Scripture Insights

Advent means "arrival." It is a season of preparation and movement. Christians awaiting Christ's arrival are alert and in motion. The Gospel summons us to readiness at every moment, in and out of season. Vigilance actively prepares us to receive Christ into our midst, both at the moment of His miraculous birth and on the certain but unpredictable day of His return. The flood story underscores the stakes.

Sacred time has a corollary in sacred space. The first reading and psalm portray pilgrimage to Jerusalem, ancient capital city of Israel

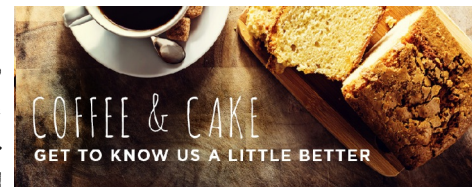

SOUP FOR SENIORS

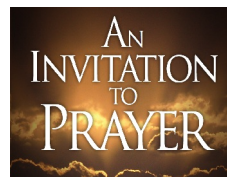

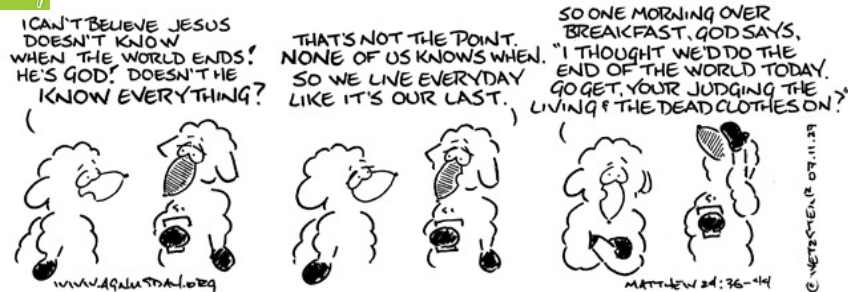

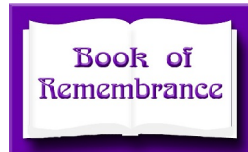

and Judah. Atop Zion, Jerusalem's sacred hill, stood "God's house," the temple. For the psalmist, this journey is a joyful one, an occasion for justice and celebration of peace. It is also an opportunity for God's people to strengthen the bonds of community through thanksgiving, camaraderie, and prayer.

Isaiah's vision expands community to include many nations. Jerusalem becomes a beacon of light and teaching, prompting people to leave behind the familiar and easy, make the arduous journey to God's house, and there learn to walk in God's ways. That movement will bring about recognition of God's sovereignty, and with it an end to wars between nations. The psalmist's prayer for peace and prosperity receives more concrete detail in Isaiah's vision: weapons of war will be hammered into tools for working the land. Instruments of death will be transformed to cultivate life.

St. Paul's letter to the Romans asserts that the time to move is now. Yet, waking to our responsibilities is not a one-time action. It is a daily routine. To put on Christ is to remember daily our baptismal calling and imitate Christ in every aspect of our lives.

- Is there a tension between the predictable calendar of our Advent observances and the unpredictable timing of Christ's second coming?
- In Scripture, walking is a metaphor for moral conduct. What is the relationship between communal worship and practices of justice?
- What practices can you incorporate into your daily routine of waking and dressing to remind you to "put on Christ" and "walk in the light"?

Practice of Faith

Advent is the time to prepare Christ's kingdom for His second coming. How can you prepare?

- The Advent wreath is a perfect symbol of prayer. The candles remind us to walk in the light of the Lord. Set up an Advent wreath in a place of prayer in your home.
- At times we may use words that hurt others. Examine your conscience. Have you hurt others with harsh criticism? Have you been jealous of what others have? You can start to bring peace by praying for their good. Ask their forgiveness and participate in the sacrament of penance.
- In the places where we live, study and work, do we open up the way to peace, forgiving those who have offended us? Do we care for those who are on the margins, do we redress some injustice by helping those who have less? This is called building peace.

Questions

- Isaiah speaks of whole communities streaming in eagerness to the Lord's mountain. They are filled with inspiration, eager to find out about God's ways. What portions of this poetic passage speak to you personally? What portions seem most inspiring for us as a community of faith? Why? What is your reaction to the radical promise of peace of which Isaiah speaks?
- This passage from the Letter to the Romans is one of the most optimistic Paul will write. He is confident that salvation is at hand, and he exhorts the community to stand ready. Think about the contrasting images Paul uses (day and night, lightness and darkness). To what is he calling the community in Rome, and to what does he call you today?
- Jesus uses the story of Noah to affirm to the people that God is still acting, and that the Lord's coming is real. Have you ever procrastinated? What do you tend to put off for another day? What does it mean to you to be ready for the arrival of the Son of Man?

