Greg Warren Coming Home



"I've always been a patriotic person, and this is a way for me to serve my country, my state and my community." That's how Newton Grove's new Chief of Police explains his motivation for working in law enforcement. "I want to be a good mentor like the kind of mentor I had growing up on West Grove Street."

"I didn't know it at the time because I was so young," adds Warren, "but Mr. John Hayes was the one who inspired me to want to be a police officer. Growing up on West Grove there was always several kids in the neighborhood, and Mr. Hayes would clock us on our bikes to see who was the fastest." Warren say Hayes was "community policing" before it was ever a concept.

Warren also has another long-standing relationship with Newton Grove police. His grandfather, Elasta Smith was one of Newton Grove's first police officers. "I just want to help people in general," says Warren. "If I can touch just one person for the better, my career has been worth it."

It was the summer of his sixth-grade year at Hobbton Elementary that Greg left Newton Grove. His father, an educator, was leaving Union High to become the principal at Louisburg. Mike and Cecelia Warren packed up the family and headed north. Greg, along with his brother Michael and sister Sherri left the small town they new as home. "You've heard of a military brat, I was an educator brat," jokes Warren. "But I'm grateful because it has given me the chance to make a lot of new friends and see the outside world "

The Warren family have all served the community in their own ways. Greg's father Mike ended his career in education serving as Interim Superintendent of Sampson County Schools. Greg's brother, Michael Warren was recently named Principal at Hobbton High School. And Greg's wife Tracy is a Nurse Supervisor.

As for the job, Greg states this is THE JOB he's always wanted. "Some people work to move up the ladder, or

Legislative Recap

Joint Legislative Program Evaluation Oversight Committee Report This week, two Program Evaluation Division (PED) reports were voted on in committee. They pertain to Erosion and Sedimentation and our state's ABC boards.

The first report on Erosion and Sedimentation offers suggestions on how we can improve the process of evaluating the environmental stability of land that is being prepared for development. The changes recommended by PED will improve the quality of service that developers receive as well as streamline the process. Additionally, a new section was added that gives smaller, local communities more flexibility.

The second report looks into ways that we can better serve each individual county's ABC boards. This PED report suggests a number of ways to reduce overhead costs and keep prices in check while continuing to supervise the process. Moreover, the report outlines future steps to modernize our ABC system and ensure that local communities have the most streamlined and personal process when choosing how to manage the sale of alcohol.

NC A&T hosts the kickoff to Small Farms Week in Duplin County

North Carolina Agricultural and Technical State University's annual tribute to small-scale agriculture will be held March 24-30, 2019. The powerful legacy behind North Carolina's small farms – and their swift movement toward the future – is the inspiration for Small Farms Week 2019. Featuring workshops, farming demonstrations, tours and more.

With the theme "Deep Roots, Bright Futures," the 33rd Small Farms Week pays tribute to the crucial role that small farms play in North Carolina's \$84 billion agriculture industry – of the state's 52,000 farms, more than 80 percent are considered small – and the innovative ways that farmers are tapping into trends and adapting to change in the agriculture industry.

The week kicks off in Duplin County, home of 2018 Small Farmer of the year Ronald W. Simmons of Master Blend Family Farms, where highlights include a panel discussion with master farmers and a tour of local farms, including Duplin Winery in Rose Hill. Founded in 1975, Duplin Winery is the state's oldest operating winery, and it will offer an optional wine tasting.

Events continue March 26-28 on A&T's campus with workshops and demonstrations, including informational sessions about season extension, the lessons learned from Hurricane Florence and farming industrial hemp, which has the potential to become a major cash crop for North Carolina growers.

Sampson County Schools Celebrates AdvancED Accreditation

Leaders throughout Sampson County Schools were recently honored for meeting quality standards set by the AdvancEd Accreditation Commission.

