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Vocabulary Practice Point #4 Grammatically-Correct and Gender-Inclusive English

Question: In English class, I learned that "everyone", "no one", "everybody" and "nobody" are conjugated in the singular. (As an example: "Everyone should take his seat.") Why do English speakers incorrectly say "Everyone should take their seat"?

Answer plus Discussion:

- (1) "Everyone should take <u>their</u> seat" is incorrect because "everyone" is an indefinite pronoun conjugated in the singular. For example, "Everyone eats dinner at 6 p.m."
- (2) The difficulty arises when the same sentence uses a possessive pronoun (his, her, its, their), thus forcing the speaker to pick a gender. ("Everyone should take his seat" or "Everyone should take her seat.")
- (3) Some English-speakers find "his" male-dominant and offensive, while others believe that "her" is feminist or militant, when referring to groups with both genders.
- (4) We avoid this conflict by making the subject plural, and using the possessive pronoun "their", which is not gender-specific. Here are two examples:

Construction	Critique	Gender-Inclusive Alternative	Rationale
Everyone should eat his dinner.	The possessive pronoun "his" excludes women.	All persons should eat their dinner.	As a possessive pronoun in plural form, "their" covers both men and women.
A person must follow her instincts.	The possessive pronoun "her" excludes men.	People must follow their instincts.	As a possessive pronoun in plural form, "their" covers both men and women.
