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Each of today's readings is, in its own way, about wisdom or discernment. The first reading is from Solomon's Prayer in the Book of Wisdom. To know God's counsel, the wisdom of Solomon insists on the need for help from the Holy Spirit. The psalmist asks God to help us "number our days aright"; in other words, to acknowledge our mortality and use our limited lifetime wisely.

In the Letter to Philemon, Paul subtly asks Philemon to use his Spirit-informed judgment. Paul could order Philemon to do what Paul desires. But he refrains. Instead, he says that he wants the good that Philemon does to be voluntary. Paul drops some serious

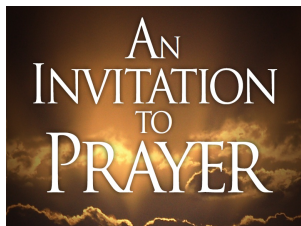

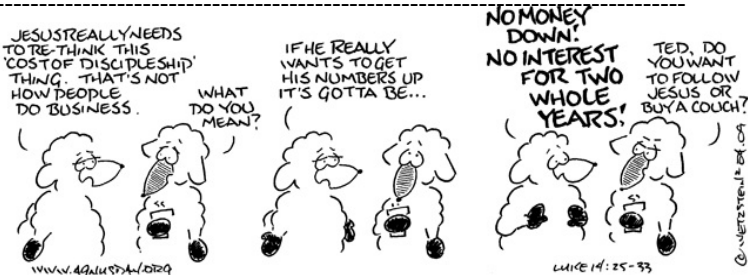

hints but doesn't give direct commands. Instead, he tells Philemon to rearrange his imagination. Once he thought of Onesimus as a slave; now he must think of Onesimus as a beloved brother in Christ. What that means in terms of concrete action (free Onesimus from slavery? send Onesimus back to Paul in prison?) is left to Philemon to discern.

In the Gospel reading, Jesus asks his potential followers to exercise their judgment by weighing the cost of what it means to follow him as disciples. It will not be easy, he says. In fact, they should be prepared to lay aside their families, their safety, and their possessions. Of course, Jesus doesn't mean that they must literally hate their families; but he does mean that they must be willing to turn aside even from their families, if necessary, to follow him. They must carry their crosses: a symbol of willingness to bear persecution and even death. And they must be ready to renounce their possessions, to let them go. It's not an easy way, but it's a good and beautiful one for those who can count the cost.

- Why does Paul allow Philemon to use his judgment rather than ordering him to do as desired?
- Why might disciples of Jesus need to give up their families, their safety, or their possessions?

Practice of Faith

Jesus' advice to renounce everything goes against conventional wisdom. But the Christian is not concerned with conventional wisdom. We are led by the wisdom that comes from God; by faith, to give it another name. Faith allows us to trust in God's promise of goodness.

- Learn about the Christian martyrs, whose faith allowed them to withstand extraordinary challenges.
- This time in our culture has been called the Age of Anxiety for many young people. Reach out to encourage and help someone who is struggling with anxiety or fear.

Questions

- When you read poetry like Isaiah's, does it feel abstract and generic, or can you hear it addressed directly to you?
- Given the hard realities that invade our lives every day, does it seem too far-fetched, even irresponsible, to proclaim Isaiah's wild images of loosened tongues and opened ears?
- What do you make of Jesus' very tactile method of healing the deaf man — placing a finger in his ear and touching his tongue? In what ways does it speak of incarnation and the importance of flesh?

Activities

- Inaugurate a "Fear not!" day in your home or at your group meeting. Invite people to write down the things they are most afraid of — personal, professional, physical. No one else gets to see them. Each person folds his or her paper in half and puts it through a cross-cut shredder. Then, take the fragments and scatter them in a flower bed where they can act as mulch for the growing plants.
- Identify some of the "impossible" things that have happened in your life, like getting out of a jam or finding something that seemed impossibly lost, and tell someone about them. Then, together, give thanks for those mercies demonstrated in your life.
- Clear an hour of time to go off by yourself with the Lord, away from the crowd. Use the time to sit in the presence of the Lord
