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The readings begin with a lament. The prophet Habakkuk cries out to the Lord, "How long?" Habakkuk wonders how long God will allow violence, destruction, and conflict to continue. God answers him, telling His prophet that the time of God's saving action might seem delayed, but it will surely come. In the meantime, Habakkuk will live because of his faith—his faithfulness and trust in God even when God seems absent.

The psalmist complements Habakkuk's lament with a joyful song, in acknowledgment of God's salvation. Three times the psalmist invites the congregation, "Come!" and appeals to them not to harden

SOUP FOR SENIORS

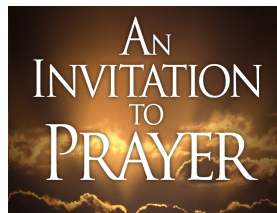

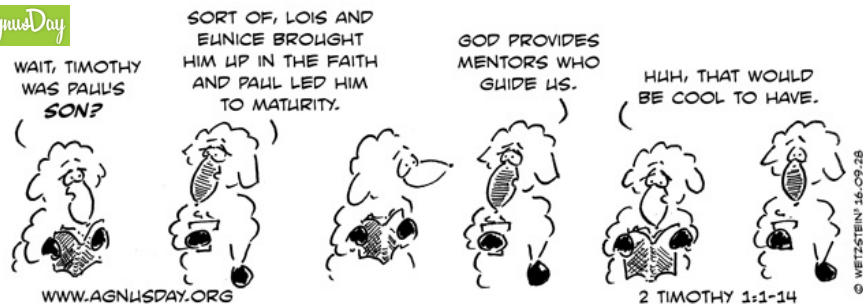

their hearts when they hear God's voice.

Paul writes to Timothy, his younger companion, to instruct and encourage him. He gives Timothy three tasks, but each task is paired with a prior gift of God. The pattern is evident: first gift, then task; first grace, then response. God has given a gift to Timothy, who should stir it into flame. With strength from God, Timothy must bear

his share of hardship for the sake of the Gospel. With the help of the Holy Spirit, Timothy will guard the "rich trust" of the teachings about Christ that Paul handed on to him (2 Timothy 1:14).

Habakkuk is told to have faith; the disciples ask Jesus to increase their faith. They ask this in response to Jesus' teaching that they must forgive a brother or sister who has sinned against them every single time that person repents of their wrongdoing, even if it happens seven times in one day. Jesus replies that they don't need more faith; even faith the size of the smallest of seeds is enough to literally move mountains. They already have what they need. Jesus gently chides them; they are not masters to be served, but servants who gratefully complete all the tasks their loving master gives them—including the task of forgiveness.

- Have you ever prayed, "How long, Lord?"
- What does it mean to "stir into flame" the gifts that God has given us?
- Why does Jesus say we only need faith the size of a mustard seed?

Practice of Faith

Like a seed, we carry within us the DNA to achieve the form for which God created us. But a mustard seed can only become a mustard plant; we must choose to grow ourselves into God's desire for us. It can be hard, and Jesus wants His followers to willingly undertake these hardships, rather than ask God to simply make it easier. Uphold your end of the relationship, Jesus seems to say in the Gospel; do the work God has asked of you to grow yourself to be the creation He intends you to be.

- Read the four verses that precede today's Gospel (Luke 17:1-4). What does Jesus ask of you that you may find difficult?
- Pray this week for someone you haven't been able to forgive.
- Donate money or other resources to Mustard Seed Communities (<https://www.mustardseed.com/about>).

Questions

- How many times have we cried out, "How long, O Lord? I cry for help, but you do not listen"? What words have you used to express yourself in dire circumstances? Why do you think God allows injustice to rain down between nations and peoples? How does Habakkuk instruct us on this?

- What evidence do you find in the second reading, from Paul's Letter to Timothy, for the ritual gesture by which Paul commissioned Timothy? What did the gesture seem to do or mean, according to Paul? In what ways is the Holy Spirit stirring up the gifts you have received?
- How do you interpret the Lord's response to the apostles' request for more faith? Is it the quantity of their faith that is the problem? If, in the parable about the servants, we think of the servants as disciples, what might this part of the reading be teaching us?

Activities

- On October 7, we celebrate the Memorial of Our Lady of the Rosary. How has praying the Rosary impacted your spiritual life? Consider adding the beautiful prayer the Angelus to your daily prayer patterns.
(Find it at www.ourcatholicprayers.com/the-angelus.html.)
- Look for the beloved song "Hail Mary, Gentle Woman," by Carey Landry. You can find numerous renditions performed on YouTube; and the lyrics can be found on the internet. Reflect on the text, and offer a prayer for all the women who are significant in your life.
- Today's first reading poses the sorrowful question, "How long, O Lord?" Is your prayer always one of praise and thanksgiving (such as today's responsorial psalm [95]), or do you also avail yourself of the psalms of lament (such as Psalms 12, 44, 60, 74, 79, 80, 83, 85, 90, 94, 123, 126, and 129)?
