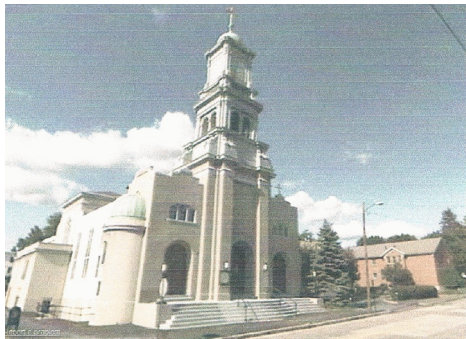

Scripture Insights

Today's first reading, taken from Jeremiah 20, relates one of the most difficult moments in the prophet's life. Overwhelmed by the opposition and resistance his prophetic ministry has aroused, Jeremiah accuses God of having tricked him when He called him to be a prophet. But even though Jeremiah's ministry has brought him such suffering, God's word is like a fire burning within him that he cannot extinguish but must proclaim.

Today's responsorial psalm, taken from Psalm 63, expresses Jeremiah's sentiments. Although afflicted and persecuted, he pines and thirsts for the living God: "My soul is thirsting for you,

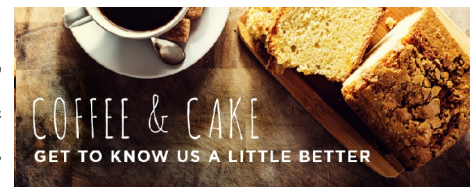

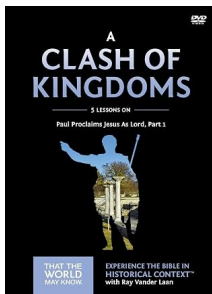

O Lord my God." As we sing this refrain, we are praying in the voice of Jeremiah and in the voice of Christ, both of whom longed for the Lord in the midst of their sufferings.

In the Gospel, Jesus prophesies that He will suffer, die, and rise again. But when Peter—who has confessed that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of the living God—hears this, he rebukes Jesus. How can God's glorious Messiah suffer such a fate? Jesus then rebukes Peter in turn for opposing His God-determined destiny. Peter is thinking about the Messiah as human beings do, not as God does. Those who follow Jesus must take up their cross and be willing to lose their life in order to save their life. Like Jeremiah, Jesus is deeply aware that his ministry will bring suffering and persecution. Like Jeremiah, he proclaims the Gospel despite the suffering and rejection it brings.

St. Paul teaches us a lesson about the Christian life that is similar to what Jeremiah and Jesus proclaim. To be "holy and pleasing to God," we must be ready to offer our bodies, our very selves, as living sacrifices to God. To do this, we must live in a new way with minds that have been renewed by Christ rather than conform ourselves to this present age that is passing away.

- Why does the Word of God cause Jeremiah such pain?
- What are similarities between Jesus and Jeremiah?
- What does it mean to long for God?

Practice of Faith

Jesus has some harsh words for Peter in today's Gospel, especially aimed at a friend reasonably worried about him! However, Jesus brings up an important point about how we think and view things—either with the mind of God or the mind of humans. This is underscored in the reading from the letter to the Romans, in which Paul exhorts his listeners to allow their minds to be transformed to think like God. This seemingly simple request is truly complex for people of faith.

- How do we think as God does, not as humans do? Where does the “mind’s eye” need to look in order to do so?
- For what or for whom could we pray specifically in our efforts to think more like God and more beyond our human limitations?
- What is Jesus asking you to risk in taking up your cross?

Questions

- In many ways, Jeremiah is tortured by his mission. He has been sent by God “To uproot and to tear down, to destroy and to demolish, to build and to plant” (Jeremiah 1:10). He loved his people but was considered a traitor by them as he pursued his mission. In light of this, what is your reaction to the passage we hear this week?
- Paul challenges people to be transformed through the renewal of their minds. What does he mean by this? Is this message still relevant? How? Why is this task critical for faithful followers of Jesus?
- Peter has just been called a rock; now Jesus chastises him and calls him “Satan.” Do you understand Peter’s horror? What is your reaction to Jesus’ admonition? What strengthens you to carry your cross?

Family Activities

- Using a study Bible, the public library, or the internet, find out more about the role of the prophets in ancient Israel. Consider how what you learn affects your interpretation of today’s first reading.
- What are the forces in this era that impede us from following Jesus? Make a list. Are you gripped by some of these more than others? How might you achieve “renewal of your mind” in addressing them?
- Sometimes it is easy to forget that following Jesus involves taking up crosses in life. What have your crosses been? What does it mean to carry a cross? Can those who follow Jesus avoid suffering? Write your thoughts in your journal.

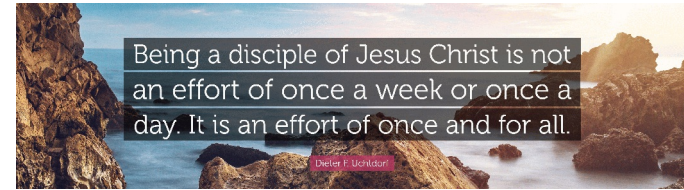

Hippolytus on Baptism

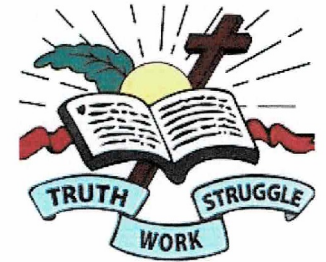

MANCHESTER, NH – The Manchester Arts Commission (MAC) announced



last week that local artists Hannah Gagnon and Kay Tucker were the winners of a poster contest celebrating Manchester's 180th and America's 250th birthdays. Both artists will have their work featured as part of the City's official celebration of these milestone anniversaries. Posters were printed in a limited run, and each is numbered and signed by the

respective artist.

Professionally printed posters will be available for sale for \$25 each, cash or check only. Posters may be purchased in the Manchester Economic Development Office, located on the first floor at One City Hall Plaza, during regular City Hall business hours and will be available starting Monday, August 24.

Posters will also be available at select events across the City, including the upcoming Final Friday on August 28 on Hanover Street from 4 to 8 p.m. as well as the Manchester Citywide Arts and Kids Festival Street Fair September 19 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Proceeds from poster sales will directly support the ongoing work and public art initiatives of the Manchester Arts Commission.

Held earlier this spring, the contest invited artists and graphic designers to submit original poster designs celebrating two historic milestones in 2026: the City of Manchester's 180th anniversary and the United States' 250th anniversary. The board sought work that captured the spirit and history of Manchester through bold and creative visual storytelling and encouraged submissions that reflected civic pride and cultural vibrancy.

Hannah Gagnon is a Senior Art Director and designer. Her work is influenced by a love of vintage design, hand-painted signage, and the character found in the visual language of everyday places.
