# **April Meeting Summary**

Deb DuFresne, talked about rider position and how it affects the horse. She had 4 "stations" for people to work at, with assistance from Deb. The first station was a large ball which the rider sat on and practiced moving her pelvis in different directions. The second station was a yoga mat on the floor and the rider was to sit on the mat, legs stretched out in front or bent, so that feet were not on the floor and then the rider had to walk forwards and backwards, just using her hips to create the movement. The third station was a block where the rider had to step up and down, holding her hands as if they were holding reins. The fourth station was simply standing and Deb helped every rider pull her chin in, without tipping up or down, to keep the head straight above the shoulders.


All these exercises were very helpful and eye-opening, as they all seemed simple but were quite difficult to coordinate.


# A review of Pole Work for Dressage Riders by author Ann Katrin Querbach (copyright 2020, translated into English 2023)

When you need to know about pole work, Reiner and Ingrid Klimke come to mind. They have written several books and articles on pole work and one of my favorites was a reprint of the 1977 classic <u>Cavalletti</u> (by Reiner Klimke). Unable to find my own beloved copy, I turned to Amazon to replace it.

Although my heart was set on <u>Cavalletti</u>, I discovered <u>Pole Work for Dressage Riders</u>, by Ann Katrin Querbach who is a riding instructor with the German Riding Federation and author of <u>50 Best Arena Exercises and Patterns</u>: <u>Essential Schooling for English and Western Riders</u>. Although there were no posted reviews of the book, I decided to take a chance on it anyway, an easy gamble for \$26.95 (or in horseman's terms: the price of a 2 string bale of O & A).





Querbach uses lovely photography and diagrams of pole layout to support her writing throughout the 11 Chapters in this book. In the first 28 pages, the author introduces the topic by describing the benefits of pole work and touching on proper alignment of both horse and rider, a theme she continues to lightly weave in throughout the book. From there, she layers the next 9 chapters by gait and difficulty, covering riding poles on straight and curved lines, different heights, angles, combinations and concludes with a chapter titled "Changes in Tempo".

There are things that I really value about this book:

First, as a riding instructor, Querbach's "teacher" voice comes through in her writing as she blends a review of proper riding technique within her explanation of pole work. Secondly, the author introduces and explains multiple facets of pole work such as addressing "falling in, falling out" and how to use cavalletti as a tool to strengthen both the horse and rider. Third, throughout the book the author includes "side notes" and "solutions to problems" that I felt useful check points and informative segues to include.

There are things I found challenging about this book:

Although the book covers a lot of information, it felt a bit disjointed or lacking at times. The "Solutions for Common Problems" sometimes appear out of sequence with the chapter topics. Secondly, the book introduces a lot of information but lacks follow through. For instance, there is a brief mention of lunging with side reins over poles but no discussion on the proper way to use them. Thirdly, there is no discussion of an actual training plan or suggested frequency for pole work. Lastly, the book is, for the most part, translated very well but there were occasional places where it lacked fluidity (or perhaps just needed more explanation to communicate a point effectively).

The author references her other book in a few places (which is a personal pet peeve of mine) but you do not need to read her other book to find this book informative.




