

Dial C for Collins

I first came across the Collins-Connect initiative three years ago, I am not sure how. I think it was the visual of the two flags of India and Australia gently coalescing into each other at the fly ends that caught my attention. I was then looking at the Anglo-Indian connection across the two countries, and was delighted to see that it was celebrated so strongly by one family: the Collins family, which had its roots in the city of Madras. I recall saving that visual on my Desktop with the intention of using it in a typescript of mine on the Anglo-Indian community. Little did I know then that I was an offspring of the same family.


All I was aware of was that my maternal great-grandmother was Mabel D'Souza, and that she was buried in the St. Patrick's Cemetery at St. Thomas Mount, behind the grave of her daughter, my grandmother Nelly Telles. As far as the *Collins* was concerned, it was a name I had always held in awe, because to me it denoted musical genius. I had read about Milton Collins and his band (which held sway in Madras during the 1940s-60s), I had heard Aileen Collins' mellifluous voice as she sang *altos* in the St. Patrick's Church choir along with my spouse-to-be, I have admired her son Alan D'Cruz's wizardry with the clarinet, and more recently, I have swooned each time Mary Collins (now a Dumenil) took to the stage, as she sang *Whisky Lullaby* or *No One Needs to Know*. I hadn't realized that she played the piano too. I had also watched online, along with my wife Zeena, the Christmas Carols session by the entire Collins clan in Melbourne last year and we were thrilled beyond measure to listen to some of the carols that sounded so graceful yet forgotten so fast by today's world. So it came as a shock to me when it was brought to my notice that my great grandma Mabel's mother Adelaide was a Collins, and that I should consider registering for the annual Collins Connect event to be held on the 31st of October 2021. I felt like the black sheep (as I couldn't differentiate a sharp from a flat in music), but I gladly did.

But there was no music on offer that day. Perhaps the vocal cords were being fine-tuned for the Christmas carol sessions scheduled for the 12th of December. Or perhaps there was just enough time for the sentimental chords to find expression. One Collins was just glad to see another on the 'virtual' platform, no matter if they were perched in Madras or Melbourne or London or Auckland or Toronto or if their surnames had changed somewhere down the line to Jeremiah or Biggs or Dubier or Jasmy. There was a great deal of bonhomie (and sometimes cacophony) as family members small-talked with one another, checked if their cousins were hale and sane and hearty, condoled the loss of loved ones, complimented those who got engaged or tied the knot or produced a baby Collins or celebrated a jubilee. Rebecca Conaghan updated everyone on the family news from London, including the fact that her mum Mona Dubier had recently turned 95 and was blessed with her 17th great grandchild. Maureen Borthwick spoke softly but got everyone's attention with her quip that her husband Gordon was camera-shy and hence couldn't join the jamboree.

I have a special fondness for Uncle Gordon and Aunty Maureen because it was they who took marriage counseling sessions for Zeena and me before we took the dive. We do not know if we may touch a diamond jubilee like them, but we've passed the silver thanks to their words of wisdom many moons ago. It was heartwarming to see that the Borthwicks had a Collins connection. Other pleasant surprises were in store. I used to frequent the Benham home in San Thome during my late teens, not knowing that they trace their lineage to Peter Collins. The Fletchers was a name I had heard of as being a prominent musical family of Pudupet, and it was nice meeting them on Collins-Connect. Then there was Miriam Collins, whom I recognized belatedly as the better half of Dominic Rosario who had handled the live-streaming of my mum's funeral service in September. A fine couple indeed! And lots of 'new' names and faces and even nationalities could be seen on the Meet that just added colour to the mélange called Collins-Connect. There was the fun quotient too with the camera spotting Sharlene with her plate of idlis and pork vindaloo, highlighting Dean Borthwick who masqueraded as a pirate with an education and of course catching the irrepressible Barry Collins off-guard while he was at Victoria Market, who for a few moments seemed to have forgotten himself as he kept using words like kauchi and kosru as though he was shopping at Jam Bazaar. When someone asked him what happened he replied in a daze that he was searching for Bernard as he wanted to serve up some cowheel at his housewarming. He switched off his phone with a wink after everyone had had a good laugh. Unfortunately, David Selvey wasn't around to take up the banter.

Sheldon D'Silva did his best as emcee to channelize the energies of the assortment of Collins in attendance, and thanks to a quiz, a tête-à-tête between Liam Heldt and his mum Sharlene, a slide show of anniversaries and occasions in the family by Charis Rouse and chat room interactions, succeeded. There was not a dull moment, even when Jarryd Fernandez read out the accounts or Lizzie Thomas proposed the vote-of-thanks at the end. For me and my sister Nicola, it was our first Collins outing, and by the end of it, understood that our great-great grandmother Adelaide Fernandez was the third child of Joseph Collins and Cecilia Daly who had married in 1873. I looked up the family tree, so assiduously worked out by Karen Collins (daughter-in-law of Milton Collins), Corrine Collins (daughter of Henry Collins) and others on their team, to find that they had gone beyond their grandfather Victor Collins, to as far back as 1812, the year Joseph's father Paul was born. I also took a closer look at Mabel D'Souza's monument soon after All Soul's Day and found that she was buried in the same grave as her mum Adelaide Fernandez who left this world in 1948. I knew that the name Adelaide rang a bell. Just didn't know that she was a Collins, and therefore part of a truly kaleidoscopic heritage. Collins-Connect my dears, is not just about genealogy, but

genealogy in colourful motion. May the C-tribe increase!






