SECOND SUNDAY OF LENT DRUGA NIEDZIELA WIELKIEGO POSTU

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The transfiguration of Jesus often leaves people baffled. It is not clear why the evangelists included it in their Gospel accounts, or why it is at the juncture in Jesus' ministry when He turns His steps to Jerusalem and His ultimate fate. Likewise unclear is the transfiguration's unity with the wider Gospel message. The same Jesus who has preached a message of humility and sought out the companionship of the poor is now covered in glory and converses with heavenly beings. Finally, the moral lesson of this passage and its role in our Lenten observance are not obvious from a simple reading





This narrative has deep biblical roots. As this Sunday's first reading shows, certain mysterious phenomena, especially supernatural light, accompany God's nearby presence. This is the "flaming torch" in the first reading, and Jesus Himself in the Gospel. Jesus glows with the same supernatural light associated with a direct manifestation of God.

This moment of glorification does not occur to intimidate the disciples or exalt Jesus. Instead, the divine voice proclaims: "This is my chosen Son; listen to Him." Jesus' glorification reinforces the humility and mercy that He has preached all along. He bears divine glory, but His disciples can only see it because living the Gospel has opened their awareness to Jesus' relationship with God.

This context helps explain why this passage appears during Lent. As we set down the things that distract us and live the Gospel with greater fervor, we will see the divine light more clearly. Opportunities for mercy and forgiveness will catch our attention, and perhaps we will find the courage to respond. In these moments, St. Paul's dream becomes reality: Christ "change(s) our lowly body to conform with His glorified body." We become Jesus' hands, heart, and voice, and bear His light into a world that longs to see.

- What reminds you that Jesus speaks with a divine voice?
- How has your discipleship helped you to see Jesus' glory?
- How can you hear Christ's voice with greater clarity this Lent?

Practice of Hope

The transfiguration of Jesus reveals how a human being looks when completely transformed in the love of God. During the act of prayer, Jesus became luminous with God's presence.

 Prioritize time for daily prayer during Lent. Plan your calendar around prayer, set reminders with your phone. Building a new

prayer habit is a surefire way to grow in your relationship with God.

- Practice intercessory prayer. Carry with you a list of names of people and concerns for prayer, reviewing it daily as part of your Lenten prayer practice. Simply lifting the names and worries to God is enough; God knows what to do from there.
- The Church celebrates the Solemnity of St. Joseph on March 19.
 Four times Joseph listens to the messenger sent by God to guide his choices and each time he courageously responds with quiet, trusting obedience. Follow the example of Joseph by quieting your heart and listening to the voice of the Lord for direction in your own life.

Questions

- What does it mean to you to enter into a covenant with another person? In what ways do you feel you are surrendering and giving yourself to God's will as Abraham did? How does worship lead us to depend upon God alone?
- How do we Christians look upon things of this world in light of our destiny as citizens of heaven? What could it mean when the Scripture says Christ will make our bodies according to the pattern of His glorified body?
- Why do you think the disciples fell asleep on this holy mountain and also in the garden at Gethsemane before Jesus was handed over? What are some things we can do to stay awake so that we will glimpse the glory of God?

Family Activities

- Both Abraham and the apostles were frightened by their encounter with God. Imagine meeting the Lord. What might be unsettling about it? Now reflect on today's responsorial psalm (Psalm 27:1, 7–8, 8–9, 13–14).
- The transfiguration story gives us a glimpse into eternal life. Take time this week to reflect on the words of the Creed: "I look forward to the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come."
- In the second reading, Paul warns against those whose "minds are occupied with earthly things." Especially during Lent, we try to occupy our minds with spiritual things. It's a good time to do some spiritual reading. Pick out a book that will lift your faith and make that book your Lenten reading.



The Art and Heart of Forgiveness

Forgiveness is not a feeling. It is a decision, an act of the will, a resolution, a firm choice to free ourselves from the continued influence and control of the adversary. As we deliberately and intentionally walk the footpath beyond the ego's injury, we find ourselves being blessed with spiritual maturity: Wounds are often the womb of wisdom. Because forgiveness is a process and our hearts are finicky, we might be tempted to revisit the scene of the crime and throw another log on the fires of fury. When that occurs, we remind ourselves that we have made the rational decision to pardon and get on with life. We recommit to the decision. With every recommitment to forgiveness, we take another step forward in the footsteps of the Lord and Divine Master and becoming his instrument. We pray to be instruments of peace in the Peace Prayer. That transformation occurs as we serve the Lord and Divine Master and train our souls in forgiveness. When we commit and recommit to the process of sowing pardon amid an injury, we witness to the gratuity of grace that moves us from selfishness to selflessness.

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The Transfiguration is one of the most quintessential mountaintop experiences in scripture: a glimpse of divine glory, a word from God, and an experience that changes all who are present.

Recounted in all three Synoptic Gospels as well as in 2 Peter (1:16–18), the Transfiguration is one of the most well-attested events in Jesus' life. Greek Orthodox tradition calls it the Metamorphosis due to the Greek word for "transfigured" in Matthew and Mark (metamorphōthē). In the Gospels, the story always appears after Jesus' first passion prediction, as the focus of ministry shifts toward Jerusalem.



Prayer is the context in which the event happens. They ascend the mountain to pray, and it is as "he was praying" that the Transfiguration took place (Luke 9:28–29). This is one of many instances in Luke-Acts where prayer sets the stage for major events, decisions, and ministry moments (Luke 3:21–22; 6:12; 11:1; 22:39–46; Acts 1:14; 4:31; 13:2–3).

Further, Luke describes the content of conversation among Jesus, Moses, and Elijah: they "were speaking of his departure, which he was about to accomplish at Jerusalem" (Luke 9:31). The word for "departure" (exodos) is directly associated in biblical tradition with the great liberation from Egypt, the greatest salvation story in the Hebrew Bible. This characterizes Jesus' death, resurrection, and ascension—events soon to happen in Jerusalem—as a New Exodus within the larger story of God's saving purpose.

Finally, Luke describes further the disciples' experience. As the event happens, they are "weighed down with sleep" (9:32). Just as Luke attributes their sleep in the Garden of Gethsemane to "grief" (22:45–46), here the disciples' dull senses are made more understandable. Luke adds that they "saw his glory" and were "terrified as they entered the cloud" (9:32, 34). These descriptors draw attention to the disciples' experience of a divine encounter. Within Luke-Acts, such eyewitness experiences enhance the disciples' credentials to serve later as Jesus' witnesses (Luke 24:48; Acts 1:21–22; 3:15; 4:20; 10:39).

Moses and Elijah are two of the most famous leaders from Israel's history. They both saw God's glory, had revelatory mountaintop experiences, came to the end of their lives at God's bidding, and came to be associated with traditions that they never died (Deuteronomy 34:1–5; 1 Kings 2:11). Even more, in biblical tradition they may represent the Law (Moses) and the Prophets (Elijah), which at this time formed the two cornerstones of Israel's scripture (Luke 16:16, 29; Acts 13:15; 24:14; 28:23–24; see also Luke 24:44). The presence of Moses and Elijah at the Transfiguration clearly affirms Jesus' ministry as consonant with their legacies and fulfilling the purpose they shared....

The Transfiguration story raises more questions than it answers. It is more mysterious than explained. The event is profound yet cryptic, spontaneous yet connected to other events, and transformative yet changing little about pressing challenges. Like many spiritual mountaintop experiences, it offers a glimpse of the divine that alters perspective more than circumstances. Along with Jesus' disciples, we are called not to understand everything, but to "listen to him!"—and eventually to bear witness to what we have seen and heard.
