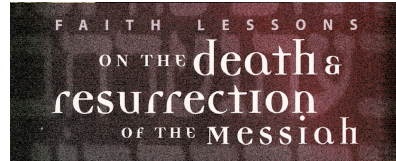

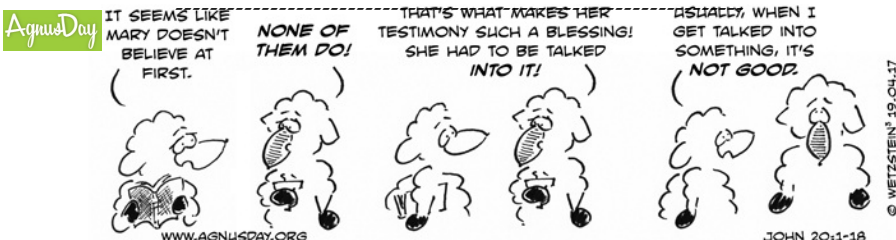

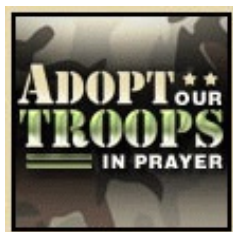

Dyngus Day, celebrated the Monday after Easter, features Polish traditions like kielbasa, polka music and political campaigning. This year's Dyngus Day coincides with the Boston Marathon due to Easter's late date.

The festival is traditionally celebrated by boys throwing water over girls they like. Sometimes they also strike them with pussy willows. The Easter whipping custom still exists in Central Europe. Variants of the custom exist in Poland, Hungary, and Germany. Whipping and other Dyngus Day customs are not observed in all Polish communities of the United States, some of which date from the 1880s. But they still celebrate in Buffalo, New York and other parts of the Midwest.

This is obvious in the Gospel. The empty tomb is a source of confusion and anxiety for Mary Magdalene, Peter, and the beloved disciple. Mary and the beloved disciple do not even enter at first. Only Peter does, and what he finds there perplexes him utterly. But as the beloved disciple reflects, he finds reason for hope. Anyone moving Jesus' body would

have left it bound; it would have been much easier to transport fully wrapped. The discarded burial cloths signify that the one once bound by them was now free.

In today's second reading, Paul teaches that Jesus' resurrection gives us hope for a glorious end to our lives. Even as we live, death eats away at us through misfortunes such as illness, fear, injury, and persecution. Discipleship in Christ means that our life has somehow mystically merged with His. When we pray and perform acts of mercy, we rely on Christ's conquest of death to overcome our earthly misfortunes. When we die in faith, we rely on Christ to raise us as He Himself rose. God can even subvert the universal dominion of death.

Although subtle, a reversal of sorts also appears in this Sunday's first reading. Peter, explaining the significance of Jesus' resurrection, describes the mission that Christ left the apostles. They are to preach forgiveness, even to the very people who killed him. No human mind could have conceived of such mercy. Only God, whose wisdom is beyond anything that can be asked or imagined, is capable of such love.

- What evidence have you found that Christ is alive and at work?
- How do you rely on Christ to overcome misfortune?
- How can you strengthen your ability to forgive?

Practice of Hope

For the fifty days of the Easter season, we celebrate our resurrection faith with joy and gladness. During this time, the newly baptized reflect on the Easter mysteries, recall the Easter symbols, and spiritually unpack the joy of the Easter Vigil. All Christians are invited into this process of recall and reflection, called mystagogy.

- Keep the fifty days of Easter alive in your home by adorning your prayer space with a white cloth, a new candle, and fresh flowers.
- Place the names of the newly baptized from your faith community near your kitchen sink so that you will remember to pray for them daily.
- Bread has long been a symbol of Easter. Prepare Easter bread for your home as well as some to share with your neighbors. Wrap the bread and enclose a note that proclaims your resurrection hope in the risen Christ.

