Scripture Insights

A leper is considered unclean and forced to experience a kind of social death (Leviticus 13). When a leper comes to Jesus for help, his words, surprisingly, express an uncertainty not about Jesus' ability to heal, but about Jesus' desire to help him. Some ancient manuscripts have Jesus, therefore, being moved with "anger" rather than "pity" in Mark 1:41, because this leper's experience of religion and society has caused him to doubt Jesus' commitment to meet human needs and to enable human wholeness. 



The Cause of Our Joy

Christian joy is not simply a superficial feeling of heightened delight or the emotion accompanying extreme pleasure. It does not necessarily depend upon one's immediate circumstances or fortune, as taught by Saint Francis's example. It does not ignore or deny the troubling reality of indifference, hopelessness, or disappointment. Christian joy lies beyond the realm of feelings and emotions. It is a fundamental disposition and stance toward life. Descriptive metaphors for it abound: It is the knowledge that having praved and surrendered. God hears the hopes and desires of my heart and will respond in a timely, appropriate way. God is my shepherd and I must trust God's heart. Joy feeds on the fact that God stands watch over every situation in my life and guides me with rod and staff. My joy sometimes bubbles up, sometimes surges up, from the rock-bottom certainty that the finger of God is somehow present in every tragic or trivial event. Joy is the oasis residing in the confident conviction that the waters of God's loving care and concern never run dry-not even in the desert. The gratuity of grace is always unending and never expiring. Joy is rooted in the reality of a stone door rolled back from its tomb. Sowing seeds of joy amid sadness requires the two fundamentals of soul training: prayer-invoking assurance and confidence that God is looking out for us-and action-a servant's surrender and acceptance of consequences without clinging to fears, attachments, control needs, and a sense of entitlement. Both prayer and action plant a servant's feet in the footprints that lead beyond the tomb of Lazarus and the cross of Calvary.



His good will, Jesus cures the leper specifically through touch (Mark 1:41), even though touching a leper may risk sharing a leper's uncleanness and marginalization.

Jesus then tells the cleansed leper to "say nothing to anyone," but to show himself to the priest and, "as a testimony," to follow the law's prescription for a purification (Mark 1:43—44; see also Leviticus 14). By committing the leper to silence, Jesus is clearly seeking to contain testimony about His own identity. He would prefer that the testimony be about the coming of God's reign (Mark 1:15). Jesus is focused on making the work of God known rather than making himself known. Paul is not mistaken when he tells the Corinthians in today's reading that they will be emulating his imitation of Christ if they seek to glorify God and not their own advantage.

Surprisingly, the leper ignores Jesus' command to keep things silent. Because of this, Jesus' movement is restricted: He has to remain "in deserted places" (Mark 1:45). Just as John baptized in the desert (1:2–4) and Jesus was tested by the devil in the desert before beginning His public ministry (Mark 1:12–13), perhaps God's movement can only be forged at the margins.

- In what ways might the Church have caused people to question God's commitment to human wholeness and flourishing?
- How may we demonstrate our solidarity with those who have been marginalized?
- Why are creativity and change often found at the margins or among the marginalized?

Practice of Charity

In Jesus' day people with certain skin conditions had to live apart from the community, which only added to their suffering. Imagine being someone in such circumstances.

- How do you take care of your basic needs? Do you form relationships with others who have similar ailments? How do healthy people treat you?
- Who in your community might feel outcast or lonely because of a physical disability or a mental illness? Do such people make you feel uncomfortable? Ask Christ to cleanse you of whatever keeps you from treating others with dignity and love.
- After Jesus heals him, the leper doesn't return to his former life. Have you changed because of the good things God has done for you, or have you returned to your usual way of living? As Lent approaches, consider what you can do to live more fully "for the glory of God" (1 Corinthians 10:31).

Questions

- Have you seen others in your life—friends, family members, coworkers—experience forms of exile?
- Have you ever experienced being an exile within your own home or community? Why? How did you feel and where did you turn?
- Have you ever prayed with earnest faith for God to remove some affliction from your life? How was your prayer answered?

Family Activities

- List what you've observed from your own experience as the most common reasons for the experience of exile among teens, family members, and coworkers.
- Find thirty minutes to talk with someone you sense is feeling "unclean" or unwanted and unloved. As best you can, perhaps without saying the actual words, communicate God's love to him or her.
- Paul urges us to imitate him as we imitate Christ. Think of someone in your life you respect enough to want to imitate. What is the chief characteristic you admire? How can you emulate this person?


