Scripture Insights

It is best to read today's Lukan passage with the verses preceding it that announce the birth of John. The angel Gabriel's parallel pronouncement of a miraculous birth provides a significant contrast: the miracle of Jesus is a type of miracle that God has never done before. As God has done for Sarai and for Hannah in the Hebrew Scriptures (Genesis 17:15-21; 18:9-14; 21:1-3; 1 Samuel 1:1-20), God will enable yet another married woman (Elizabeth) who has not been able to conceive to finally become pregnant (Luke 1:8—25). The




What delicious treat will our seniors enjoy this Sunday?

miracle of a woman who is a virgin conceiving, however, does not exist in the Hebrew Scriptures. Not only is the miracle announced to Mary greater than the one announced to Zechariah, it is new. Our passages from the Old Testament this Sunday portray God's

faithfulness to keeping God's promise while the concluding passage from Romans 16 emphasizes God's power and wisdom to bring about God's command and purposes. The birth of Jesus as the promised messiah can be read as affirmation of what these other passages suggest about God. Just as God took David "from the pasture and from the care of the flock to be commander of my people Israel" (2 Samuel 7:8), God, through Gabriel, pronounces "favor" upon a young woman in a small agrarian town of Galilee to send us the messiah. Just as David's life was upended, Mary's life changes dramatically.

One must not forget, however, what this unwed pregnancy may mean for Mary. This "favor" from God inevitably brings her ridicule and, possibly, social ostracism. Is Mary too young to know or anticipate the implications of this pregnancy? Can Mary refuse this "favor" from a powerful angelic being who represents an even more powerful God? Or is she counting on Gabriel's assurance of God's favor and presence with her (Luke 1:28)?

- How has your life been changed by divine interruptions that you did not expect?
- How have you experienced God's faithfulness and presence during this season of Advent?
- What is the difference between doing something in submission and in resignation?

Practice of Faith

Each reading recalls the promises God has made and fulfilled, from providing an heir to King

David to the salvation of all nations in Jesus Christ. Often God seems to fulfill these promises

in unexpected ways.

- Slowly read through the Gospel passage. Imagine that you are Mary hearing this news or that you are the angel delivering it. Ponder a part of this story that you have not considered. Spend some time renewing your wonder at God's promises.
- Look closely at your life. In what ways has God surprised you? How have you responded? Have you always noticed God's surprises?
- If you can, share your faith in God's unexpected love by offering to help someone with childcare, housework, or the preparation of a meal.

Questions

- Has God ever given you a "red light" like he did to David in the first reading? What were you trying to do? How did God show you that you were moving in the wrong direction?
- When is the last time you were expected to obey someone? Think about your feelings surrounding the experience. Did the person have a right to your obedience? Did you give it freely or with reluctance?
- In the face of the unknown, would you be able to say, "Let it be done to me" as Mary does (Luke 1:38)? Is Mary's assent remarkable, or just what people in the Bible do? Have you faced a situation where you had to trust that God would make things come out right?

Activities

you to do.

- Play word association with the word "obedience," and list the responses on a board or newsprint. Count the words with positive connotations and words with negative connotations. Which list is longer? Discuss contemporary attitudes toward obedience.
- Trusting God often requires overcoming fear. With at least one other person, try to name the fears that hold you back from doing all you think God is calling
- Pick a day during the coming week to keep a record of the number of times you have to make a decision or take action without knowing what the outcome will be. Be attentive to your feelings about embracing the uncertainty. Does prayer enter the equation at any point?






God Dwells with Us

The simple yet profound mystery of the Incarnation is this: The Word of God became flesh and made his dwelling among us. Scripture scholars tell us that this phrase in John's Gospel literally translates as "pitched his tent" with his people. Like God's presence in the Ark of the Covenant, as the Chosen People traveled through the desert, so now God would come to earth as a vulnerable but graced infant, getting the same start in life that each and every one of us has. Our God wants to be with us wherever we are. No dwelling is too lowly, no circumstances too humble. St. Francis recognized this when he created the first live nativity scene at Greccio: a cave, some animals, a deep faith in God's promise.

And tradition tells us that he held the baby in his arms during the Mass. We probably celebrate hospitality more at Christmas than we do at any other time of the year. We host parties, we attend parties, we revel in food and drink and presents. We also open not only our hearts but our wallets to those in need. It's a blessing to be able to do this. Maybe this is the year that we decide to carry this spirit of hospitality forward into the rest of the year, to become God's sentinels of hope. God comes into our lives, into our homes, into our world every day in many different disguises. Pope Francis reminds us that Christmas calls us to be on the lookout for this manifestation of the divine. And if God wants to dwell with us, we better be willing to open our doors to him.
