Without water, living things die. In places like ancient Israel where water was scarce, it becomes a symbol of life itself. Several biblical prophets deepened the symbolism and used the phrase "living water" to symbolize God's presence and power. This is the background for this Sunday's Gospel reading.

Today's first reading equates water and life and God. Having miraculously crossed through the sea, the Israelites now find themselves wandering in the desert with no sources of water nearby. They fear death for themselves, their children, and their livestock. They also question whether God's power could overcome such intense



thirst. Their doubt is clear in the last line, "the Israelites quarreled there and tested the LORD, saying, 'Is the LORD in our midst or not?" When God provided them with water, it became an enduring symbol of human and divine life.

This Sunday's Gospel builds on this tradition. Elements in this episode foreshadow the crucifixion. The encounter happens "about noon," a phrase that appears again when Pilate condemns Jesus to death (John 19:14). The water Jesus promises the Samaritan woman reflects the water that flows from His side on the cross (John 19:34). The living water He speaks of is the divine life He shares with the transcendent God. It became available to all humanity as a result of His passion and resurrection. In Jesus, the effects of this water are His unshakable faith and His freedom to give His life for His friends. Such commitment and freedom are just the beginning of the gifts He offers to disciples who share His life.

Paul hints at water imagery when he talks about the Spirit as the love of God that has been poured into our hearts. This is the same abundant life that Jesus promises to the woman at the well. This remains His gift to all disciples who place their faith in Him and live with the same love.

- What symbolizes life for you?
- Has God's life ever given you confidence in moments of fear or suffering?
- Whom do you know who needs to drink from Christ's living water?

Practice of Hope

The Samaritan woman offers an example of discipleship as she opens herself to a personal encounter with Jesus. Immediately after the encounter, the woman shares the Good News with her community

- Invite someone struggling on their faith journey to join you at Mass this Lent.
- For these next three Sundays, parishes celebrate the scrutinies, which uncover the sins from which the elect, and all of us, long to be freed. What sin hinders you from freely living and sharing your faith?
- Keeping in mind Tuesday's celebration of the Annunciation, attend to the messengers that God sends to you and mirror the courage of the Samaritan woman to pass on the Gospel.

Questions

- What meaning do you take from God's Name "I am Who am," and what do you think it means when Moses tells the Israelites that "I am" sent me to you?
- In what ways are you trying to be like the description of God in today's responsorial psalm: merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in kindness? In what ways could you try to pardon others as the Lord pardons us?
- How do you prepare yourself to celebrate the Sacrament of Penance? Do you use an examination of conscience? Do you do a review at the end of each day? Do you rely on the promptings of the Spirit to tell you where you need forgiveness?


Family Activities

A Sense of Community

The hunger for meaning and the need for hope in this deconstructed society cannot be satisfied by merely private choices. This is a real blind spot for most liberals. The issues are too big and we cannot stand alone against such a dominant cultural collapse. Corporate evil can only be overcome by corporate good. For this reason, and many others, I'm very happy to see the growth of small groups in church and in society. As I have said since the early days of the New Jerusalem Community in Cincinnati, we cannot think ourselves into a new way of living; we must live ourselves into a new way of thinking. It is lifestyle choices that finally change us and allow us to see in new ways. We have to create structures and institutions that think, and therefore act, differently. We have no past evidence to prove that gospel individuals alone can fully exemplify the Reign of God. This is the church's own form of individualism, while it often condemns individualism in the world. Until we question our very lifestyle, nothing truly new is going to happen—or, as Jesus said in a perfect metaphor, if we put "new wine into old wineskins," both will be lost (see Mark 2:22). That's a rather clear statement about the need for gospel structures to support gospel individuals. Up to now, we have largely tried to evangelize individuals while the structures have remained monarchical and unaccountable. "Put new wine in fresh wineskins, and both are preserved" (Matthew 9:17).
