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The reading from the prophet Amos begins with a strident warning to those who trample on the needy by inflating the price of grain and cheating when they weigh it in their scales (Amos 8:4—5). From God's enthronement on high, he looks down and keeps watch over the lowliest of his people. When the poor are trampled down, the Lord raises them up (Psalm 113:7).

In the reading from Luke's Gospel, Jesus tells a puzzling parable about a dishonest steward who is praised. The steward has squandered the property entrusted to him by a rich master and is about to lose his job.

SOUP FOR SENIORS



To save himself, the steward reduces the debts owed to his master. Instead of firing the steward on the spot, the master commends him. When Jesus interprets this as "[making] friends with dishonest wealth" (Luke 16:9), perhaps he is suggesting that the wealth entrusted to the steward was dishonest to begin with. After all, the steward's master is described as a rich man, a description that is never favorable in Luke's Gospel unless accompanied by acts of generosity toward the poor (as with Zacchaeus in Luke 19:8). Jesus ends the parable by declaring, "You cannot serve both God and mammon [wealth]" (Luke 16:13). The merchants in Amos have served their wealth and neglected God. Just as these merchants have destroyed the poor, God will bring about their destruction.

In First Timothy we find a different theme. Paul suggests that Christians should be leading quiet and peaceable lives "in all devotion and dignity" (2:2). Perhaps he worries about the reputation that Christians are already gaining in the Roman Empire as people who are turning the world upside down (Acts 17:6). He urges them to be good witnesses to the God "who wills everyone to be saved" (1 Timothy 2:4).

- Are there people today who trample the needy with their business practices?
- Do you agree that people who are trustworthy in small matters are trustworthy in great ones (Luke 16:10)?
- How can we offer prayers and petitions for people in authority today (1 Timothy 2:1–2)?

Practice of Faith

Amos describes a people who view religion as an inconvenience that gets in the way of making money. Like the steward in the Gospel reading, they profit by cheating the poor.

- It is difficult and sometimes impossible in a complicated global economy to detach our financial security from systems of oppression, but we must try. Learn about enterprises or institutions you contribute to that may exploit the poor.
- Some of our neighbors live in unimaginable distress imposed on them by systemic indifference. Pray to understand the daily needs and challenges of these people.
- To the best of your ability, work to bring attention to the plight of those living in distress, and to disempower economically unjust structures. There is always one thing we can do.

Questions

- What might we say to a preacher of our time who, in front of the entire assembly, would challenge the hearers in the same way Amos does in today's first reading? When have you experienced a prophet raising a voice to denounce injustice and oppression? How did it strike you? Change you?
- What valuable recommendations for Christian prayer do you find in the Letter to Timothy?
- Today's Gospel speaks about both honesty and prudence. How do



you distinguish between the two? What lessons do you take from the reading?

Activities

- Suggest that your parish celebrate Fair Trade Month in October by discovering more about this global movement that seeks to empower workers. Find out about the impact of fair trade at www.fairtradecertified.org.
- Contemplate stewardship. How do you share your time, treasure, and talent with your parish and your favorite charities? Pray about whether you could do more, using the refrain from today's responsorial psalm: "Praise the Lord, who lifts up the poor."
- This is the time of year when many farmers are harvesting their crops. Consider supporting local farmers by buying your produce at farmers' markets and pray for those who work on the land.



Love Changes Us

Love changes the way we know things. Love is not blind affection or mere satisfaction. Rather, love is the highest good that seeks and desires the highest good in another. To love is to know the good in another without questioning the good of the other or trying to understand the good of the other. The wise person is one whose knowledge is shaped by love and who sees the world through the eyes of love. Such a person lives from a deeper center within. Rooted in the heart, the wise person is rooted in the world and sees the world in its truth and beauty.

One sees from the center of the beloved; thus one sees the world unafraid of the vision. The wise person is one who has the freedom to remain empty in the face of encounter and to allow the experience of encountering the new, whether a new person, creature or idea, to enter one's life and change one's capacity to love.

Bridges of Love

Compassion requires a depth of soul, a connectedness of soul to earth, an earthiness of person to person, and a flow of love from heart to heart. To evolve toward the fullness of Christ we must be able to love the weak, the unlovable, the fragile, and lame. The Body of Christ becomes one when we ourselves create bridges of love. The compassionate person walks across the bridge into the life of another saying along the way, "you are not alone, I am with you."






