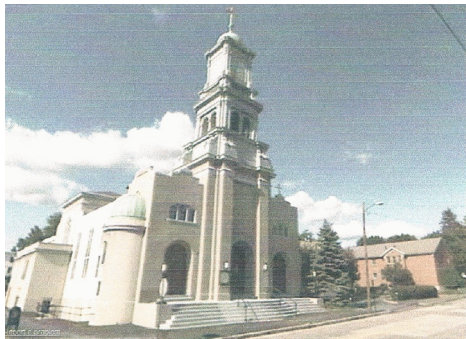

Scripture Insights

Today's first reading prepares us to hear what Jesus will proclaim in the Gospel, namely, the Word of God always achieves the purpose for which God sends it. Just as rain and snow water the earth and make it fruitful, so God's Word produces the goal for which it was sent.

Psalms 65 celebrates the goodness and providence of God who sends the spring rains to water the earth for a bountiful harvest. The response that we sing today, however, celebrates the bountiful harvest of the Word of God: seed that falls on good ground will yield a fruitful harvest." As the Gospel will teach us, the seed signifies the

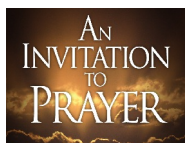

message of the kingdom that Jesus proclaims.

For the next three weeks, we will read from Matthew 13, a chapter in which Jesus delivers a number of parables about the kingdom of heaven. The section of the chapter we hear today has three parts. In the first, Jesus tells a parable about a farmer who scatters seed that falls on different kinds of ground. While the words of the parable are clear, its meaning is not. So, in the second part of the Gospel, Jesus explains why He speaks in parables to the crowd: their hearts are hardened and so the mystery of the kingdom is hidden from them. Finally, in the third part, Jesus explains the parable to His disciples whose hearts are ready to understand His word. The seed is the word about the kingdom that He preaches. The different kinds of ground are the various ways the message of the kingdom is received.

In the reading from Romans, St. Paul describes our new life in the Spirit. The whole of creation, he teaches, is waiting for the glory that

will be revealed when we are raised from the dead. For, when we are raised into Christ's resurrection life, creation itself will achieve its purpose and share in the salvation that Christ brings.

- Why is the mystery of the kingdom revealed only to Jesus' disciples?
- What prevents people from receiving the Word of God?
- How is God's Word achieving its purpose in your life?

Practice of Faith

Listening to Jesus' parables is an important experience for people of faith; we can look at our faith through a new lens and be reminded of the challenge of the Gospel. On each hearing of the parable of the sower we can find ourselves focused on a different seed landing in a different place. We are reminded that our hearts are the ground for the Gospel to take root, and our lives the space where the rooted seeds blossom and flourish.

- Reflect on Jesus' analysis of the parable. What kind of soil do you find your heart to be right now?
- Consider your faith journey so far. How would you categorize the soil of your heart then and now—perhaps compared to when you were younger, or to different chapters and milestones of your life?
- What are some ways you can cultivate more fertile ground in your heart? In the hearts of others?

Questions

- Isaiah reminds us that God's Word is showered on us as naturally and productively as water in the form of rain and snow. Is your heart open to receive the words of this great prophet? What place does God's inspired Word have in your life?
- Paul reminds us that we are given the "first fruits of the Spirit." Offering the "firstfruits" is a spiritual practice of many ancient religious traditions, including Judaism and Christianity. In the Middle Ages, this was adapted by the Church into the tithe, or the giving of one tenth of one's goods. What does offering "firstfruits" mean to you?
- The kingdom parables of Jesus are profound glimpses into our relationship with God and God's work. This seemingly pastoral

story would have been quite challenging to both the disciples and the listeners, who would each be called to ask themselves, "Who am I in the story?" This week, reflect on this question and your spiritual disposition at this point in your faith journey.

Family Activities

- Isaiah describes poetically how God's Word gives life. Think of a time when God's Word brought life to you—when it actually stimulated an important action or brought you a foundational insight. Talk about this experience with a friend or write about it in your journal.
- Paul says that "all creation is groaning" as we wait for "the redemption of our bodies." Think of a song, a poem, or other work of literary or visual art that seems to capture this experience of "creation groaning." Reflect on it and share the insights with someone.
- Jesus uses agricultural parables throughout His ministry. Spend some time in a garden this week, either in care or appreciation.

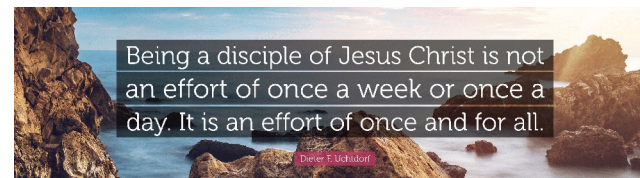

Sow Seeds of Peace

The Peace Prayer indicates that if we spend a lot of time in front of the mirror staring at ourselves, we will never enjoy peace. We will continue to be chained to our fears, attachments, control issues, and sense of entitlement. Or we will go through each day seething with resentment. Or, even worse, we will constantly be throwing a pity party and feeling very much alone and isolated. Following the example of the Lord and Divine Master, like Saint Francis, we too must clear an interior space and empty ourselves for peace to blossom within our lives and the lives of others.

The Peace Prayer envisions us as farmers in the world. Like our Divine Master, we create an interior space by emptying ourselves of fears, attachments, control issues, and the sense of entitlement. We look beyond the pain others inflict upon us and refuse to strike back in violence. Indeed, we beat the swords of our hearts into plowshares and the spears of our souls into pruning hooks (see Isaiah 2:4). As instruments, we then ask for the grace to actively till the earth and sow the seeds of peace while waiting with great anticipation for the harvest of justice.
