



psalm, when God comes to rule the earth, he comes with justice and equity, and even the rivers and mountains receive him with joy. All creation groans along with us for redemption (Romans 8:19—22).

In Paul's second letter to the Christians in Thessalonica, Paul refers to the work that he, Silvanus (also called Silas), and Timothy did among the people of the Church there. He points out that they had the right to be fed or paid for their labors, but they chose instead to work for free. Some in the community, it seems, have become unwilling to do their own work and contribute to the life of the community. Second Thessalonians is mostly concerned with correcting misconceptions about the day of the Lord and the second coming of Christ. Some Christians in Thessalonica seem to have simply stopped working to await Christ's imminent coming. Paul scolds them and tells them to get back to work; they can "work quietly" while yet awaiting Christ's return.

In the Gospel reading, Jesus refers to the coming destruction of the temple as a sign that the old age is dying and the new age is being birthed: the sign of the coming day of the Lord. The point is not to look for the signs in our world today; the point is not to be terrified and to persevere even under persecution (Luke 21:9, 19).

- Why did Paul, Silvanus, and Timothy choose to work for free as they planted and nurtured the Church in Thessalonica?
- In the Gospel reading, what does Jesus say will happen to his disciples in the time after his death?
- Do you fear or hope for the "day of the Lord"?

Practice of Hope

If you're of a certain age, you likely know the song by the band R.E.M. with the chorus, "It's the end of the world as we know it, and I feel fine." The point of today's Gospel is not fatalism or fear, because God determines the goal of time, and fear comes not from dread of end times but from dread of not being included in God's goal. In a way, it's like the song says: At the end, as children of God, we should feel fine. Not a hair on our head will be destroyed if we are steadfast in faith and hope.

- Read some hopeful news about the world—many good things are being done every day by ordinary men and women.
- Pray against the temptation to fall into despair
- Donate money or other resources to victims of a natural disaster.

Questions


- In what ways are we trying to rid ourselves of the qualities in us that would make us "stubble" so that we can bask in the "healing rays" of the "sun of justice"? How is the Lord, even now, coming to rule the earth with justice in our own time?
- From today's second reading, what can you tell about the kind of teacher and leader Paul was? What seem to be his methods of spreading the Gospel?
- In today's Gospel Jesus seizes the attention of his listeners and of us with his dramatic predictions of great conflicts and persecutions. For you, what is the key teaching or point of this Gospel?

Family Activities

- In what ways does your parish make itself a hospital for sinners and not a museum for saints? Talk with a fellow parishioner or write in your journal, brainstorming some ideas for inviting the poor into your buildings, giving them hope, and helping them fulfill it. (Out of such daydreams realities sometimes grow.) What role might you play in such a plan?
- This Sunday, pay attention to the refrain sung for the responsorial psalm: "The Lord comes to rule the earth with justice." The melody will probably come floating back to you during the week. Read the psalm from your Bible in the mornings and use this refrain as a sung prayer during the week.
