In John's Gospel, Jesus is engaged in His "Bread of Life discourse" to gathering crowds following his Galilean signs at Passover. This festival celebrates God's power and presence among the Israelites during the Exodus and Sinai covenant. Covenantal symbolism ensues as Jesus presses His audience to be open to God acting in Him now just as God acted in the past.

Jesus now proclaims, "I am the bread that came down from heaven" (John 6:41). He embodies God's gift of manna in the Sinai wilderness. The crowd questions how Jesus makes such claims when





they know His origins. Jesus then reveals Himself as the One Who makes God known. Who Jesus is, and what he does to bring others to life, is possible because God is "the Father who sent me" (John 6:44). Because of Jesus' origins in God, He alone, much more than manna, makes God known and gives life both here and hereafter. Those who believe in Jesus, the Bread of Life, will not perish as did the manna and those who lived by it.

For Israel, the manna stopped when the people of God took possession of their land, but a new "bread from heaven" continued: the Law of Moses. Jesus insists that He is the "true" bread from heaven. He does not annul God's former gift but brings it to completion. He perfects God's gift to Israel in the Sinai covenant and gives life to all who partake of His offer of Himself.

- In his worst moments of suffering Elijah lies down with hopes of never rising. After a rest, God gifts him with sustenance that revives his vocation. How do you recognize such sustenance in our world?
- Through the Letter to the Ephesians, Paul counsels us to imitate God and love as Christ loved. How does this resonate for you?
- John's first Gospel audience, people who must believe without seeing Jesus, are faced with a problem like ours today. Where do the people in the Gospel encounter the Son of Man who will give them the Bread of Life? Where do you?

Practice of Faith

Spend time writing about how you have sought God out in the past: How have you glorified the Lord? With whom have you extolled the Lord's Name? How have you called out to the Lord in affliction? How have you taken refuge in the Lord? Consider seeking God in a new way today.

 Last week's reading from the Letter to the Ephesians challenged us to recreate ourselves according to God's way and holiness.
 Today's second reading continues to guide us in how we might do that. St. Paul calls us to be kind, compassionate, and forgiving in our communities.


- The Church's social teaching adds to this guidance by helping us focus on specific ways we can live out holiness. Learn about this by reading church documents like "The Eleven Great Principles of the Polish National Catholic Church.
- Choose one action that demonstrates Kindness, compassion, and forgiveness that will help you be living bread for others.


Questions

- Have you ever reached a point of wanting to give up? What do you think brings people to this precipice?
- What restores and re-energizes you when you feel burned out and totally depleted?
- Some people are daily communicants, and others might receive Communion but once or twice a year. Why do you think some make the effort to receive Eucharist every day?

Activities

- In the first reading, the meal provided to Elijah enabled him to trudge off on his long journey to the mountain. Pray and discern over the next steps on your spiritual journey, and then look to the Eucharist as your strength for what will come next.
- Read about the life of Marthe Robin (b. Germany 1902; d. 1982)
 who lived for many years on nothing but the Eucharistic host. She was an invalid, mystic, and charismatic witness to Christ.
- After his conversion from atheism, the French writer André Frossard wrote of the privilege of receiving Eucharist in his book God Exists. I Have Met Him. Try to locate his book, or the biography of another convert. Conversion stories can be very inspiring. Each time you eat bread this week, let it remind you of the great privilege of receiving the Eucharistic bread.





The Unsearchable Ways of God

"I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it?"—Isaiah 43:19

God is a God of surprises. He's a God of newness. Study the Hebrew Scriptures and the New Testament. Noah, mocked by all for building an ark on dry land, was saved. Moses uprooted the Jewish people in Egypt and led them to a new land. This was God's unfathomable plan brought into the lives of his people. This was newness God brought into their lives. Whenever God reveals himself, he brings newness. In the beginning, as with Noah and Moses, openness to God demands our trust in him. Let God surprise you! Accept the new thing he wants to do in your life. What is the step of trust God wants you to take?

This Thursday the Church observes the Solemnity of the Assumption/Dormition of the Blessed Virgin Mary

The Assumption is the oldest feast day of Our Lady, but we don't know how it first came to be celebrated.

Its origin is lost in those days when Jerusalem was restored as a sacred city, at the time of the Roman Emperor Constantine (c. 285-337). By then it had been a pagan city for two centuries, ever since Emperor Hadrian (76-138) had leveled it around the year 135 and rebuilt it as Aelia Capitolina in honor of Jupiter.

For 200 years, every memory of Jesus was obliterated from the city, and the sites made holy by His life, death and Resurrection became pagan temples.

After the building of the Church of the Holy Sepulchre in 336, the sacred sites began to be restored and memories of the life of Our Lord began to be celebrated by the people of Jerusalem. One of the memories about his mother centered around the "Tomb of Mary," close to Mount Zion, where the early Christian community had lived.

On the hill itself was the "Place of Dormition," the spot of Mary's "falling asleep," where she had died. The "Tomb of Mary" was where she was buried.

At this time, the "Memory of Mary" was being celebrated. Later it was to become Continued on Page 15

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

our feast of the Assumption.

For a time, the "Memory of Mary" was marked only in Palestine, but then it was extended by the emperor to all the churches of the East. In the seventh century, it began to be celebrated in Rome under the title of the "Falling Asleep" ("Dormitio") of the Mother of God.

Soon the name was changed to the "Assumption of Mary," since there was more to the feast than her dying. It also proclaimed that she had been taken up, body and soul, into heaven.

That belief was ancient, dating back to the apostles themselves. What was clear from the beginning was that there were no relics of Mary to be venerated, and that an



At the Council of Chalcedon in 451, when bishops from throughout the Mediterranean world gathered in Constantinople, Emperor Marcian asked the Patriarch of Jerusalem to bring the relics of Mary to Constantinople to be enshrined in the capitol. The patriarch explained to the emperor that there were no relics of Mary in Jerusalem, that "Mary had died in the presence of the apostles; but her tomb, when opened later . . . was found empty and so the apostles concluded that the body was taken up into heaven."

In the eighth century, St. John Damascene was known for giving sermons at the holy places in Jerusalem. At the Tomb of Mary, he expressed the belief of the Church on the meaning of the feast: "Although the body was duly buried, it did not remain in the state of death, neither was it dissolved by decay. . . . You were transferred to your heavenly home, O Lady, Queen and Mother of God in truth."

The Assumption is God's crowning of His work as Mary ends her earthly life and enters eternity. The feast turns our eyes in that direction, where we will follow when our earthly life is over.

The feast days of the Church are not just the commemoration of historical events; they do not look only to the past. They look to the present and to the future and give us an insight into our own relationship with God. The Assumption looks to eternity and gives us hope that we, too, will follow Our Lady when our life is ended.

Many Polish people associate the 15th of August with the Assumption of Mary Day ('Dzień Wniebowzięcia Najświętszej Maryi Panny') which is a Christian holy day well-known in Poland. However, the same day marks another celebration – the Polish Armed Forces Day ('Święto Wojska Polskiego'). It commemorates the Battle of Warsaw in 1920, also known as the Miracle on the Vistula ('Cud nad Wisłą') – Poland's decisive victory in the Polish-Soviet war. This holiday is celebrated annually, yet the 15th of August 2021 is said to have the most events ever.

This year is the one hundred fourth anniversary of the Miracle on the Vistula ('Cud nad Wislą'), one of the proudest moments in Polish history! This year's celebrations of the Polish Armed Forces Day are said to be bigger than ever.
