Scripture Insights

In the first reading, when the Amalekites attack Israel, the Israelites prevail as long as Moses keeps his arms raised. This isn't magic; it's not Moses or the angle of his arms that wins the battle. His upraised arms draw attention to the God who is giving them the victory. As the psalmist says, "My help is from the LORD" (Psalm 121:2). The psalm identifies God five times as the guardian of Israel: the One who guards them without ceasing.

In the Gospel reading, Jesus tells his disciples a parable for times when they might wonder whether God has stopped guarding them or

listening to them at all. A dishonest judge finally decides to grant justice to a widow simply because she keeps bothering him. Jesus insists that God is not like this judge: if even a lazy, dishonest judge will eventually render justice, how much more will God, who loves his people, bring speedy justice to those who cry out to him! The lesson of the parable is given before the parable even begins: to keep praying and not to lose heart.

When Paul writes his Second Letter to Timothy, reminding his younger coworker in the Gospel about the power of the sacred Scriptures to give wisdom, he refers to the Hebrew Scriptures —the Old Testament. These were the Scriptures of Paul and the first Christians, while the book later known as the New Testament was still being written. Eventually, Paul's words, including this very letter to Timothy, are also considered to be sacred Scripture. Paul reminds us that one of the goals of reading Scripture is to make us wise and competent, equipped for all kinds of good works in the world.

allows the Israelites to triumph over their enemies in the battle against Amalek?

• What kinds of good works does Scripture equip us for, and how?

Practice of Hope

In the parable of the widow and the judge, we learn nothing new about God, but much about prayer. Christian prayer is humble and constant. The widow is elderly, and like Simeon and Anna, who were the first to recognize the infant Jesus as the Messiah, she has learned about the rewards of a life of patient prayer and hope.

- Read theologian Richard Bauckham's poem, "Wait and See" https://artandtheology.org/2021/01/27/wait-and-see-simeon-a nd-anna-richard-bauckham/.
- Attend night prayer from the Liturgy of the Hours if possible, and if not, pray the Canticle of Simeon (Luke 22:29—32) at home every night this week
- Visit an elderly person who is isolated or a shut-in.

Questions

- In the first reading, Moses prayed, with support from Aaron and Hur, while Joshua led the army to victory against the invaders. What lessons does this story offer us?
- From the vehemence of Paul's charge to Tmothy toward the end of the second reading, what might we conclude about the importance of the proclamation of Scripture in our faith life?
- Who are the modern-day judges who are unmoved when the vulnerable cry out, "Render a just decision for me against my adversary"? Why do you think it often takes so long to arrive at justice? What does all of this say about the need for persistence in seeking justice?

Activities

- We learn in 2 Timothy 1:5 that Timothy owes his early formation to his grandmother, Lois, and his mother, Eunice. Give thanks for grandmothers and mothers who nurture the faith of their children.
- If you have not already, could you make a commitment to be persistent in your prayer and Scripture reading? Try to start this week, deciding on a realistic amount of time (15 minutes? 30



We remind all that All Saints Day (Saturday, November 1^{st)} and All Souls Day (translated to Monday, November 2nd) are rapidly approaching.




