#### Scripture Insights

Our Markan passage today alludes to Jesus' resurrection. Although the lectionary text begins with movement, the biblical passage from which the reading is taken starts with a temporal reference ("After six days," Mark 9:2), and ends with repeated references to being risen/rising "from the dead" (Mark 9:9, 10). Peter, James, and John not only witnessed Jesus' transfiguration (Mark 9:2), they also saw Jesus raising Jairus' deceased daughter (Mark 5:21-24, 35-43).





#### A New Portrait of God

The godly deeds of the Peace Prayer illumine a new portrait of God. In a world made gloomy by the image of a warrior God or a vengeful God or a picayune God, godly deeds are incarnations of "the Father of lights" (James 1:17). Helping the elderly neighbor with grocery shopping, accepting someone despite his or her lifestyle, deciding to recycle, valiantly ministering to the sick during a pandemic, contributing to a charitable organization, encouraging someone with a pat on the back, and refusing to strike back in violence all witness to how God uses his instruments and servants to express and reflect the divine care, concern, and compassion for creation. God is the source of all deeds of light, and his vibrant presence mysteriously glistens behind them. Godly deeds also illumine the familial relationship we share with one another. We are family—brothers and sisters to one another. "But if we walk in the light as [Jesus] is in the light, then we have fellowship with one another..." (1 John 1:7). Following in the footsteps of the Lord and Divine Master is never a solitary affair. In the Peace Prayer, we pray to sow light in the midst of darkness. That light comes from the flame of faith that has illumined our paths since the day of our baptism. The Peace Prayer reminds us to brighten the lives of others with deeds that manifest our familial bonds as children of a loving, forgiving God who, in the words of Francis of Assisi, is reflected in Brother Sun.



The Old Testament Scriptures promise that God will send a new prophet who is like Moses or like Elijah (Deuteronomy 18:15; 34:10; Malachi 3:23), so their appearance and conversation with Jesus may point to Jesus as that promised prophet. The presence of Moses and Elijah can also be seen as referring to a coming prophet because there is no tomb for either of them, so their appearance speaks again to the resurrection.

In Mark's telling, Peter proposes to build "three tents" because he is terrified (Mark 9:5—6). Peter's response to Jesus' first passion prediction in Mark's Gospel caused Jesus to rebuke him and address him as "Satan" (Mark 8:31-33). Just as Peter's earlier folly did not disqualify him from seeing Jesus' transfiguration, this mistake will not result in his abandonment.

Instead of speaking nonsense out of fear, Peter should "listen" to what Jesus tells him (Mark 9:7): namely, Jesus' prediction of His death and resurrection (Mark 9:9—10). As Peter's failure in Mark 8 shows, the way of the cross is difficult to accept, but death must come before resurrection. This may also explain Jesus' command for silence, including in this passage: Peter, James, and John are not to say

anything about Jesus' transfiguration until after Jesus' resurrection. Otherwise, Jesus might be mistaken for one who comes in glory and power without the cross.

- What would the way of the cross mean today?
- What do we as a Church tend to say or do out of fear and terror?
- In what ways could we be following a Christ without the way of the cross?

#### Practice of Hope

Jesus' sudden transformation bewilders His closest disciples, who would be able to make sense of it only after Jesus' resurrection.

- What memorable experience of God have you had? How has your understanding of that moment changed over time? How does that moment sustain you during diffcult times?
- Once the disciples understood what Jesus' transfiguration meant, they might have recalled it when they needed the strength to persevere in the face of adversity. Spend time in adoration of the Blessed Sacrament this week. Gaze upon Christ, who gave himself for you and intercedes for you.
- Abraham acknowledges that Isaac, like all of God's promises, is a gift, undeserved and unearned. Consider all that you claim as yours. Do you have something that someone else needs? What would it cost you to give some of what you have away?

#### **Questions**

- Paul confidently asserts that nothing can separate us from God's love, but sometimes things can prevent us from recognizing and feeling His love. When do you find it hard to recognize God's love?
- The story in the first reading, sometimes called the binding of Isaac, has troubled and confounded many over the centuries. What is the most difficult aspect of the story to accept?
- Jesus was deeply steeped in the history of His people, symbolized here by Moses and Elijah, who represent the law and prophets. What aspects of your history do you understand best? Who in your ancestry helps you understand yourself better?

#### **Activities**

- Write down your five greatest fears. Then, next to them, write how Jesus can be the antidote to each one.
- Has anyone ever substituted for you by taking the blame or accepting a responsibility that should have been yours? In fewer than 300 words, write the story of how that person stood in for you and accepted your fate.
- Make a sign to post in some corner of your home or apartment that reads, "Mount Tabor." Try to reserve that area as a place to go when you need an experience of God's awesome, overwhelming presence. Make sure you spend time there at least once a week.
