This week, the Church takes a break from the normal cycle of Sunday readings to return briefly to Jesus' infancy. The Feast of the Presentation of the Lord is the final act in the Church's celebration of Christmas. It commemorates the fortieth day after Jesus' birth, when his parents brought him to the temple to offer the customary sacrifices.

Throughout Luke's Gospel, it was most important that a disciple be ready for Jesus' appearance and then respond with faith. This was



not easy; by Jesus' day, Israel had waited for an anointed savior for over five hundred years. Despite that delay, the sense of expectation had grown stronger over time. In Luke's mind at least, this growing hope was the Spirit's work..

Simeon is a personal example of this anticipation. Although he was elderly, he had waited in faith and had been guided by the Spirit. Now Jesus had arrived, but in a way that normal eyes could not see. Luke does not tell us by what clue the Spirit guided Simeon's awareness, but years of faith-filled expectation had given Simeon an unusual sensitivity to the work of God. Despite Jesus' humble appearance

(Mary and Joseph made the offering reserved for poor families in Leviticus 12:8), Simeon knew exactly whom he held in his arms. That this child was the Savior was as obvious to him as the arrival of the Lord in glory, as recounted in today's first reading. In Simeon's response, which many Christians still recite as a prayer before bed, one can hear joy, a sense of relief, and hope for a very different world.

Christians today are called to the same expectation and response. Christ arrives in countless elusive ways every day. A life spent in faith-filled expectation can give our hearts a sensitivity that reveals God's subtle presence in all its glory.

- What evidence do you need to know that Christ is present in your life?
- How do you respond when Christ's presence is manifest?
- How can you reveal the light of Christ to others in your life?

Practice of Faith

Today's feast commemorates the occasion that Mary and Joseph bring Jesus to be presented to the temple in Jerusalem in accordance with Jewish law. The Gospel includes a prayer offered by the temple elder, Simeon, as he holds the infant Jesus in his arms. Simeon's prayer is the basis of the Gospel canticle for night prayer called the *Nunc Dimittis* (meaning "now dismiss" or "let go").

- Include Simeon's prayer in your night devotions as you close your day and begin your rest.
- The Feast of the Presentation of the Lord is celebrated with candles (it used to be known as Candlemas) because of Simeon's recognition that in the person of Jesus, God has given us salvation, "a light for revelation to the Gentiles, / and glory for your people, Israel" (Luke 2:32).
- On February 8, the Church celebrates the optional Memorial of St.
 Josephine Bakhita, who as a child was kidnapped, enslaved, and
 trafficked. In her spirit, make a gift or advocate against human
 trafficking.

Questions

• Think about the process of refining. In what ways is your spiritual journey a process of refining? What elements of nature are refined

in this text? What does this convey to you?

- In the psalm, we encounter Israel's vision of God as a mighty king. This is one of many metaphors for God. What does it evoke in you?
- The Gospel paints a vivid and touching picture. A young family follows Jewish law and comes to the temple to consecrate their son. There, they meet two elders of great righteousness and faith. The message the family receives is startling and powerful. With which of the characters in this story do you identify? Why?

Family Activities

- Listen to the sixth movement of Handel's Messiah, "Who May Abide the Day of His Coming." Although originally written as an aria for an alto (a woman), it is usually performed by a bass (a man). What does this musical setting convey? Does it elicit the same or a different reaction in you when compared with the written text?
- Journal about an elder or ancestor who saw great things in you when you were small, perhaps a grandparent or a teacher. Stay present to their optimism and hope.

Living in the Present

Much derails us. Noise, distraction, an inability to say no, an inability to have boundaries for a healthy self. Our internal worrier will continue to pester us: "What's the secret? How do we actually practice it?" But that is the enigma, isn't it? Life turns left and does somersaults when we least expect it. So, we juggle and we multitask. And we want someone to give us the answers. We want someone to balance it all or give us the list. Living in the present, fully alive and wholehearted, is not a technique. There is no list. And chances are, we pass by life—the exquisite, the messy, the enchanting, the untidy, the inexplicable—on our way to someplace we think we ought to be. When life

throws us a curve that makes our present moment loom larger than anything else, we learn to shift our focus. There is meaning—consequence, value, import—only when what we believe or teach touches this moment. In other words, it's the small (and specific) stuff that really does matter. Belief is all well and good, but there has to be skin on it—something we touch, see, hear, taste, and smell. The ordinary really is the hiding place for the holy.

To stand still is to practice Sabbath—meaning literally, to rest. To stop. To savor uncluttered time. To be gentle with yourself. And yes, to waste time with God. The bottom line? I'm no longer chasing what I assume will fill empty spaces in order to make me something I am not. Replenishment begins here: "I am enough." In our Western mindset, living in the present becomes a staged event—staged to be "spiritual," as if this is something we must orchestrate or arrange. No wonder we sit stewing in the juices of our self-consciousness ("Am I present? What am I doing right or wrong?"), all the while missing the point.


