

The Modern Thanksgiving



In America there are few holidays with as much American history attached to the celebration as Thanksgiving. It has its roots based in the feast shared by the Pilgrims and the Wampanoags at Plymouth Plantation in the fall of 1621. Like that celebration more than 400 years ago, a big meal is the centerpiece of the holiday and its tradition. But what most people now don't realize is that America has not celebrated Thanksgiving every year since that first feast. In fact, the nationwide celebration of that day came LONG after the fact. The origins of our current holiday can be traced to two people with very different motives: Abraham Lincoln and Sara Josepha Hale.

After the first Thanksgiving there were periodic days of Thanksgiving, but they were declared locally, weren't all in the fall and most did not really celebrate that original meal and its importance. After our country was formed, George Washington declared two national days of Thanksgiving and James Madison declared one. It's unclear whether any of these harkened back to the original Plymouth meal. They appeared to be days of Thanksgiving, but not necessarily related to what our ancestors had done. That would come much later.

Shots Fired Incident on Nicholson Street/Park Avenue



On November 17, 2022, at 7:17 PM Clinton Police Officers were dispatched to a shots fired call in the area of Nicholson Street and Park Avenue.

When officers arrived in the area, they discovered a power pole had been struck on Park Avenue by a grey in color Dodge Charger and shell casings lying in the roadway on Nicholson Street. Information gathered so far, indicates the victim, J'Daques Wallace 21 YOA, was operating a grey Dodge Charger and traveling east on Nicholson Street. A second vehicle, described as a light in color Chevy Camaro, began chasing him and firing shots toward his vehicle while traveling on Nicholson Street toward Park Avenue. While making a left turn onto Park Avenue to get away from the suspect vehicle, the victim's vehicle left the roadway and struck the power pole where the vehicle came to rest.

While processing the scene Detectives discovered that the residence of 402 Park Avenue was struck by the gunfire, residence was unoccupied at the time of incident.

There were no injuries reported at the time of incident.

Detectives with the Steet Crimes Unit are following up on leads in the investigation. 

pleading her case for the need for a national Thanksgiving holiday, but never received the desired response until 1863.

Abraham Lincoln had been sworn in as President in 1861. Nothing about his presidency had been easy. After he was elected, but before he even took office several states seceded from the United States in large part due to fears of what actions Lincoln would take regarding slavery. What they didn't know and Stephen Oates' excellent book, With Malice Toward None sets out in great detail is that Lincoln's top priority as President was holding the country together. That was his top priority in the Civil War as well, win the war in such a way that the United States ultimately stayed together.

So, in 1863, when Hale wrote yet another letter to Lincoln extolling the merits of having a national Thanksgiving holiday celebrating that 1621 meal, she found a receptive ear. The Union had recently won several major battles and the war was going well for his side. Lincoln was looking for ways to bring the country together not only during the war, but also after it ended. This was not just a war between the States. There were people with loyalties on both sides within the States and even within families as well. A holiday that celebrated the country's common origins and featured a big meal to bring families together looked very appealing to Lincoln. So, Lincoln issued a Presidential Proclamation declaring the last Thursday in November in 1863 as a day of Thanksgiving. Lincoln was so pleased with the result that he did the same thing in 1864. We have had Thanksgiving on a Thursday in November ever since.

As for Hale, it is her writings that influence how we celebrate Thanksgiving even today. There was likely no Turkey on the menu at the first Thanksgiving but guess where roasted turkey was featured prominently. In the writings of Hale on how the holiday should be celebrated. So, if modern Thanksgiving can be said to have parents, they would definitely be Abraham Lincoln and Sarah Josepha Hale.

Pregnancy Care Management Program Offered At Sampson County Health Department

The Sampson County Health Department offers a Prenatal Program, Pregnancy Care Management Services –CMHRP. The Program has recently undergone a name transformation and is now referred to as Care Management for High-Risk Pregnancies – CMHRP. The Program was developed by the North Carolina Division of Public Health and the North Carolina Division of Medical Assistance and is designed to assist pregnant women with Medicaid eligible and non-Medicaid eligible who have priority risk factors to achieve a healthier pregnancy. Pregnancy Care Management serves Pregnant Women with Medicaid eligibility or non-Medicaid eligibility who have a priority Maternal Infant Impact Score (MIIS) associated with preterm birth, low birth weight or other risk factors.