Dr. Linda Jewell Carr, assistant superintendent of Instructional Services, presented the achievement regarding the nonprofit and nonpartisan organization that provides accreditation to schools. Based on the Index of Educational Quality, which measures measures overall performance, Sampson Schools earned 363 out of 400 points.

The district was also recognized for developing strategic and improvement plans, along with other evaluation measures. Committee members also acknowledged future plans such as looking at data, finding strengths within the school system and celebrating successes.

Johnson; Roseboro-Salemburg Middle School, Principal Shajuana Sellers; Lakewood High School, Principal John Goode; and Clement Elementary School, Principal James Mullins.

Also included were Midway Elementary School, Principal Robbin Cooper; Plain View Elemen-

tary School, Principal Nicole Peterson; Midway Middle School, Principal Kevin Hunter; Midway

High School, Principal Monty Strickland; Sampson Early College High School, Principal Susan Westerbeek; Union Elementary School, Principal Dondi Hobbs; Union Intermediate School, Principal O.C. Holland; Union Middle School, Principal Dr. Theresa Melenas; and Union High School, Principal Julie Hunter.

Superintendent Dr. Eric Bracy was also recognized for his leadership for the accreditation, valid

Middle school students are chosen from the South River EMC service area to attend the basketball camps on an all- expense- paid scholarship. Parents are responsible for transportation the day of the camp.



Norris Signs to Play Soccer at UNC-Wilmington



On Thursday at Clinton High School, family, friends and coaches gathered to support senior Parker Norris as he signed to play soccer for UNC-Wilmington. Parker was part of Dark Horse history as him and his teammates became the first Clinton High School soccer team to win a State Championship.

Parker has been named the Performance Automotive/Sampson Weekly Athlete of the Week several times for his achievements on and off the field.

"Parker has been a huge component to the success of our State Playoff Championship," says Clinton Soccer Head Coach Brad Spell. "He is cool under pressure but has a strong fire that burns within him to direct his teammates to a winning attitude. He is a positive force that brings out the best in everyone. It has been a blessing to have the opportunity to coach a super athlete and super young man."

Parker is a midfielder and captain on the Dark Horse soccer team and scored the two goals in Clinton's 2-1 victory over the Newton-Conover Red Devils in NCHSAA 2-A Soccer State Championship that was held at Dail Soccer Field on the campus of N.C. State University.

In fact, the team set more than one record at the school.

They also earned: Most Wins (26-1); Most Shutouts (19); 8 All-Region Players; 2 All-State Players; Finished ranked No. 1 in the State; 15-0 undefeated at home; Only gave up 13 goals throughout the season.

The final one belongs to Norris. He scored a record 35 goals this season.

In addition to soccer, Norris also played basketball and golf for the Dark Horses. He is currently playing for a travel soccer team out of Raleigh. That team is currently ranked No. 2 in the nation. In addition to being part of the first soccer team to win a state title, Norris also set personal records during his time at the school.

This season alone, he became the leading record breaking scorer for the Dark Horses, with 35 goals 21 assists; he was named the East Central Conference Player of the Year; He is ranked No. 1 State Player of the Year in the 2-A East; Norris was nominated for the All-South Team; the All-State Team; The All-Region Team; and named All-Conference and All-County.

have a position or special title," says Greg, "but for me the JOB I wanted was to be the Newton

Grove Chief of Police. I've wanted this job since I started in law enforcement."

"For me, this is a true homecoming," states Warren. "My family is making a huge sacrifice for me to take this position, but they have supported me 100% since the job came up. My wife is also from the area and she attended Hobbton High, but much of her family had moved to be closer to her. And now she is leaving them to come home... Yes, it's a sacrifice but she is 100% supportive, and I am just so grateful."

Warren says he expects his biggest challenge as the new police chief will be to gain the trust and respect of the community. "I want us to all work together to make Newton Grove a better place. I want us to be a team and I want to get the community behind me, so I have their support."

"I've been gone a long time and I'll need to get to know some people, get reacquainted with some people, and catch up with others. But the good thing about a small town is you know just about everyone if in fact you aren't related to them."

