Allée has transformed into a new, gorgeous backdrop for the perfect outdoor wedding or event. The Arbor and Allée trees were funded by the Cox Arboretum Foundation. Thank you to foundation members and donors who provide funds to support the Master Plan at Cox Arboretum MetroPark

Foundation Funded Projects

Did you know your membership in the Cox Arboretum Foundation supports programs that encourage adults and children to connect with nature? The Cox Arboretum Foundation partially funds the following programs:

PUTTING LEARNING AND NATURE TOGETHER (PLANT) TOURS

PLANT Tours expose children to the wonders of nature through mentored experiences delivered by trained teachers and volunteers. This program is funded by The Virginia W. Kettering Foundation and the Cox Arboretum Foundation. Successes from the 2013-2014 School Year:

- More than 4,500 students explored the grounds of the Arboretum
- 68 schools went on a tour, with an average class size of 80 students
- Students spent a total of 13,599 hours in nature at the Arboretum
- More than 150 volunteers served as trained guides for educators and students

MIAMI VALLEY LEAVE NO CHILD INSIDE SUMMIT

A Partnership between Five Rivers MetroParks and other local agencies develop an annual "Leave No Child Inside Summit" and "Safe Routes to Play Workshop and Youth Access to Nature Bus Tour." In 2014 the Cox Arboretum Foundation funded the summit's lunch and speaker. Highlights from this year's summit:

- The event activated community leaders, educators and child activists to get children outside and grow the movement
- A tour highlighted local examples of nature connections at play facilities, school and community gardens throughout the region
- A total of 168 enthusiastic people participated in the summit, including 48 teachers and 5 school administrators

BUTTERFLY HOUSE

For more than 16 years, the Butterfly House has educated adults and children on the lifecycles of butterflies and moths. This year's theme was "Save the Monarch Migration," which created awareness of the shrinking monarch migration and inspired the public to protect monarch's threatened habitats by starting their own monarch gardens. The Butterfly House is funded by a generous grant from the Dayton Power and Light Foundation and the Cox Arboretum Foundation. Highlights of the 2014 **Butterfly Season:**

- The season ran July through September with hours from 8 am 8 pm
- Distributed 500 seed packets filled with milkweed, asters and goldenrods for the community to create their own butterfly habitats
- Developed new volunteer trainings so more visitors could have more access to guided tours
- Held classes teaching how to raise and garden for caterpillars, milkweed and monarch lifecycles reaching 152 families



VISITOR HOSPITALITY CENTER

The Cox Arboretum Foundation board voted to transition the Garden Store into a visitor hospitality center in June to provide nature-based educational opportunities and meet the needs of Arboretum visitors.

Located in the Zorniger Education Center, the new Visitor Hospitality Center currently features tables, seating, and refreshment vending. In 2015 the space will also be used as an education hub and include informational material about Cox Arboretum MetroPark and a children's activity guide to inspire learning.

<u>FIFTH THIRD ROOM KITCHEN APPLIANCES</u>

One of the ways to support the Cox Arboretum Foundation is to rent the facilities available at Cox Arboretum MetroPark. Many rentals take place in the Zorniger Education Center where caterers utilize the kitchen in the Fifth Third Room. Due to frequent use, the microwave and refrigerator were in desperate need of replacement.

During 2014, the Cox Arboretum Foundation funded new kitchen appliances including: a stainless steel refrigerator with French doors and a bottom freezer and a new microwave. Staff, volunteers and caterers use the new kitchen appliances in support of programming and events located at Cox Arboretum MetroPark.







TREE-MENDOUS DAY

The Cox Arboretum Foundation partially funded the sixth annual Tree-mendous Day in partnership with Cox Arboretum MetroPark, Ohio State University Extension and Harold Schnell Elementary at Cox Arboretum MetroPark.

Students who participated in the program learned about the important role that trees play in our environment through hands-on group activities. At the end of the day, students adopted a tree on the Arboretum grounds and will monitor its progress throughout the school year.

TRAM TOURS

Whether it is the delicate pinks and whites of Dogwood blossoms in the spring or the red, orange, and yellow leaves of the Sweet Gums in the fall. Cox Arboretum MetroPark is a treat for the senses year-round. Experience the Arboretum in a new light on a guided tour lead by knowledgeable docents.

Learn about Cox Arboretum MetroPark's history, the pivotal role it plays in reforestation along with other conservation initiatives of Five Rivers MetroParks. The tour covers the formal grounds of the park, taking in highlights and seasonal blooms.

Group tours are available by request April - October and are perfect for garden clubs, seniors, or organized groups. Reservations must be scheduled at least three weeks in advance, call Bernadette Whitworth at (937) 276-7056. Tours are currently free of charge, however donations to the Cox Arboretum Foundation are appreciated.

CAFÉ SCI

Do you want to be more science savvy? Cafe Scientifique (Café Sci) is an international phenomenon in which people of any background congregate for scientific discussion in a non-academic, social setting. All attendees are encouraged to participate, share their thoughts, and ask questions. Typically, Café Sci begins with a brief presentation by a speaker to introduce a given topic. Questions are held until after a short break, allowing time to fetch snacks, coffee, tea and wine. The floor is open for questions and group discussion follows.

Café Sci meets on the first Wednesday of each month (with the exception of dates which fall on a holiday) in the Fifth Third Conference Room at Cox Arboretum at 6:30 pm. Discussions conclude between 8:00 and 8:30 pm.

November 5- ADDITIVE MANUFACTURING (3D PRINTING)

Additive manufacturing, or 3D printing, is cutting-edge technology now employed by many industries to make a variety of materials. Learn the science behind it and discuss the ways in which it might be applied in the future.

December 3- MINE RECLAMATION

The ecological impact of mining coal and minerals is significant and long lasting. Coal mine reclamation is a particularly relevant issue in Ohio. We'll discuss how scientists study these sites and current restoration methods.

January 7-POLLINATION ADAPTATIONS

Plants and animals have complex relationships, animal pollination. Learn and discuss some of the fascinating ways in which plants have adapted to attract animals to their flowers and animals have come to depend on certain plants.



MetroParks introduced an age-based series of naturebased programs for kids. The program helps kids discover nature, take part in conservation projects, and eventually conduct gatherings in their community where they get their peers exploring nature. The program is divided into three different age groups: Tikes, Explorers and Voyagers.

Cox Arboretum MetroPark hosted a series of successful Conservation Kids programs throughout 2014:





Frog Watch - June

25 kids explored Cox Arboretum MetroPark and surveyed the frog population

Caring for Caterpillars - June

This group of 38 kids explored the value of pollinators, learned how to create their own pollinator garden at home and how to conduct a "Pollinator Party" for their friends!







Backyard Naturalist Training - July

Kids learned what it takes to be a naturalist and how to get their peers excited about the Earth. Kids received a naturalist guide pack they will use to lead their own nature hike for friends.

Wetland Exploration - August

This group got wet and muddy searching for frogs, turtles, insects and other creatures at Cox Arboretum MetroPark while exploring the marsh.

Volunteers

This year nearly 300 individuals and 20 groups volunteered their time and talents at Cox Arboretum MetroPark. Thanks to our volunteers who make the Arboretum a beautiful and engaging place to learn and explore nature.



Many volunteers are involved in ongoing native plant propagation activities that follow land stewardship practices.



Each year volunteers spend time collecting seeds for propagation projects.



This year volunteers worked in the Edible Landscape Garden and harvested nearly 2,000 pounds of produce which was donated to the Food Bank.
