# It was a 1951 Dodge(con't) By Bob Anderson

...that familiar smell of rotten gas. The gas tank had been full in 1994 when the car was moved into its storage facility. It permeated throughout my shop causing everything inside to stink. When I opened the hood, I very quickly noticed a huge 12 volt battery mounted in the battery box. I also noticed that it was plumbed into the car, with the positive cable going to the started motor and the negative wire attached to the engine block. That's good. But the battery was old, dry and rotten, so I made a note to buy a fresh battery. The dipstick showed that it was properly filled with clean new-looking oil. That's good. The radiator looked really rough. so I removed it and delivered it to John at Palm Bay Radiator for a clean-up and maybe patch-up. But, I kept wondering about that battery. It was a 12 volt battery and I always thought that those early cars all had 6 volt electrical systems. Hhhhhmmmmm!! I decided that if the engine was frozen, then I would scrap this project, so I picked up my largest wrench and attempted to turn the crankshaft. None of my wrenches, adjustable or

otherwise, would fit on that huge crankshaft nut. Roger B. was kind enough to lend me his 3/4 inch socket set and the first time I placed a socket on that nut, the motor began to easily rotate. How bout that! The engine was not frozen. I checked the odometer and it read a little more than 31,000 miles. That can't be correct. I was thinking that the last owner must have converted the car over to a 12 volt electrical system, so I was going to need to buy a 12 volt battery. So I started checking for 12 volt items and found that the car was most certainly all original. It was a 6 volt car with a 12 volt battery in it. I quickly consulted with MOB expert, Ray M., wo assured me that you can use a 12 volt battery, but be careful. I finally decided to purchase a new 6 volt battery and make this car as original as possible. It was about this time that I figured out that this car is supposed to have a positive ground system. Not only had the last owner installed a 12 volt battery in a 6 volt car, he installed it backwards. Again, HHHhhmmmmm!!! So I purchased and installed a new 6 volt battery in the car and turned the key. Imagine my surprise when

turn over. Wow, this thing might actually run. Next I pulled all 6 plugs and did a compression test. I was rewarded with 50-70 lbs. of compression across all 6 cylinders. Next, I loaded the cylinders up with lubricant and let it sit overnight in the hope that I might be able to get the compression a little higher. The maintenance manual told me that it should have 165 lbs. of compression +- 10%. After sitting for 24 hours, the compression increased somewhat but nowhere near the advertised 165 pounds. I reasoned that there was enough compression for the engine to run and that I would continue to work towards that goal. Although the engine turned over, it turned over REAL slow, so I replaced the battery cables with new ones and was able to get it turning over faster, but no spark. Next I replaced all 6 plugs with new ones, installed a new condenser and points. OK, now I have spark but the engine refused to start or even stumble, burble or show any such signs of life. I pulled the distributor for inspection and found that there are only 2 ways to install it into the engine, so I rotated it 180 degrees and put it back into the engine and it started right up and

began to idle. The motor was reasonably quiet so I assumed that the oil system was working. I looked on the dashboard and found that the oil gauge read 40 lbs of pressure at idle. The motor has ran good ever since that day. It starts easily, idles good and has good power.

Next came a new gas tank, fuel pump, fuel level sensor and all new gas lines. Then new exhaust from the manifold to the rear bumper. I never did get the rear brakes to work but my oldest son promised to get them working and also to install four new tires. He also promised to paint the car, install a new interior, carpet and a new convertible top. Now that the car was running normally, it was time to deliver it to my son's home in Cave City, KY. I loaded the car into my trailer and hauled it the 860 miles to Thomas's home. I arrived on a Friday afternoon, we unloaded the car and spent the weekend driving it around the KY countryside. Thomas lives outside of a town in rural KY about 7-8 miles and his neighborhood is just loaded with back country roads that go just about everywhere and nowhere all at the same time. It's a perfect place for a country ride. Corn,

soybeans, wheat and tobacco fields are everywhere. We had great fun playing with the '51 Dodge.

I drove home on Monday and have to admit that I miss having that little car in my shop. I really enjoyed those few months I spent working on that car.

It's a great little car with less than 32,000 miles on the odometer. Thomas has promised to finish the restoration by the summer of 2025. I am anxious to get up there next year to see the finished product.


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














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