Medicaid Transformation to Managed Care become effective as of July 1st, 2021. Key objectives for Medicaid Managed Care are to show improvement in health plan per-

NC Medicaid Managed Care and will also provide additional specialized services for individuals with significant behavioral health conditions, Intellectual/Developmental Disabilities, and traumatic brain injury.

The criteria for providing services to both Medicaid eligible and non-Medicaid eligible clients are the same; therefore, Pregnancy Care Management staff will ensure both populations receive the same high level of care management services and care.

Pregnancy Care Management services are provided by nurses and social workers with a focus on patient need and risk status. The type and frequency of patient contacts are determined by the patient's individual needs and plan of care in order of effectively meeting desired outcomes.

Prenatal care providers may refer patients for CMHRP services by completing the Pregnancy Risk Screening Form at the initial prenatal visit, in order for early identification of risk factors. If the pregnancy risk screening form is not utilized when making the referral, the Pregnancy Care Manager will contact the patient to assess for the presence of priority risk factors. Some priority risk factors include but are not limited to:

- Hypertension
- A history of spontaneous preterm labor
- A history of low birth weight

• Unsafe living environment (homelessness, inadequate housing, domestic violence, or abuse)

- Substance Use
- Tobacco Use
- Antenatal hospital utilization

Services are available to any woman with Medicaid who lives in Sampson County, regardless of where she goes for prenatal care. Pregnancy Care Management staff receives a referral and contacts the person for follow-up care. Any medical provider or agency that works with pregnant women can refer clients. Clients that have any of the above risk factors and are interested in the program can also contact the Pregnancy Care Management staff.

The Pregnancy Care Management staff provides the following services:

- Follow-ups on prenatal care issues and other clinical needs.
- Work with OB Providers and others who provide services to the pregnant woman to make sure everyone is aware of her concerns and needs.

• Provide education regarding: the need to keep all prenatal-related appointments; understanding and following the OB provider's instructions; and the importance of getting postpartum care.

• Arrange/assist with the transition from the OB Provider to a primary care medical home as needed for the woman after delivery if she remains or becomes eligible for Medicaid after the postpartum period.

The Pregnancy Care Management staff assist with 17P treatment program. 17P is a

formance, health care quality, and outcomes. Members are identified for the CMHRP Program through referrals made by Health Plans for prenatal women that are deemed priority patients. Care Management for High-Risk Pregnancies is provided as a benefit for health care services covered by Health Plans. Members are encouraged to become familiar with the standard and value-added benefits made available through the Health Plan they are enrolled with. Medicaid Recipients were enrolled in either one of the six Health Plans:

- Healthy Blue
- Carolina Complete Health
- WellCare
- United Healthcare
- AmeriHealth Caritas
- NC Medicaid Direct

Tailored Plans, originally scheduled to launch December 1st, 2022, has been delayed until April 1st, 2023. Tailored Plans will provide the same services as Standard Plans in

series of weekly injections offered to women who have had previous preterm labor and/or deliveries. The purpose of the injections is to help prevent preterm labor with the current pregnancy. Services provided are:

• Educating the client/family on 17P and its purpose

• Assisting the patient in arranging to receive 17P injections and follow up when an injection is missed

Effective and ongoing communication and collaboration between the Pregnancy Care Manager and the 17P patient's prenatal care provider is a key component of the program. The overall goal of the 17P program seeks to improve birth outcomes by reducing the rate of preterm birth, which is measured by rates of low birth weight and very low birth weight, in addition to other indicators.

BUSINESS, FARM/ AGRI-BUSINESS & OTHER **PERSONAL PROPERTY**

PROPERTY TAX RELIEF PROGRAMS

Elderly or Totally and Permanently Disabled Exclusion:

North Carolina excludes from property taxes the greater of twenty-five thousand (\$25,000) or fifty percent (50%) of the appraised value of a permanent residence owned and occupied by a qualifying owner. A qualifying owner is an owner who meets all of the following requirements as of January 1 preceding the taxable year for which the benefit is claimed: 1) Is at least 65 years of age or totally and permanently disabled.

