always understood. This knowledge has been partially obscured, but it is not lost. It lives within the conscious architect — the one who speaks with clarity, humility, and alignment to Source.

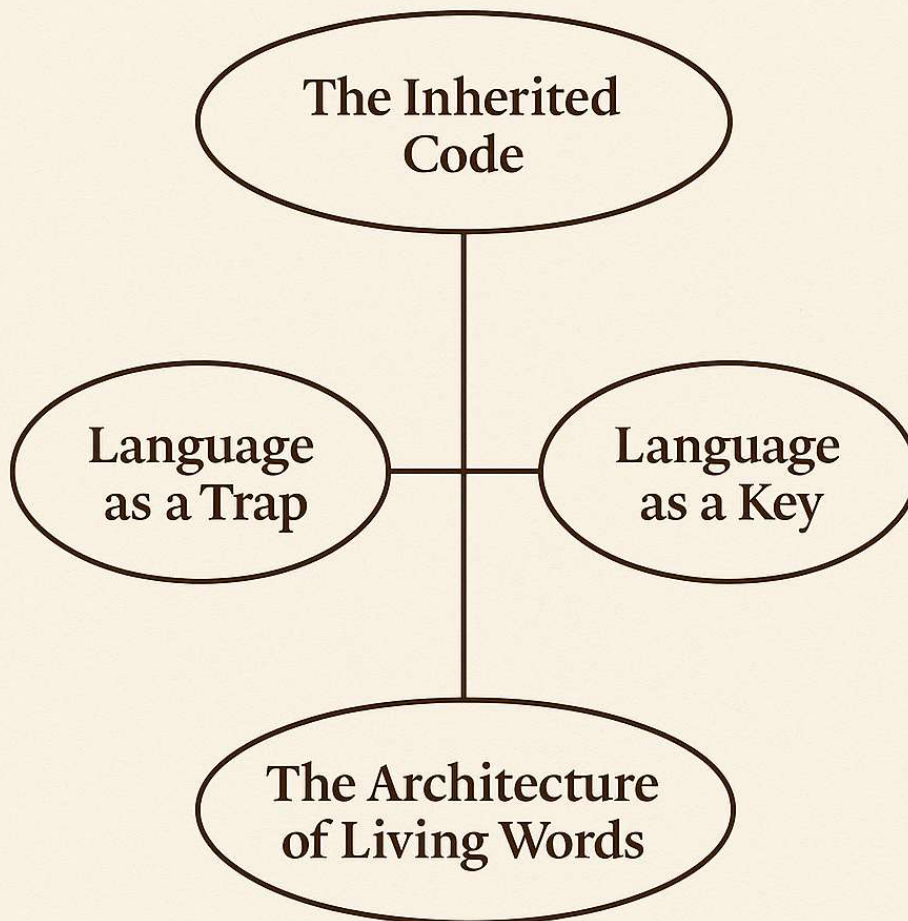