Warren has 22-years'experience in law enforcement. He completed his Basic Law Enforcement Training at Randolph Community College in 1997 and went on to earn his Associates in Criminal Justice and is completing his Bachelor's in Criminal Justice Concentration in Administration of Justice.

He began his career as a Deputy with the Randolph County Sherriff's Office in 1997 and later worked with the Randleman Police Department. He has also served as a Lake Warden and currently serves as a sworn Park Ranger for the City of High Point, NC.

He has an Advanced Law Enforcement Certificate as well as his Professional Park Ranger Certification. Warren also has advanced training and continuing education in Gang Training, Interview and Interrogation, School Resource Officer, Search and Rescue, and Field Officer Training. The 43-year-old Warren brings a wealth of knowledge and experience to his new position.

When asked what he was most proud of Warren quickly answered his children. "My oldest is Aaron Parker (and wife Sheree") who are both serving in the United States Coast Guard in Jacksonville, FL. Next is Jordan Parker, a Dental Assistant in Archdale, NC. And Morgan Warren who is a master Welder in Greensboro, NC."

"They are truly awesome kids and I'll miss being near them. I'll miss the thousands of friends of course but leaving my family will be the hardest. They have all been so supportive. But," adds Warren, "I'm coming back home, and I can't wait."

He was also 910prep 1st team honors and nominated for High School OT player of the year.

Parker wanted to thank one person in particular, Coach Brad Spell.

"He has always been a great motivator," Norris said. "He pushes you to your limits and I really appreciate that. It is a good thing because it helps me learn more."

Norris adds, "He instills habits in you - not just on the field, but off of the field as well. He is teaching life lessons. He is a great coach and a great guy."

"I would also like to thank both my parents, especially my dad as he has been a great role model for me through the years and passed on many lessons and values," Norris said. "I would also like to thank Jeff Smith, Nicki Thompson, Danny Walsh, Connor Dawson, and Adam Smith for coaching me through the years and teaching me so much on and off the field."

And one last group of friends.

"I would like to thank all of my teammates for making this season an amazing and a once in a lifetime experience."

Event organizers are hoping it will accomplish what its title says, to save people from opioid use and educate them in the process. There will be presentations by state and local representatives, personal testimonies, panel discussions, and a Q & A with local law enforcement, health providers, substance abuse & mental health professionals.

Opening remarks will be provided by Clark Wooten, Chair of the Sampson County Board of Commissioners and Ernie Lee, District Attorney. Josh Stein with the NC Attorney General's Office will discuss the opioid crisis in North Carolina- How we got here, Progress, Challenges and Opportunities. Alan Dellapenna Jr with the NC Injury and Violence Prevention Branch will talk about Prescription and Drug Overdose.

After lunch, Donald McDonald, MSW, LCAS with Addiction Professionals of NC, will address the audience discussing "Addiction is a Chronic Brain Disorder, Not a Moral Failing."

Local education, prevention and treatment resources at the summit will include the following:

- Emergency Care & Treatment- Shawn M. Howerton, MD, Chief Executive Officer and CMO Sampson Regional Medical Center
- Medication Take Back Program- Lt. Stokes McKoy, Clinton Police Department

Opioids are a growing problem not only across the nation but right here in our backyard in Sampson County. According to stats for 2017, over 5 North Carolinians died each day from an unintentional opioid overdose. From 1999-2017, more than 13,000 North Carolinians lost their lives to unintentional opioid overdose. More locally, 6 Sampson County residents died in 2017 by unintentional opioid overdoses with 31 overdose ER visits. Not surprising considering that 4,211,000 opioid pills were dispensed to Sampson County residents in 2017. That is 66 pills for every man, woman and child in the county.

According to Sydney Smith, "Citizens can get involved by volunteering to assist and/or making a donation that will assist with the summit. Citizens may also get involved after the summit by volunteering with the Sampson County Substance Abuse Coalition to provide outreach."

