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OUTSTANDING TEACHER AWARD

We are pleased to announce the Five Rivers MetroParks OUTstanding Teacher Award winners!

The OUTstanding Teacher Award, originally created in 2014, annually recognizes three exceptional educators from the Greater Dayton Area who have gone above and beyond to bring engaging environmental experiences that inspire students to shape attitudes and actions for nature. Nominated by students, parents, teachers, administrators and friends, each award winning teacher receives a one-year membership to the Cox Arboretum Foundation and the Environmental Education Council of Ohio, registration fees for the "101 Alternatives to the Chalkboard" teacher conference in October at Camp Kern, a plant kit, transportation for their class to take a field trip to Cox Arboretum and outdoor education school supplies to help in their quest to get kids outside and weave nature into the curriculum.

(20+ years):

Darla Myers, Walter Shade Elementary - Kindergarten

Darla Myers' values outdoor play for her kindergarten students. She uses nature exploration as a way to tie language, reading, art, math and science together. Darla brings nature inside when she cannot take students outside, whether exploring decomposition through a rotting pumpkin, animals in winter through picture books, a small world play station or exploring fall leaves through a water and leaf color matching challenge!

(10-20 years):

Laura Peterson, Primary Village South (PVS) - Naturalist

No matter the weather, Laura gets the first graders learning out in the woods, meadow and courtyard. As the school naturalist, she weaves literacy, math, science, technology and art into her lessons. Her influence has spread throughout the school with other teachers creating their own outdoor spaces with butterfly, sunflower, sensory, bird and ABC gardens for students to explore.

Kelly George, Cline Elementary - 2nd grade




Improvements to the Stream and Waterfall

The Stream and Waterfall, located parallel to the south end of the Allée, is scheduled for improvements. Over the past several years, the large stones forming the edges of the pool and bridge of the headwaters at the waterfall of the stream area have been shifting. Due to the movement of the stones, water is now bypassing the original outflow resulting in undercutting and erosion to the pathway. To fix the problem, the large stones will be removed, the liner repositioned and the stones reset.



Wildflower Retaining Wall

Construction has begun on a stone retaining wall along both sides of the paver pathway leading to the wildflower gardens. The wall will help retain the soil, which is at a slope on both sides. Once installed, there will be groundcover, perennials and native grasses planted to prevent erosion, add beauty and encourage pollinators.



Improvements to the Meditation Reflection Pond

The reflection/meditation pond, located within the shrub garden, just west of the Edible Landscape Garden will also receive some needed improvements. This summer the stone wall at the edge of the pond will be rebuilt, as will the steps leading to the pond.

BARBARA COX CENTER FOR SUSTAINABLE HORTICULTURE UPDATES

Projects

The purpose of the Barbara Cox Center for Sustainable Horticulture (BCCSH) is to create a dynamic, active and productive space that educates the public on issues of sustainability and actively produces native plants for use in restoring Five Rivers MetroPark lands.

To better achieve the purpose of the BCCSH, the Resource Center previously known as the Volunteer Lounge is now the main entrance into the BCCSH. The area has been reconfigured for a meeting space and break area for the volunteers, while opening it up for the public to enter the BCCSH.

Updates will include: new carpet and vinyl flooring, ADA compliant doors, painting, lighting upgrades and new greenhouse flooring.

To educate visitors with self-guided and guided tours of the BCCSH, the Five Rivers MetroParks education department has developed an interpretation plan for the BCCSH. The interpretation will create an educational experience by highlighting native plant propagation and creating an inviting visitor experience from the entry of the BCCSH, at the Resource Center, throughout the greenhouses.

Completed Interpretation to date:

- Panels inside the Resource Center
- Six signs giving the steps of native plant propagation
- Wrapped propagation cooler
- Movable labels to easily identify native plants in propagation flats
- Forest scene wrap on the secondary entry wall between the Resource Center and the first greenhouse with an inspirational quote from Conservationist, Wangari Maathai: *“You cannot protect the environment unless you empower people, you inform them, and you help them understand that these resources are their own, that they must protect them.”*

Yvonne Duple - Education

Yvonne coordinates volunteers for the Historical & Cultural Resources and Outdoor Education teams. She serves as the Volunteer Services department liaison to the Friends of Carriage Hill Farm Board, including the Country Store & concessions located at Carriage Hill MetroPark. Yvonne also coordinates volunteers who support Horticulture Education, Naturalist and farm staff including activities such as Tour Guides, Butterfly House Hosts, Children's Discovery Garden, Grounded & Growing and Program Assistants.



Candy Holloway - Horticulture and Sustainability

Candy provides support to the horticulture staff throughout MetroParks. This includes: staff and volunteers at Aullwood Gardens, Cox Arboretum, Wegerzyn Gardens, RiverScape, Island, Deeds and Sunrise MetroParks. She continues her work alongside the Sustainability Coordinator by engaging the Master Recycler Volunteers. Candy is also the Volunteer Services department liaison to the Philanthropy department, specifically pertaining to Cox Arboretum Foundation and Wegerzyn Gardens Foundation.



Jenny Hymans - Outdoor Recreation and Special Events

Jenny provides volunteer support for Outdoor Recreation programming and special events. This includes: MetroParks Volunteer Patrol program, volunteers at MetroParks' partner program with OSU's Adventure Central (located at Wesleyan MetroPark), the Bike to Work Day Pancake Breakfast event, Wagner Subaru Outdoor Experience, Make a Difference Day and Adopt-A-Park.



Janelle Leonard - Business Support and Visitor Services

Janelle coordinates volunteers for RiverScape Business Operations, Carriage Hill Riding Center, MetroParks Ambassador Outreach booths and Visitor Services. She also coordinates HQ admin volunteers, including the volunteer courier and community service and court-appointed volunteer inquiries.



Allie Zimmerman - Park Services Maintenance and Conservation

Allie coordinates volunteer support for park maintenance and conservation activities such as Tree Corp, Woodworkers, Conservation Caretakers and Butterfly and Bluebird Monitors. Allie also organizes local service clubs, Eagle Scouts, colleges/universities, faith-based organizations, alumni associations and corporate groups who contact MetroParks for days of service for their organization.
