As your handicap chairman part of my responsibility is to review the weekly scores

posted after our Tuesday tournaments. Since we have added many new members in the last year, a couple of observations and reminders are in order along with a simple recommendation.

When playing on our Tuesday rounds along with any rounds you play outside the club, each member is responsible for posting their own score.

Many of the discrepancies I see from the Tuesday game is players not posting the correct "Net Double Bogey Adjustment". They are not considering any holes which may have exceeded net double bogey for handicap purposes.

The easiest way to handle this is to utilize the GHIN app and post your score "hole-byhole". You enter your gross score for each hole, the app will automatically advance to the next hole where you enter your score for that hole. Also, it will adjust for any hole where you exceed "Net Double Bogey". You do not have to figure it out yourself.

Try it once and I think you will agree how easy this method is and the most accurate way to post. Of course, you always have the option to adjust manually and post your total score. Quite honestly, most of the Tuesday gang has found that posting hole by hole is really easy. If you have questions
about posting hole by hole or understanding how net double bogey works, please contact me or any board member. We will be happy to explain and show you how it works.

Weekly groups and order of play, I would like to discuss this for the coming year. For groups, I honestly don't believe that there are any bad pairings. Having played with almost all of you, I know that we have a great group of members that have interesting backgrounds and are enjoyable to play with. It's a social game and it is never too late to make new friends. That is why I like to mix it up and have you play with new people on occasion. I think that it makes us a stronger club, and more enjoyable when you come to the course and know more people to look forward to seeing. When pairing you in new groups, I usually assign you in pairs, that is with someone that you usually play with. On the other hand, I know many of you enjoy playing in the same group the majority of the time for good reasons. It is your club. You can let me know your preferences for who to play with confidentially. It helps me and you can do it at the course, or by responding to the weekly email.

For order of play, we don't all play at the same pace. The required maximum is 4 hours and 45 minutes, but some of us play in a much faster time. Playing in the last groups unfortunately increases the odds of being behind a slower group. The priority of
play is as follows: the two members assigned for scoring duty get priority in the first two groups. This is because we need to count the money, get ready to enter scores, and be ready to pay winners as soon as possible after the last scorecard is entered. Second priority is groups with members that tend to play more quickly. This helps increase the odds that the latter groups are not held up. I still try to move you within the order of play, so that you are not always starting on the same hole, but those are the priorities. I do put a lot of thought and effort into making the groups and order of play. If I am not doing a good enough job for you, let me know. The more information that I have enables me to do the best for everybody. Thanks for all of your communication, attention to pace of play, and support.

## New USGA Rules for 2023

2023 RULES OF GOLF: 5 KEY CHANGES
The R\&A and the USGA have released the most recent edition of the Rules of Golf, effective January 2023.
HERE ARE 5 KEY CHANGES


REA USGA.

DIAGRAM 19.2: RELIEF OPTIONS FOR BALL UNPLAYABLE IN GENERAL AREA


A player decides that their ball in a bush Is unplayable. The player has three options, in each case adding one penalty stroke. The player may:
(1) Take stroke-and-distance relief by playing a ball from a relief area based on where the previous stroke was made.
(2) Take back-on-the-line relief by dropping a ball behind the spot of the original ball, keeping the spot of the original ball between the hole and the spot on which the ball is dropped.
(3) Take lateral relief. The reference point for taking relief is the spot of the original ball and a ball must be dropped in and played from the two club-length relief area, which is no nearer the hole than the reference point.

## Hole-in One Club

All Redhawk Golfers Club members are invited to participate in the "Hole-in-One" Fund.

Members contribute $\$ 5.00$ each to the Fund. When a hole-in-one is scored, that member receives the collected monies. The Fund acts as insurance to help the lucky winner with the purchase of the customary round of drinks related to making a hole-in-one.

Here are the guidelines:
Participation in the Hole-in-One Fund is optional and is in addition to the weekly tournament fees.

The Hole-in-One Fund starts in January 2023. If no hole-in-ones occur in 2023, we will start a new Fund in January 2024 with the 2023 Fund monies added to the total. Only 2024 members will be eligible to win the combined Fund during 2024.

A roster will be kept of the current members of the Hole-in-One Fund. You are not officially a member of the Fund until your contribution has been received.

Any golfer that makes a hole-in-one and is not part of the Fund will still be obligated to pay for a round drinks after golf. The Redhawk Golfers Club will no longer pay for drinks after a hole-in-one but will provide a special Hole-in-One head cover.

A player making a hole-in-one must be a member in good standing with the Redhawk Golfers Club and a member of the Hole-inOne Fund.

A complete 18 -hole round must be played from the regulation tees at Redhawk Golf Course during a tournament or in an official Redhawk Golfers Club outing at another course. The Fund only applies to the Redhawk Golfers Club tournaments here at Redhawk or official Redhawk Golfers Club tournaments held at other courses.

The shot must be witnessed by at least two other players who are playing in the same group.

The player will receive cash and or a check for an amount equal to what is in the Fund.

Once someone wins the Hole-in-One Fund, all interested members must then contribute an additional $\$ 5.00$ to stay in the Hole-in-One Fund.

Once the $\$ 5.00$ contribution is paid, there are no refunds from the Fund for someone that wants to drop out.

If more than one hole-in-one is scored on the same day or same tournament, all hole-inones shall share the applicable Fund total as of that date.

Any disputes will be resolved by the administrator of the Fund.

The Fund monies will be maintained by the administrator of the Fund and will be managed separate from the Redhawk Golfers Club.

## The average driving distance for male amateur golfers by age

Earlier this week we took a look at the average driving distance for male amateur golfers in each handicap range, and it got many of our members curious as to how the average driving distance would look if it were broken down by age.

Well, thanks to Arccos Golf, we can take a look at that. Arccos Golf conducted an annual study culminating in the company's distance report published in February, which included the average driving distance of amateur golfers in different age categories.

The data is based on the average taken from over 26 million shots hit from golfers from scratch level to a 25 index. Here are the findings for 2019:

## Average Driving Distance By Age in 2019:

- 10-19: 234.2 yards
- 20-29: 239.7 yards
- 30-39: 233.7 yards
- 40-49: 225.9 yards
- 50-59: 215.4 yards
- 60-69: 204.5 yards
- 70+: 190.4 yards

For clarification purposes, the yardages above are based on total roll-out numbers, not just carry.

## The average driving distance for male amateur golfers in each handicap range

How far does the average male amateur golfer really hit the ball with their driver? It's been a topic of hot debate for years, but thanks to statistician Lou Stagner of Decade Sports the question has been answered for 2020 at least.

Using data taken directly from the USGA Distance Insight Report, Stagner calculated the driving distance for male amateur golfers in the following handicap ranges: Less than $6,6-12,13-20$ and $21+$, with the average yardage of all golfers coming in at 217 yards.

## Male Amateur Driving Distance with

## Driver:

- Handicap 6 or less 245 yards
- Handicap 6 to 12223 yards
- Handicap 13 to 20207 yards
- Handicap 21+ 190 yards
- All Golfers 217 yards