Smith stated that attendees can expect to learn information on:

- 1. The opioid epidemic in North Carolina & Sampson County to include drug and prescription overdoses;
- 2. Addiction and treatment;
- 3. Local resources that are available (i.e. Medication Take Back Program, Naloxone Distribution Program, etc.)

Smith also noted that county agencies along with the Sampson County Substance Abuse Coalition are making strides to combat the opioid issue. "Locally, to counteract the Opioid crisis we are: 1) Hosting Sampson County's first SCOPE 4 HOPE Opioid Summit on February 27th and 2) Providing awareness, education, and outreach in Sampson County (Sampson County Substance Abuse Coalition)

the flag and saying the Pledge of Allegiance was one of them.


When asked why they decided to say the pledge that day, Thomas stated, "For all the people

We Should Know . . .



Becky Spell with JW Simmons, Host of We Should Know

Tuesdays from 2:30 PM until 3:30 PM, J.W. Simmons hosts a radio show on 1170 AM called "We Should Know", and The Sampson Weekly will feature portions of the transcripts in our continuing efforts to bring you more coverage of what is happening in our community.

The topic for this week's show is the upcoming Rise-Up Conference and the guest this week is Becky Spell-Vann.

JW Simmons begins the show by asking Becky Spell-Vann to discuss the title of her annual conference and how she came up with Rise-Up. Becky replies, "Well, in 2007 I was in Charlotte, NC with my sister and her niece for a revival in a 4-story coliseum and it was packed. In fact, there were lines outside and they had to have a room for people to go in. And I stood inside that coliseum and watched the people worship, and there was a healing service, and I thought this is so powerful. And in my heart, it resonated to do this in Clinton."

"So, it took a year for us to pull it together and to think about it. And we started, and we've been doing it now going into our 8th year. We're very excited about it. And the words Rise-Up came to me because I was on the bottom floor, my niece was in a wheel chair, and when I looked around at all the people it was like, rise up and do this."

"Don't go home and like many times we do where we have an idea or God stirs our heart and we become complacent. So, I knew it was to be done. And we've never filled the building completely, but we've not stopped. We keep going because there is so many obligations I find, and I'm sure you see that in our community, and other larger cities even where there are so many things going on that people are over-extended."

"But we are excited to offer a Saturday afternoon. We start at 1:30pm this year on February 23rd and we've got something lined up for the whole family."

Next, Simmons says that our world and community is more divided and polarized today than at any other time in his life. That we are so divided by one subject that people refuse to even talk about it. But he says that he also thinks about the Rise-Up Conference, the peace of it, and the concept of conflict resolution comes to mind. Simmons says that being men of peace is a focus in today's Rotary Club. He asks Becky if she feels that concept is a part of her conference.

Becky replies, "Yes. When you mentioned Rotary, I was thinking of the moto for Baptist Men many years ago when Promise Keepers was such a big thing. And I think what has hap-

pened in our society is that we want to keep our promises and we don't want to be polarized but we get caught up in the system and in everyday living. And sometimes we don't really rise up and go forth with faith like we should."

"That's what I've seen happening at Tim's Gift over the last 10 years. My son Cameron worked with us for one year in 2009 to help us with our 501(c)3 and as he was there, he said mom, I see Tim's Gift being a part, not a separate entity like you said polarized. But in our community, we need to work together with other non-profits. He said, our hospices' we need to find others because really, we're all doing the same thing. We're helping people and sharing the love of Jesus."

"And we tried that year. He wrote letters. We visited. But many times, we're territorial. And I find that somebody's got to trust what you're doing. But since 2009 we've been writing letters. We talk with the hospice leaders here. With the Salemburg Food Bank. With the Churches. We now have seven church that are donating quarterly to help us. And the hospice groups, we work together. Sampson Partners, we work together with them."

