

Member of the Month

Create a monthly feature that highlights a particular member of the club. People enjoy seeing their names in print and the feeling of being appreciated, so this can be a good incentive for people to read the club newsletter and actively participate in the club. Interview the member of the month for relevant quotes, and list her accomplishments, background and credentials.

Club Funds

Keep the club up to date with how much club funds are available, and exactly how the funds are spent. This will make the activities of the club visible to all members and visitors and increase club accountability. It can also be a good way to show how the club helps the community or improves its usefulness to members, if the funds are being used correctly.


Your newsletter shouldn't read like a community newspaper. Include only information related to your club, state and/or National GFWC news.

Save the bees, kill the stinknet!



We depend on bees, butterflies, hummingbirds and other pollinators for reproduction of 85% of the world's flowering plants, and over twothirds of our crop

species. Loss of habitat, use of pesticides, and diseases are playing havoc with their survival. Club members can help save the pollinators by planting native plants such as milkweed, fairy dusters, desert mallow and Parry's Penstemons in their own gardens or community gardens.



Have some fun with it and become citizen scientists recording your observations as part of Nature's Notebook's Nectar Connectors project.

While pollinator habitats are being destroyed, stinknet weed, a plant native to Africa, is sweeping through our state and choking out even more of our native plants. It's everywhere, in residential areas, along roadsides, and in areas where the soil has been disturbed.

Club members can help eradicate this weed in their neighborhoods. Have a "stop the stinknet" party. Bag the dried blossoms and dispose of them before the monsoons come and they multiply. See U of A Cooperative Extension for more information.

It causes problems with memory, thinking and behavior. The article below shares information about how your club may become involved to help raise funds for this important organization. It is the leading voluntary health organization in Alzheimer's care, support, and research.

There are presently an estimated 55 million people worldwide living with dementia. There are more than 6 million people in the United States that have Alzheimer's and over 11 million people are serving as unpaid caregivers.

The Alzheimer's Association provides critically needed support to those affected by this disease and is undertaking research to find a cure. GFWC Arizona would like to encourage all clubs in the state to support the Alzheimer's Association in their efforts to combat this form of dementia. 
Dementia Resolution (Adopted 2023)

Excerpted: "BE IT RESOLVED, That the General Federation of Women's Clubs urges its member clubs to support;

- Education on recognition of cognitive decline and other forms of dementia;
- Funding for caregivers, respite care, and facilities that provide memory care;
- Legislation and research to improve treatment, access to treatment, prevention, and cures for all forms of dementia."

Use the activity to motivate and inspire your friend(s) to join GFWC. The benefits of community service not only make a person feel good, but it helps to build meaningful friendships and bonds that will last a lifetime.


GFWC-AZ District Highlights—SW District