2) Has an income for the preceding calendar year of not more than Thirty three thousand eight hundred (\$33800). 3) Is a North Carolina resident. Income is defined as all moneys received from every source other than gifts or inheritances received from a spouse, lineal ancestor, or lineal descendant. For married applicants residing with their spouses, the income of both spouses must be included, whether or not the property is in both names. Disabled Veteran Exclusion: This program excludes the first forty-five thousand dollars (\$45,000) of the appraised value of a permanent residence owned and occupied by a North Carolina Resident, who is an Honorably Discharged Disabled Veteran, or the unmarried surviving spouse of an Honorably Discharged Disabled Veteran. A disabled veteran is defined as a veteran whose character of service at separation was honorable or under honorable conditions and who has a total and permanent service-connected disability or who received benefits for specially adapted housing under 38 U.S.C. 2101. Contact the Sampson Gunty Tax Office for specific details and applications. Circuit Breaker Property Tax Deferment: This program allows taxes billed each year to be limited to a percentage of the qualifying owner's income. However, taxes in excess of the limitation are deferred and remain a lien on the property. The three most current years of deferred taxes prior to a disqualifying event will become due and payable, with interest, on the date of the disqualifying event. Age 65 or older, with an income not exceeding \$50,700. You must file a new application for this program each year. Contact the Sampson County Tax Office for specific details and application. Application time period for property tax relief programs is January 3, 2023 to June 1, 2023.

From the Vine – Thanksgiving

It's hard to believe that it is already fall and the holiday season is upon us. The holiday season is my most favorite time of the year -a time to gather with family and catch up or reflect on the previous year. According to the Statista Research Department, Thanksgiving and Christmas are the most popular holidays in the United States. According to a survey conducted in 2021, Thanksgiving had a popularity rating of 81 percent, followed by Christmas with 77 percent. The poll indicated that the spirit of Thanksgiving is one of family, friends, love, being grateful and, last but not least, fabulous food. The holiday is a favorite for so many people because it isn't focused on presents or extravagant decorations – it's about sitting down for a delicious meal surrounded by friends and family. The holiday gives us time to reflect on our lives, appreciate what we have, who we are, and where we are right now. Lastly, it gives us the time and opportunity to be thankful.

Thanksgiving became an official holiday on October 3, 1863, first declared by President Abraham Lincoln. The holiday is modeled on a 1621 harvest feast shared by the English colonist and Wampanoag people. That feast featured poultry, venison, fish, vegetables, and fruits. Our Thanksgiving feast today features some of these same foods. You will typically find turkey, chicken, ham, dressing, sweet potatoes, cranberry sauce, mashed potatoes, green beans, corn, and pecan pie on our Thanksgiving tables. In the early Thanksgiving celebrations, people either hunted or gathered their own food. Today, a quick trip to the local grocery store supplies all our needs and more. But where does all this food come from?

Sampson County is ranked the number 1 county in crop production and the number 2 county in livestock production in North Carolina. We are the 20th ranked county in the United States in total agriculture production. 53% of our workforce is employed in some type of agriculture endeavor, and 93% of our farms are family-owned farms. Much of the food that you will see on your table originates in our home county.

Sampson County farmers grew 7.2 million turkeys and 40 million chickens in 2021. Poultry production is predominantly a vertically integrated system in Sampson County. Production companies (integrators) contract with growers to produce birds or eggs. In general, the integrator supplies the birds, feed, medications, and other necessities of growth. The grower builds and maintains the houses, installs and maintains equipment, handles daily flock management and welfare, and disposes of dead birds and waste. It typically takes 6-7 weeks to grow out chickens and 20-24 weeks to grow out turkeys.

Sampson County farmers grew 1.9 million hogs last year, which may show up at your Thanksgiving feast in the form of ham. Hogs are also grown using vertical integration similar to the poultry model with your local farmer providing housing, maintaining equipment, handling herd health, and disposing of waste. It typically takes 22-26 weeks to grow out hogs.



