In addition to "encounter and response," another theme that Luke highlights could be called the "great reversal." These themes were probably embedded in Jesus' original preaching, but they resonated with Luke's spirituality, and he emphasized them in his narrative. The theme of the "great reversal" came originally from Israel's prophets, who believed that human sinfulness had created a world quite the opposite of the one God intended, and that God would soon act to set things right. "This theme is also strong in Mary's Magnificat ("The hungry He has filled with good things; / the rich He

SEPTUAGESIMA

... is the ninth Sunday before Easter, the third before Ash Wednesday. The term is sometimes

applied to the seventy days starting on Septuagesima Sunday and ending on the Saturday after Easter. Alternatively, the term is sometimes applied also to the period sometimes called pre-Lent that begins on this day and ends on Shrove Tuesday, the day before Ash Wednesday, when Lent begins.

The other two Sundays in this period of the liturgical year are called Sexagesima and Quinquagesima, the latter sometimes also called Shrove Sunday. The earliest date on which Septuagesima Sunday can occur is January 18 (Easter falling on March 22 in a common year) and the latest is February 22 (Easter falling on April 25 in a leap year).



has sent away empty," Luke 1:53), but it appears throughout Luke's Gospel, including in his version of the Beatitudes.

The Beatitudes can be considered to be Jesus' vision statement. These short statements begin "Blessed are" and describe the life of someone who lives completely under God's care. Most Christians are more familiar with Matthew's version of the Beatitudes, which appear

in Matthew 5:3—12. Luke's version, in this Sunday's Gospel reading, is starkly different. These are shorter and also include a list of "maledictions" or woes: "Woe to you who are filled now, for you will be hungry" (Luke 6:25). It is no surprise that different versions of the Beatitudes exist. In addition to the fallibility of human memory, Jesus preached His message again and again, in every town and village He entered. He certainly varied his approach based on the needs of his listeners. Luke perhaps shows us how He proceeded when words of correction were needed, whereas Matthew gives us Jesus' preaching in those places where He needed to build up hope.

The second reading explains what is at stake when we live the Beatitudes. Jesus lived utterly dependent on God's grace, and this complete self-offering was the act of love that carried Him past death. When we, His disciples, live the same way, we too can catch a glimpse of the same eternal life.

- Have you encountered the happiness of God's care even in difficulty?
- What situation in the world can you help God reverse?
- How can you begin eternal life today?

Practice of Hope

Today's Scriptures paint a vivid picture for us. Our wellspring of hope, the Lord, is like a tree planted near running streams whose roots receive an eternal source of nourishment. So it is for us when we place our trust in God: hope will feed our hearts and enable us to bear the fruits of faith.

- Trust grows through time spent in a life-giving relationship. Nourish your hope in God by prioritizing time for prayer. Share with God what is in your heart and make space to listen as well.
- In what is called "the Sermon on the Plain," Jesus promises the blessing of hope for oppressed community members. Look to the Beatitudes as a litmus test. Take stock of where you fall among the "blessed" and those whom woe awaits.
- Plan one action you can take this week to ease the suffering of the needy in your local community. Donate groceries to the local food pantry; deliver a meal to a grieving neighbor; bring a supply of new socks and hand warmers to the homeless shelter.

distress because of the individual's hope in the Lord. Who do you know who has such hope? How has that person influenced you?

- The responsorial psalm sings that those who hope in the Lord are blessed. How has your hope in Christ transformed a situation?
- Those whom Jesus calls "blessed" are poor, hungry, weeping, and hated. Why would a person desire to be part of that group?

Family Activities

- All of the readings today refer to hope. Consider how hope in Christ has affected your life. Is there someone who would welcome hearing your story of hope?
- Read the Beatitudes in Luke 6:20–26. Do you know someone who is excluded and insulted because of standing up for what is right? Decide on a way to support that person. Perhaps you could write a letter stating the impression the person has made on you.
- Together, read the Beatitudes in Mark 5:3–12. Discuss how they are both similar to and different from the Beatitudes in Luke.






We Are God's Children Now

In the words of the apostle John, we are God's children now! Thus, wherever we are and whatever we are doing, God is with us in his Son. I truly appreciate the ways in which the accounts of the resurrection appearances in the Gospel beautifully and powerfully underscore this point. Jesus does not reveal himself in bold, dramatic fashion, with special effects that would be fitting for the Son of God raised in splendor. Rather he simply is present wherever his followers find themselves, like a locked room, on a road outside of town, in a cemetery, on the shores of the sea. Although the followers of Christ were sad, frightened, confused, and forlorn, Jesus cares so much about them that he shows himself attentive to everything they are experiencing because of his death on the cross. He is with them where they are, and that remains true for us today.
