THEMES AND CONCEPTS



George commits suicide because of his enormous self-loathing. But now he is something he despised even more, a ventriloquist dummy.

He must figure out how to get out of this thing and continue ending his life.

To his further dismay, he is stuck with a needy, talentless ventriloquist whom he detests. This amateur is his only path to freeing himself from this world.

Ultimately, he will need to learn that he can redeem himself. He can atone for those he discarded in life. And he can still love himself.

It's never too late for redemption.

THE TRANSFORMATION

After George commits suicide, he believes he is experiencing an out-of-body experience that must be typical of dying. He waits for his soul to float upwards. He looks around the room. Cracks some jokes about his former body. He feels great and is enjoying the moment, until he sees movement in a mirror and realizes he is the puppet.

He screams for help. A person rushes in and sees the dangling corpse – and the talking puppet. The sight of a talking doll causes the person to have a heart attack and drop dead.

A second person rushes in. Sees both the dangling stiff and the other body on the floor. The puppet tries to explain, but the second person also suffers a panic attack and drops dead.

When a third person arrives, the puppet keeps his trap shut.

He doesn't want to hurt anyone, but he does need help.





Tone

DONNY is a dark comedy with heart.

The supernatural event in the story is singular. Otherwise, the world is the same as ours.

But no one can know about the supernatural situation – just like the personal secrets we all keep.

George handles the discovery of his supernatural torture with the same wry cynicism of Phil Conners in Groundhog Day.

The film takes dark subjects like suicide and lifelong family grudges seriously as it playfully toys with their stubborn absurdity.

The humor emerges from painfully awkward moments created by vitriolic relationships.



SETTING

The setting is lower middle-class suburbia.

It's placed in Wisconsin for the cold unwelcoming gray skies of late autumn and winter. These working-class characters struggle to survive in a post- American Dream acceptance.





RELATIONSHIPS

The characters are bound together by necessity.

George/Donny needs Vinnie, and later Franny, as a caretaker to physically carry him through his journey.

Vinnie needs George as the brains behind his suddenly successful comedy act.

But more importantly, they discover they are pulled together for a deeper reason...

because they are father and son.



REASONS FOR WRITING DONNY

My father was an enormously talented musician, blessed with a divine singing voice that melted listeners instantly.

As a child I was enamored by my dad's singing and wanted to be just like him. This may have come from my need to connect with him. His music career seemed far more important to him than I did.

Even with his divine gift, he never succeeded as a musician. He struggled internally against self-worth. This only distanced him from me further. He left the family, emotionally first, then physically.

He let himself go. Gave up on life. And any relationship with his son.

In April 2020, he died.


DONNY is my fantasy of him realizing his mistakes. Realizing my need for his neglected love and guidance. Maybe he would have an epiphany after his death.