Sampson County is the number 1 county in the nation for sweet potato production. In 2021 Sampson County farmers harvested nearly 300 million pounds of sweet potatoes from our fields. The main sweet potato variety, 'Covington' was developed by the NC State sweet potato breeding program at the Horticulture Crops Research Station in Clinton in 2008. 'Covington' is a farm favorite due to its yield and grade, storage ability, taste, and nutritional analysis.

Dressing, or stuffing is typically made with some type of bread or bread crumbs. Bread's main ingredient is wheat, and Sampson County grows a lot of it. We rank 5th in NC in wheat production, and harvested over 675,000 bushels in 2021.

The sweet corn on your table may have also originated from Sampson County. Sampson County farmers planted and harvested 228 acres of sweet corn in 2021, making us the #2 ranked county for sweet corn production. There are many different varieties and colors grown in Sampson County by local farmers.

Where did the pecan pie come from? Well, maybe they originated from Sampson County as well. Sampson County was ranked #1 in tree fruit production in 2017. Since that time, many small pecan orchards have begun to produce pecans across the county.

It's amazing when you think of everything our local farmers grow in Sampson County. Almost the entire holiday feast can be traced backed to Sampson County, and maybe one of your neighbors' farms. Make sure when you are giving thanks or reflecting on all your blessings this holiday season, that you remember the hands that helped to provide them. James Lamb, one of my favorite local farmers from Sampson County may have said it best when he said, "In America, unlike some other parts of the world, we don't wake up every morning wondering how we are going to eat. Instead, it's a matter of what we want to eat. That's because our farmers work hard and are dedicated to providing people with healthy, safe, and abundant food."



fresh cranberries sugared cranberries rosemary sprigs whipped cream

To make cranberry compote: In medium saucepan, bring cranberries, brown sugar, orange juice and orange zest to boil. Lower heat and simmer 10-15 minutes, or until most cranberries burst. Remove from heat. Cool completely at room temperature then transfer to bowl; refrigerate.

To make crust: Preheat oven to 350 F. Butter 8-inch springform pan and line bottom with parchment paper. Set aside.

In medium bowl, mix cracker crumbs, butter, brown sugar and salt. Press crumb mixture into bottom of prepared pan. Bake 15 minutes. Remove from oven and set aside. Reduce oven temperature to 325 F.

To make cheesecake: In bowl of electric mixer fitted with paddle attachment, beat cream cheese at medium speed until smooth. Add cane sugar and beat 2-3 minutes. Scrape sides of bowl as needed. Add flour, vanilla and salt. Beat 1 minute until incorporated.

Add one egg at a time, mixing until incorporated. Add sour cream and mix 1 minute. Scrape sides of bowl as needed. In medium bowl, mix half of cheesecake batter with 1/2 cup cranberry compote.

Wrap springform pan with aluminum foil and place in large roasting pan. Pour cream cheese and cranberry mixture into prepared pan. Top with remaining cream cheese batter. Place roasting pan in oven and add hot water to 1-inch of springform pan. Bake 1 hour, 15 minutes, or until cake looks set in center. Remove from oven and rest 1 hour. Refrigerate in pan overnight.

Decorate cake with fresh and sugared cranberries, rosemary springs and whipped cream.

- 3 cloves shallots, diced
- 4 large kale leaves, finely chopped (discard stems) 2
- pounds red potatoes, sliced 1/8 inch 2 ounces gruvere cheese, grated
- 1 ounce Parmesan cheese, grated

Heat oven to 325 F.

In small saucepan over medium heat, combine cream, salt, black pepper, garlic and thyme; stir constantly, until cream starts to bubble, 4-6 minutes. When bubbling, remove from heat and stir until slightly cooled. Let cream sit. Heat large (12-inch) oven-safe skillet over medium-high heat.

Add butter. When butter melts, add shallots and kale leaves. Saute until kale is tender and bright green, about 4 minutes. Turn off burner.

Add sliced potatoes to skillet, fanning over top of kale.

Use slotted spoon to remove garlic and thyme from heavy cream. Pour heavy cream over potatoes.


Cover skillet tightly with foil and bake until potatoes are tender, 75-85 minutes.

Remove skillet from oven and turn on broiler. Discard foil. Sprinkle gruyere and Parmesan cheeses over potatoes, tucking some cheese between potato slices.

Return skillet to oven and broil until top is golden brown, 5-6 minutes.
