Today's first reading from Proverbs is basically giving one basic command: be good to everyone. Look at the commands: be generous when you can. Don't be mean. Don't argue for no reason. Don't do evil things. For each of the commands there's no argument against them. It simply comes down to the question, 'will you be a nice person or not?'

Of course, just because these commands are *simple* doesn't mean they're *easy*. In fact, some of these would be the hardest commands we've ever experienced. How often, when a friend's asked me to do something, have I said, 'I'm a bit busy right now -

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can I get back to you tomorrow? The Bible's simple instruction is actually quite revolutionary; will we respond to these simple commands, or will we allow the temptations of laziness, selfishness and greed hold us back?

Today's Responsorial Psalm is a short but excellent psalm showing us the way to heaven. If we would be happy, we must be holy and honest. Imagine, if you will, a Christian person that one day is told by a friend that God had saved him and that he was now a Christian. The Christian excitedly responds that he too is a Christian. His friend responds, "Oh really, I didn't know that." The first person realized that his friend couldn't tell he was a Christian because he wasn't living like one. In Psalm15 David tell us what a Christian will look like so we will know one when we see one.

The excerpt from the first letter of John tells us that as God's children we can have confidence and a hope that we know that through God we have the victory. We do not fear death. We do not fear what others will do to us. We do not fear because no matter what people do to us they can never take our salvation.

The parable from Luke's Gospel is a story of great compassion coming from an unlikely source. Jesus certainly presents the injured man as a Jew, yet leaders among his own people--the priest and the Levite--refuse to help him. These two passers-by are religious figures, and their associations with the Jerusalem temple make them connected to the heart of Jewish identity and piety. The Samaritan who appears on the scene is out of place in Judea, on a road between Jerusalem and Jericho. Because most Samaritans and Jews held deepseated resentments against the other group, the compassion and actions of the Samaritan in the parable are surprising. He reflects the lengths to which love will go. He treats the injured man not as an enemy but as a neighbor, as one of his own.

The conclusion of the story is also important. Jesus does not ask the legal expert to identify who in the parable is *his* neighbor, as if that is what this man really needs to discover. Jesus asks him to identify who in the parable is "a neighbor to the man who fell into the hands of the robbers." The point is that the parable and Jesus' concluding question force the lawyer to consider the nature of neighborly activity. Jesus directs him to see neighborliness in the actions of the Samaritan and not to speculate about what might

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qualify a person to be considered someone else's neighbor. Since a *Samaritan* is the parable's model character, the legal expert conversing with Jesus must learn about genuine love from the example of a person he would regard as his enemy. Jesus has reframed the question that prompted the parable in the first place; instead of identifying who counts as a neighbor to be loved, Jesus indicates that a person truly acts as a neighbor through loving. The legal expert wants to know who deserves his love. Jesus replies by showing how authentic love will seek out, even in the unlikeliest of places, neighbors to receive compassion and care.

- When have I been confronted by a situation where a stranger needed assistance? How did I feel? How did I react? Was my action sincere, or self-gratifying?
- When have I ever done something good for another person without expecting anything in return? How did I feel about that?
- Have I refused to help a person in need? Why? How did this make me feel?

Practice of Charity

Everyone wants to be part of a caring church. One statement often heard from people who are searching for a church home is "We want a church where people really care about each other." I suppose it is also true that every church wants to be a caring church. However, caring churches are made up of caring individuals. If we are going to be a caring church, the kind of church that makes an impact on people, each of us must learn to care for others.

- When did you witness someone treating another person unjustly? Did you confront the situation? How did you feel? How did those involved feel? Did anyone else support what you said? Did it cost you anything to confront this person? What is your relationship with the individual now?
- Have I done all in my power to build a "Good Samaritan spirit" within my parish?
- How is love of neighbor a motivating part of my life? How does it take precedence over the other commandments?
- What kinds of "Good Samaritan moments" have occurred in the parish community in the past few months? What has been the result?

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Questions

 Has "helping others" forced the parish to interrupt its own plans, or caused a re-direction of resources? Has the community embraced these moments of helping or have they resented or rejected them?

Activities

- In what ways can the parish community be the "Good Samaritan" to the larger community? What current programs is the parish involved in to help those in need? What more can be done?
- Look at the needs current in your community. Develop a plan of meeting these needs and present them to the leaders of the parish. Work to increase your parish focus more outward than inward.