Activities

- Mountain climbers know that traveling a trail can be arduous at times and glorious at others. Think about your spiritual journey.

At what times in your life did the climb seem particularly steep or long? At what times did it seem filled with breathtaking vistas? Write in your journal about your climb up the "Lord's mountain."

- As Advent commences, we are reminded that God's plan is unfolding in the person of Jesus. God's plan is for a radical experience of peace — one that comes to us through the Prince of Peace. As you read or watch the news, notice places in the world where humankind has not yet beat "swords into plowshares." Spend a few minutes each day praying that God's peace will come to the conflict in that location, whether close or far from your home.
- Jesus teaches the importance of staying awake and attentive. He asks us to be ready for Him. Think about the ways in which you are energized getting ready for a special event or occasion. What is one small thing you could do each day to ready yourself for the Lord? Notice if procrastination is part of your spiritual life. Choose one small practice that supports being attentive, such as spending a few moments at the start of the day in silence, driving without the radio on, or reading a special prayer before sleep.

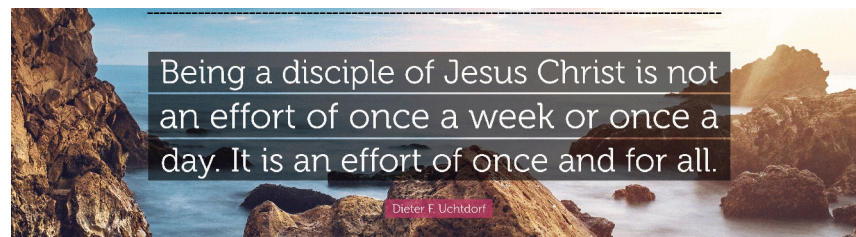

POLISH ADVENT TRADITIONS



People prepare for this big holiday during the four weeks of Advent. In Poland this is a time of fasting and prayer, of spiritual preparation

for Christmas.

The name, from the Latin word *adventus*, means “coming”. In the church it is a four week time of awaiting and preparation for the Nativity of Jesus. Advent closes the liturgical year in the Church and opens a new one.

These days Advent starts after November 30th, around St. Andrew’s Eve, on the fourth Sunday before Christmas. It lasts till December 24th. This is a crucial period in Polish annual tradition of Church and folk rituals.

In Podlasie region the beginning of Advent was once announced by the loud sound of long wooden trumpets called *ligawy*. Ceremony was called trumpeting for Advent or announcing Advent. To intensify the effect a trumpeter stood over a well, so that the echo amplified the played tune which signaled that from now on all music instruments should disappear along with any kind of parties. Weddings or other ceremonies connected with banqueting, singing and dancing were not allowed. The time of reflection, solemnity, and religious practice started.

The common Advent custom in Poland, still practiced today, is every day participation in the early morning mass for the Holy Virgin Mary, known as *roraty* (from the first word of a song imploring for the coming of the Savior of the world: *rorate coeli desuper* – let the heaven send down dew to us). During the mass a huge *roratnica* candle is burning, as a symbol of Our Lady, while the faithful come to the service with their own burning candles or lanterns.

In villages of the past, long autumn evenings of Advent were the time of female neighbors’ meetings doing some work together. They were spinning linen and wool with spindles or spinning wheels, sorting beans and peas and other similar work. At the same time they were chatting about current news and telling stories.

St. Nicholas Day, Dec. 6th – *Dzień Świątecznego Mikołaja* – starts off the Christmas holidays in Poland. St. Nicholas was the 4th-century Bishop of Myra in Lycia, what is now a province of Turkey. He had a reputation for secret gift-giving, and is associated by some countries with Santa Claus.

Traditionally on December 6th, St. Nicholas day, St. Nicholas usually dressed as a bishop, comes in his sleigh with gifts for the children. Good children would get gifts. As for the bad children, they would get coal. Today St. Nicholas comes dressed more like the American Santa Claus, and not always in a sleigh. Polish children will also get Advent calendars. Each day the boys and girls would open a door of the calendar. Behind the doors are pieces of chocolate. My candy calendar never lasted to the end of December.