"In fact, just this morning a nice recliner came in and we didn't have room for it. So, we called Sampson Partners and the gentleman was over there within 30 minutes. They needed the furniture. They need things. And when they get in medical supplies, they bring them to us. So, I'm seeing in our community, JW, some of that polarization is dissolving because I've seen enough who want to keep that home-town Christian ethics and atmosphere of love. And it's here."

Simmons next asks with a community filled with so many Christian organizations offering charity and support for a wide array of needs, what can be done to fill the gap so that all organizations are elevated by working together.

Becky replies, "Many people do not want to share to rise up and get the word out. We find this in our churches and civic organizations. They would be glad to be on a committee but not a chairman. Many people don't want the leadership role, but someone has to be a leader."

"Look at what David did in the Bible when he got his men excited. But when David was down, and he was not rising up, nothing was happening. So, we have to have leaders and volunteers. People in this town really want to help. We have a list of amazing volunteers that will be out there that Saturday, but I think we've got to make a move. We have to stand up and say if nobody else is going to do it why can we sit around and complain if we're not willing to stand up. Especially when God gives us all the gifts we need. And many of them are wasted."

Clinton PD Investigating Two Shootings From Last Week

The Clinton Police Department is investigating two incidents last week involving gun shots in the city. The first incident took place Monday, February 4th, 2019 on Park Avenue in Clinton. The second incident took place on Margaret Street in the evening hours on Friday, February 8th, 2019.

On Monday, at 9:46 pm, officers from the Clinton Police Department responded to multiple 911 calls of gunfire on Park Avenue. Asst. Chief Anthony Davis reports that an argument which started inside the home at 210 Park Avenue spilled outside and into the driveway of the 210 Park Avenue home. The argument escalated until both suspects began firing at one another.

Asst. Chief Davis states, "During the altercation, the residence at 300 Park Avenue was struck by a bullet. Witnesses stated both parties fled the scene shortly thereafter. There were no injuries reported and the incident is still under investigation."

Davis added, "A narcotics search warrant was served at 210 Park Avenue on Tuesday by NIT Detectives."

In a separate incident, a Clinton man was the victim of a shooting on Margaret Street in Clinton Friday night. The shooting happened around 8:40 pm near the home of 30-year-old Ortavous Lynch of 502 Margaret Street as the victim walked along the street where he lived.

Shot at least once in the chest, Lynch was transported to Sampson Regional Memorial Hospital with life-threating injuries after Clinton Police Officers responded to a 911 call of shots fired. Lynch was later transferred to an unnamed trauma center for further treatment. At the time of the call, Sampson Regional Medical Center was placed under lockdown per protocol when a shooting victim arrives at the emergency room.

At the time of the incident, Police Chief Donald Edwards stated, "Detectives on duty responded to the call and early in the investigation identified two suspects in the case. We are still investigating to determine the reason for the shooting."

Edwards added, "Lynch's injuries are serious, and he is in critical condition."

In a follow-up interview, Chief Edwards reported Tuesday, February 12th, "Warrants for assault with a deadly weapon with intent to kill inflicting serious injury have been issued for

Two Clinton Men Charged with Sex Offenses with Children

In two unrelated cases men from Clinton have been charged with sex crimes against children in our community. Jarrise Jaquane McNeil, 24-year-old from Clinton was taken into custody Monday morning and charged with 1 count Statutory Sex Offense with a Child by an Adult and 1 count Indecent Liberties with a Child. McNeil is currently detained in the Sampson County Detention Center under a no bond hold.

In a separate case, Aldo Noe Ramos Andino, 32-year-old from Clinton was taken into custody Monday afternoon and charged with 2 counts of Indecent Liberties with a Child. Andino is also being held in the Sampson County Detention Center. He has a \$30,000 secured bond.

In both incidences, Lt. Marcus Smith with the Sampson County Sheriff's Office states that law enforcement was made aware of complaints by a family member. "In the Andino case, a family member reported suspicion of inappropriate sexual conduct with a minor child under the age of 15. In the McNeil case, a family member reported suspicion of inappropriate sexual conduct with a minor child under the age of 6."

