After fueling up with some food, sojourners gathered Wednesday to hear the proclamations presented by state Sen. Richard A. Kasunic, Fayette County Commissioner Vincent Vicites and Jim Schilling of the Yough River Trail Council on behalf of Connellsville Mayor Thomas Duncan.

"We're very proud of what we have here in the Yough corridor," said Kasunic.

The river sojourn is good for tourism in the county, Vicites

added. "The Yough contributes to the scenic beauty and ecology of the area."

Today the canoers will paddle the 14 miles from Whitsett to Sutersville, with a stop at Cedar Creek Park for lunch.

And on Saturday, the group will bicycle 15 miles from Sutersville to Boston for a "Boston Tea Party," then canoe to McKeesport for a celebration of the sojourn's end.
