Writing is an important lifelong skill. Children need to learn to write so they can communicate and express themselves.

The Writing Wall provides meaningful opportunities for children to learn about the written word and to support them to understand that symbols carry meaning. Writing develops alongside all learning areas, especially communication and language, reading and mathematics.

Using the Writing Wall, children develop their:

Understanding of language patterns Thinking skills Ability to solve problems Ability to make sense of their experiences.


Our practitioners listen to children talking and model how to write down the words they say. This helps the children to see how sounds become words on paper.
