The Gospels agree on the major points of Jesus' passion and death but differ in perspective. Each evangelist had a different reason for telling Christ's story and each Gospel takes a different point of view. Luke's passion narrative highlights Jesus' obedience: the cross was God's will, and Jesus offered Himself freely to suffering and death.

Luke drew these themes from biblical traditions. Isaiah writes several times of a future "suffering servant," an innocent but persecuted man who will communicate a divine message. By trusting in God alone, the servant will overcome his suffering and redeem

humanity. Early Christians believed that Jesus fulfilled these prophecies, and Luke portrays Jesus as the suffering but obedient servant Who fulfills God's will.

This Sunday's second reading also contains a tradition that Luke probably knew. Many early Christians believed that Christ, despite His divine status, emptied Himself and chose a life of humility and suffering to save humanity. Jesus' self-emptying was done as a gift to the Father and results in His glorification and a sharing of freedom with all of humanity.

Throughout today's Gospel reading, Luke emphasizes Jesus' freedom in the face of betrayal, lynching, and an indifferent police state. In Luke's account, although several characters in the passion narrative make decisions that lead to Jesus' death, none of them has real power. By the choices they make, they take their place in a drama that has been unfolding since sin first entered the world. Jesus, by contrast, uses His freedom in the service of others. When he offered up His will in the garden, proclaimed to the high priest that He was the Son of Man, or asked God to forgive His murderers and receive His spirit, He freely chose what was right. He did this despite His suffering, and His choice to do so made this use of His freedom an example to the whole human race.

- Have you ever suffered for your faith?
- How can Christ's self-emptying inspire your discipleship?
- How can Jesus' gift of freedom help you overcome whatever holds you captive?

Practice of Faith

On Palm Sunday the liturgy begins with the faithful holding palm branches and the Gospel proclamation of Jesus' joyful entry into Jerusalem as the crowds sang, "Hosanna!" In the Liturgy of the Word,

the Gospel account details Jesus' arrest, trial, conviction, torture, crucifixion, and death on the cross.


- Walk and pray the stations of the cross this week, reflecting on your Lenten journey and the sacrifice Jesus made for us.
- Adorn your prayer space at home with a red cloth, palm branches, and a crucifix.
- Holy Week offers the opportunity to walk alongside our Lord from the garden to the cross. Approach these days as a week-long retreat. Make the necessary arrangements to participate fully in the liturgies of Holy Week and to prayerfully accompany our Lord.

Questions

- At Mass today we carry palms, remembering the ancient custom enacted in Jerusalem as the people laid down palms on the road to acclaim Jesus as the prophet from Nazareth. But in our hearts, what are we laying down to honor him?
- In what ways do we witness the sufferings of Jesus? How do His sufferings echo in our own lives? During moments of humiliation, how are we looking to the Lord God, who is our help?
- Do you ever feel as if you are abandoned by God? Do you cry out in lament when you find yourself in the midst of loneliness or despair? What words could you use?

Family Activities

- This week, spend some time thinking about people who, like Christ on the cross, are suffering the most desperate situations—torture, helplessness, and humiliation. On their behalf, in their voice, pray today's responsorial psalm (Psalm 22).
- Place the blessed palms that you receive at today's Mass on a crucifix in your home. If you do not have a crucifix, consider acquiring one, and put it in a prominent place.
- The disciples who were gathered in the garden with Jesus fell asleep, and He chided them for this. Consider spending some time in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament at the altar of repose following the Holy Thursday liturgy. Will you stay awake and give one hour to our Lord?



Don't Harden Your Hearts

We have all experienced it. When someone wants to dislike us, no matter what we do, it will be interpreted in the worst possible fashion. As we often say, "You can't win." When someone's heart is hardened already, you could be Jesus himself, and they will seriously see you as wrong, inferior, dangerous, and heretical—which is what is about to happen in Holy Week. At that point, no matter what evil a person decides to do to you, it will be deemed virtuous and praiseworthy by hardened or paranoid people in the hostile camp. "He is a terrorist!" they might say. Never having the humility or honesty to admit that to someone else, looking from a different perspective (which is deemed totally wrong), he probably looks like a sacrificial and dedicated freedom fighter. "I have my conclusions already, do not bother me with any new information that might make me change my judgment." Most Christians would probably be slow to admit that by these criteria almost all of us would have opposed Jesus. "This is not our tradition, he is not from our group, and he has no credentials!"

"God of perfect freedom, open spaces inside of our minds, our hearts, and our memories, so we can just begin to be free. Do not let me be hardened against anyone of your creatures, so that I cannot hear and respect their truth."


