

## **EDUCATION AT THE ARBORETUM**

What's happening in the Adventure Bud?

Maps and interactive exhibits have been installed in the Adventure Bud. Last year the Foundation made a decision to fund interactive educational displays in the Zorniger Education Center. The first

sheets. Day of the Dead is celebrated in Mexico on November 1 when monarchs reach their final destination and overwintering site.

The second installation was a game board and discovery map. The game board, *Birds and Beets*, lets guests discover more about gardening for wildlife or vegetable production as they go along the game board path. The discover board allows players to plan their day's adventure by adding magnets to a map of the Arboretum. Each magnet has a picture of something to do, find or watch while visiting the Arboretum.

## School Programming Incorporates Citizen Science



Project Budburst

What does a scientist look like? A person wearing a lab coat holding test tubes? Not at Cox Arboretum MetroPark where elementary students are embracing the scientists they are! Since birth, we were prepared to explore our world, make educated guesses, and test our limits. This past year, school programming at Cox Arboretum has

been empowering students to get closer to nature, observe and contribute to the scientific field. Guided by their trained volunteer, students look at nature closely and record their findings on data sheets. From monitoring pollinator populations to mapping out blooming periods for tracking climate change, students discover their voice as their findings get added to large databases, giving researchers a much larger, holistic view of North American ecology. Teachers are encouraged to further their investigation by exploring the schoolyard, or asking students to explore their own backyards.



The school tour program is made possible with funding from The Virginia W. Kettering Foundation and the Cox Arboretum Foundation.

## **Education on the Grounds**







Recent visitors to the Arboretum may have noticed some new interpretive signs. The Everyday is Arbor Day series of signs is part of an effort by the MetroParks' education team to use the gardens and grounds of the Arboretum as an outdoor classroom. Fifteen signs placed throughout the grounds highlight some of the Arboretum's sustainable practices and plants, as well as provide resources to busy visitors who may not have time to take a class, but want to learn more about how to successfully choose, plant and care for trees at home. QR codes included in the signs link visitors to fact sheets from credible resources like Ohio State Extension, the Arbor Day Foundation and the International Society of Arboriculture. The Everyday is Arbor Day signs were funded by the Cox Arboretum Foundation.

### Pollinators & Gardens

If you want to start a prairie, you have to be patient. It usually takes at least three years for a prairie to become established. Most prairie plants grow roots the first year and many won't bloom until their second or third year. This has been especially true for the recent pollinator habitat added near the Cox Tree Tower. This year (year two) proved to be a spectacular show; and the pollinators came in droves!

The idea was to provide habitat, but also to highlight the view from the tree tower. As the forest thins due to emerald ash borer more sunlight hits the understory layer. Often times this new type of environment is quickly colonized by invasives such as honeysuckle, buckthorn and garlic mustard.

Working together, Five Rivers MetroParks' staff and volunteers worked to prepare this area of forest edge. They worked to collect, prepare and propagate seeds of native plants from nearby MetroParks. During the fall of 2013 over 25,000 individual prairie plants and 1,500 trees and shrubs were planted.

To attract pollinators, plants were planted in big patches (100-200 individuals) in order to create large color displays that are easy to see from far away. A wide diversity of nectar and host plants such as cardinal flower, senna, swamp milkweed, and blazing star were planted to provide food for bees, butterflies and humming birds. Flowering and fruiting trees and shrubs such as hazelnut, spicebush and pawpaw were planted to attract larger wildlife.

This site as well as the other native plantings at Cox Arboretum provided much needed seed sources for MetroParks staff to create and expand prairies throughout the Miami Valley.

Greater biodiversity helps all of us, people and pollinators. Be sure to watch this area in the future for a great view of native plants and wildlife.




## 2015 FOUNDATION PROJECT UPDATES

## **Barbara Cox Center for Sustainable Horticulture**

The Barbara Cox Center for Sustainable Horticulture will provide volunteers and visitors experiential education opportunities with an emphasis on conservation and sustainability. The Center will be home to Five Rivers MetroParks' native tree and wildflower propagation programs, where plants with native genotypes are propagated for use in habitat restoration projects throughout MetroParks.

Greenhouse renovations are near completion and include state-of-the-art updates from the floor to the twin wall polycarbonate roof panels. All three houses will be fully automated with sustainability in mind.





## Monet Bridge Replacement

Replacement of the Monet Bridge is proving to be the most challenging project for 2015. Engineers have been enlisted to design a bridge that meets both the aesthetic qualities of Monet's famed bridge and current accessibility standards. Five Rivers MetroParks are currently reviewing design proposals, and anticipate having a construction contract before the end of the year. Offsite construction and placement of the bridge will culminate in spring 2016.



## Loop Path: Phase I



Construction continues on phase one of the loop path. The loop path is designed to orient the first time visitor to the Cox Arboretum experience by leading them on a familiar first loop that links many aspects of the arboretum. The specially colored permeable clay paver path will be a simple reminder that visitors are on the right track and will be returned to their starting point. As of this writing, the path has been completed from the Wildflower area to the Butterfly House where it connects to the tree tower.



## Water Garden Improvements

Those who are familiar with the Arboretum might notice something new to the view shed just beyond the great lawn. No, those are not giant caterpillar sculptures left over from the 2015 Butterfly Season. They are geo-textile sediment containers full of silt and sediment from the water garden. Sediment Solutions of Ohio Inc. removed approximately 100 cubic yards of sediment from the bottom of the water garden.

> Every pond is in decline the moment it is created. Leaves, weeds, algae and other organic matter settle to the bottom of the pond, decay and form silt. This gradually fills in the pond and is the direct cause of many water quality problems. Silt contains toxic gases and harbors nutrients that cause excessive weed and algae problems, which deteriorates the ecosystem of a pond. Cox Arboretum's water garden is no exception.

> To reverse the ravages of time, high-volume suction pumps were used by divers who descend to the bottom of the

pond. The process was simple. The sediment was vacuumed up, just as you would vacuum a carpet. This not only removed the sediment, but also the toxic gases and nutrients, restoring the water garden to its original depth. Next spring, we can look forward to better water quality, less unwanted aquatic vegetation and healthier, happier critters.



Mondays. Don's favorite thing about the Arboretum is the people's reactions to the beauty of the place and the way they enjoy the park. "Everyone comes in with a smile on their face," he explains. He says that along with the people, the beauty and sanctity of nature is what keeps him coming back. "It's the feeling you get while you're here...it just gets in your blood" he adds.
