Scripture Insights

Today's Gospel has two parts. In the first, we hear Jesus' intimate prayer to His Father. We listen as He praises the Father for revealing the mysteries of the kingdom, not to "the wise and the learned," but to His disciples who are the "little ones" of the kingdom. Jesus reveals that the Father has handed over all things to Him so that no one can know the Father except through the Son who reveals the Father. In the second part of the Gospel, Jesus invites those who are burdened to find rest in Him and to learn from Him because He is meek and humble of heart. His yoke—the message of the Gospel of the kingdom that He preaches—is easy

and light.

The reading from the prophet Zechariah prepares us to hear today's Gospel by describing the coming of a meek king who does not make his appearance on a powerful horse of war but on a donkey. This meek king—not a warrior king—will bring peace to the nations.

Today's responsorial psalm, taken from Psalm 145, is a song of praise and thanksgiving that can be prayed either in the voice of Christ, the humble King who praises God, or in the voice of the worshipping community that thanks God for the gift of this meek and humble King.

In the lectionary's semi-continuous reading of Romans, we have now come to chapter 8, in which St. Paul describes our life in the Spirit. The apostle teaches us that we are either "in the spirit" or "in the flesh." If we are "in the spirit," we live in the realm of God's Spirit. If we live "in the flesh," we will live in the realm of this world. Jesus, the meek and humble King described by Zechariah, is the preeminent example of what it means to live one's life by and in the power of God's Spirit.

- What do we learn about God from Jesus' prayer?
- What can we learn from the psalm about praising God?
- What are the burdens of your life?

Practice of Hope

These readings remind us that we are not bound by the demands, pains, and stress of our earthly reality. While suffering is a part of the human experience, the Gospel gives us hope that the burdens we carry are not forever; God desires to free us from what we carry and give us rest.

- In prayer, name your burdens: use your spiritual imagination to give them shape, and then imagine placing them at the foot of the cross and receiving a lighter yoke from Christ.
- As you move through your day or week, look with eyes of compassion on those you encounter: your family, neighbors, coworkers, fellow commuters, and so on. Before you react with impatience or frustration, consider what they might be carrying on their own spiritual "yokes," and re-frame your reaction.
- Take a moment to pray for them and invite the Holy Spirit to bring them some relief.

Questions

- The king who will come brings peace, banishing war and its accouterments. We remain a globe peppered with violence and conflicts. Even so, can you believe this promise?
- Reflect on the contrasts between flesh and the Spirit drawn by Paul. What does it mean to you to live as an embodied being, but be called to living the life of the Spirit?
- This Gospel has three parts. The first is a prayer, the second is an assertion by Jesus of who He is and His mission, and the third is an exquisite invitation. What does each section mean to you?

Family Activities

- Zechariah's depiction of the coming king is in stark contrast to the expectations of the people, who long for a conquering liberator. Think about these images and compare them to the description Matthew offers of Jesus' entry into Jerusalem.
- The final paragraph of the Gospel is a source of solace to all those in need of release from their suffering. Over the centuries, the most humble people have embraced Jesus with great enthusiasm. Is it easy for you to go to Jesus when you are suffering and in dire need? Why or why not? Write your thoughts in your journal.

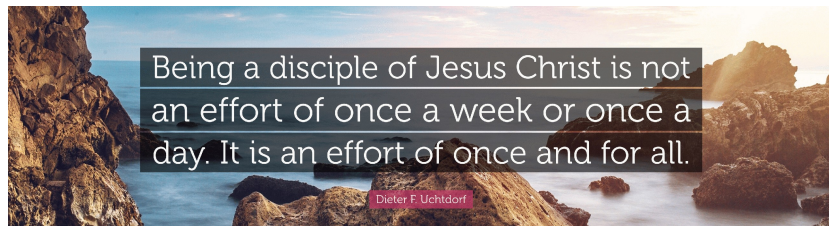

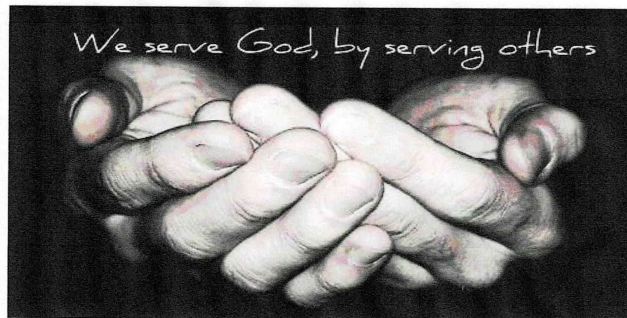
What Does It Mean to Be Sacred?

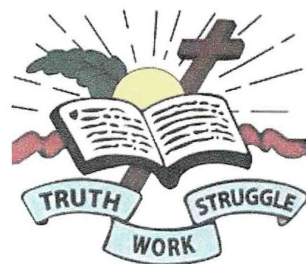