Questions

- In today's first reading, Peter succinctly tells the story of Jesus to

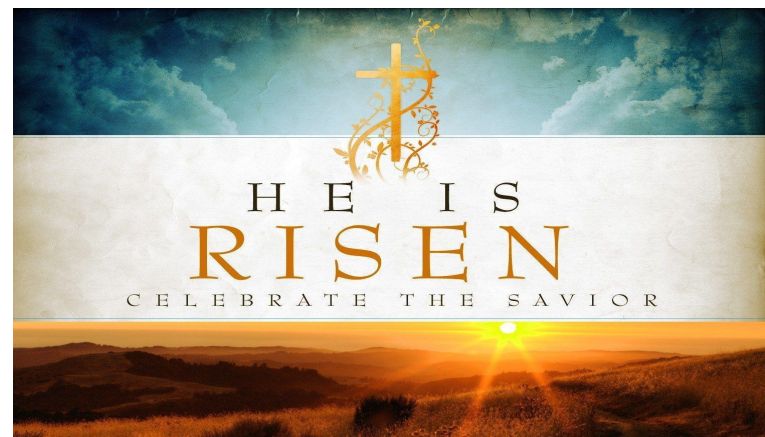

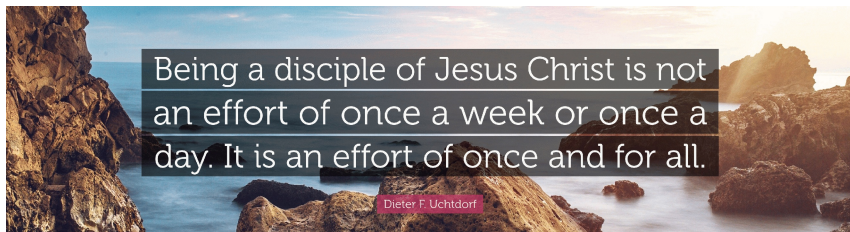
a group of Gentiles (non-Jews, who have not inherited the stories and traditions of the Jews). How do you think the story of Jesus fits into the larger story of all of God's previous efforts to save the Chosen People?

- How would you interpret this line in the second reading: "For you have died, and your life is hidden with Christ in God"? How might this relate to our baptism?
- What different behaviors might your baptismal promises impose on you? How might you live out your baptismal call during the next fifty days?

Family Activities

- In several cultures, a special blessing is prayed over the Easter foods that will be used at today's dinner. A prayer of blessing can be found in "A Book of Devotions and Prayers" of the Polish National Catholic Church. Consider purchasing a copy of this book for your family, and use the prayers and blessings found in it during the year.
- Mary Magdalene, Simon Peter, and John all reacted differently to the news of the resurrection. Reflect on your response to Christ's rising, and ask each member of your household to do the same as you sit down for Easter dinner.
- The Easter liturgy concluded with the solemn dismissal, "Thanks be to God, alleluia, alleluia, alleluia!" Sing this phrase at home and throughout the week as you keep the octave of Easter.





Engaging the Power of Paradox

A paradox may be described as “a contradiction with meaning written underneath.” On the surface, it makes little or no sense. Only the discerning eye (or heart) can perceive the underlying meaning. A familiar example occurs in the writings of St. Paul: “When I am weak then I am strong” (2 Corinthians 12:9–11). At a rational level, the statement makes no sense, yet many among us can recall experiences within which the statement rings true. It is the mystic more than anybody else that can entertain and embrace this paradoxical wisdom. This alternative consciousness, with its capacity for deeper perception and understanding, is not merely a feature of human life but an evolutionary endowment that characterizes all creation at the cosmic and planetary levels alike. Birth and death are not merely human experiences; they characterize the whole of God’s creation. On the planetary scale, earthquakes serve as a good example. Metaphorically, an earthquake can be described as the earth-body releasing its pent-up energies, so that it can continue to grow and flourish in a more creative way. Without earthquakes, we would have no earth, nor would any of us be around even to speculate on this baffling paradox of birth-death-rebirth.

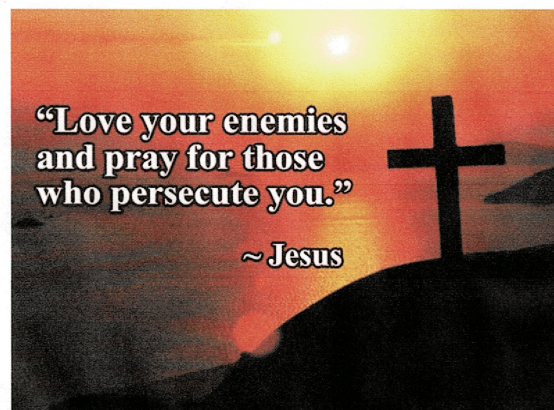
