ANDREA MEAD LAWRENCE continues to provide inspiration to Pico Ski Club athletes and families as well as those who are drawn to mountains — regardless of their (dis)ability — at Pico Mountain. As Pico Mountain begins to celebrate its 75th Anniversary, it makes perfect sense to keep her legacy at the forefront of the skiing community. This building, named in her honor, will do just that.

Inspiring stories have made this state-of-the-art facility — the first of its kind in Vermont — a reality.

OLYMPIC GOLD MEDALIST ANDREA MEAD LAWRENCE *Andrea Mead Lawrence Lodge*

Her history in skiing is an inspiration to all — but especially to local children and their families from Vermont — where at age 14, Andrea Mead Lawrence made the national team. At 15, she competed in the 1948 Winter Olympics, taking eighth in slalom. In 1952, she was selected as captain of the U.S. women's team at the age of 19 and went on to win both slalom and giant slalom — the first and only time an American ski racer has won two gold medals — becoming the top American ski racer of her time. Her roots began here at Pico Mountain where she grew up skiing with her family at the ski area started by her parents, Brad and Janet Mead. Her legacy continues to inspire and motivate young Pico skiers today.



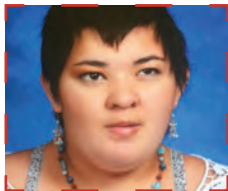
U.S. PARALYMPIC CHAMPION SARAH WILL *"Access for All" Elevator and Foyer*

Sarah Will hasn't missed a ski season since she began skiing at age four and then racing as a young skier in the Pico Ski Club. She did have to make the transition from able-bodied skier to a mono-ski as a result of a ski accident that paralyzed her from the waist down. Not deterred, she went on to become one of the most decorated U.S. winter sports athletes of all time, spending 11 years on the U.S. Disabled Ski Team, where she earned a record 12 golds and one silver medal while competing in four Winter Paralympic Games. Her passion for skiing and for life continues in her work today, as she partners with the Pico Ski Education Foundation and Vermont Adaptive Ski and Sports to raise funds for the Andrea Mead Lawrence Lodge at Pico Mountain, where the elevator and foyer — which provides access for all — will be in her name.



GREG MCCLALLEN *Coach McClallen Great Room*

Greg "Coach" McClallen is fondly referred to as the "Dean of Vermont Ski Racing." He has been involved in the leadership of the Pico Ski Club Racing Program and the Rutland High School Ski Team for more than 40 years, retiring from his Race Director position at Pico in 2009. Coach's passion for skiing, coaching and teaching has resulted in praise from all walks of Vermont skiing including his fellow coaches, officials, administrators and most importantly, his student athletes. SECOND FLOOR:

- Home to the Pico Ski Education Foundation.
- Great Room with training equipment, but will also be used for community events, educational programs and functions.
- Event Room for smaller events and functions.
- Offices and Conference Room.
- Foundation Donor Lobby.

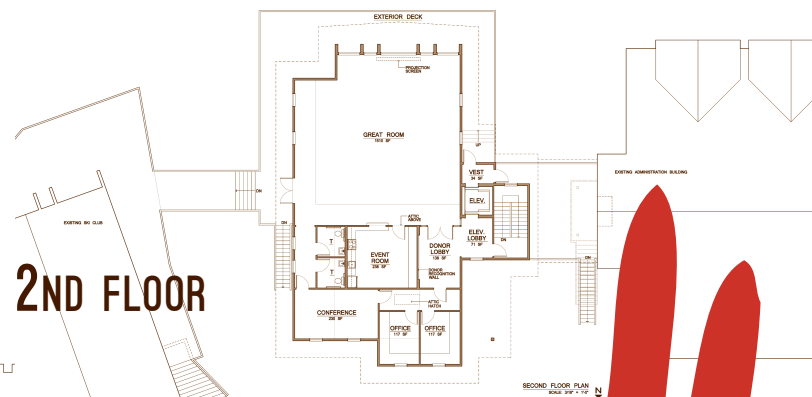
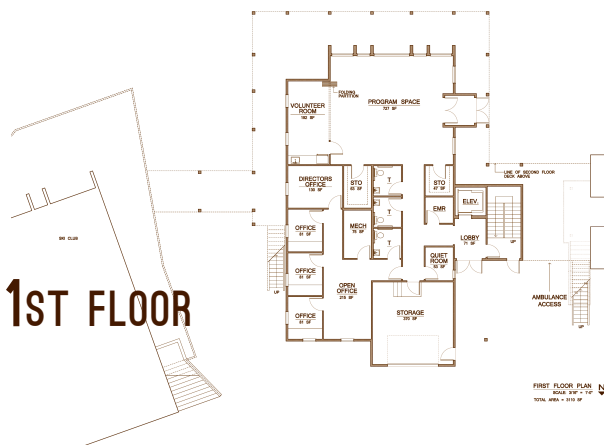

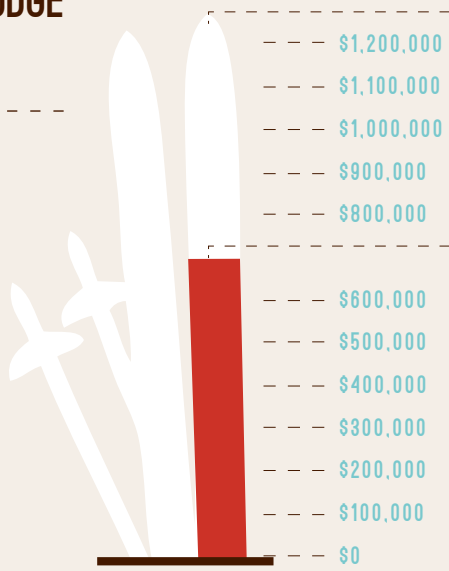