Smith continued, "Both cases were investigated by law enforcement and as a result evidence was found to support the claim and both subjects were charged as a result."

McNeil had a first appearance in court scheduled for Tuesday, February 12, 2019. Andino's first appearance before a judge was scheduled for Friday, February 15, 2019

Chocolate is pure magic. In honor of Valentine's Day, why not harness a bit of that sweet decadence by serving one of our favorite chocolate-forward desserts?

Chocolate Chess Pie

Serves: 8 For the pie:

- 1 recipe for a single unbaked pie
- 1 ¼ cups sugar
- 1/4 cup cocoa powder
- 1 tablespoon all-purpose flour
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 8 tablespoons (1 stick) unsalted butter, melted and cooled
- 3 large eggs, beaten, plus 1 egg, beaten, for the crust (optional)
- 3 tablespoons evaporated milk
- 1 ½ teaspoons vanilla
- 1 1/2 teaspoons distilled white vinegar

For the topping:

- 1 ½ cups heavy cream
- 1/4 cup plus 2 tablespoons sugar
- 1/4 cup cocoa powder, plus more for

Heat the oven to 350 degrees. To make the pie: Using a rolling pin, roll out the pie dough on a wellfloured counter and transfer it into a 9-inch pie plate. Gently press the dough into the edges of the pan and trim off any excess. Crimp the edges as desired.

In a large bowl, whisk together the sugar, cocoa powder, flour and salt until combined. Whisk in the butter until just combined. Whisk in the 3

large eggs, evaporated milk, vanilla extract and vinegar until combined. Pour the filling into the prepared pie crust and brush the crust with the additional egg, if desired. Bake until the edges are well set and the innermost circle of pie is still just a bit jiggly, about 35 minutes. Let cool to room temperature.

Once cooled, prepare the whipped topping: In the bowl of a stand mixer fitted with the whisk attachment, beat the heavy cream on medium speed until frothy and slightly thickened. Add the sugar and cocoa powder, increase the mixer to high and beat until stiff peaks form. Spread dollops of the whipped cream on top of the pie. Dust with additional cocoa powder and serve immediately. The pie will keep in the refrigerator for up to 1 day.



Easy Chocolate Cobbler

Serves: 8 to 10

- · 6 tablespoons unsalted butter
- 1 cup semisweet chocolate chips
- 1 cup self-rising flour
- 1 3/4 cup sugar
- 1/4 cup plus 2 tablespoons unsweetened cocoa powder
- ½ cup milk
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 ½ cups boiling water
- · Vanilla ice cream, for serving

Heat the oven to 350 degrees. Place the butter in an 8-inch square baking dish and place in the oven to melt. Once the butter is melted. sprinkle the chocolate chips over butter.

In a medium bowl, whisk together the flour, 34 cup of the sugar and 2 tablespoons of the cocoa powder. Whisk in the milk and vanilla, then spread over melted butter and chocolate chips in the baking dish.

In a small bowl, whisk together the remaining sugar and cocoa powder, then sprinkle over the batter. Pour the boiling water on top of chocolate mixture and bake until crust is set, about 30 minutes. Serve warm with vanilla ice cream.



Chocolate Covered Bacon

Serves: 6 to 8

• 1 pound sliced applewood-smoked bacon

Heat the oven to 375 degrees. Line a plate

• 1 (10-ounce) bag semi-sweet chocolate chips

with paper towels and two baking sheets with parchment paper. Place bacon on one of the prepared baking

sheets. Bake until the bacon is crisp, 15 to 20 minutes. Transfer to the prepared plate.

In a large bowl set over a pot of simmering water, melt the chocolate over medium heat. While the chocolate is melting, place a wire rack over the second prepared baking sheet.

When the chocolate has melted, remove the bowl from the double boiler. Dip both sides of each strip of bacon in the melted chocolate. Transfer to the prepared baking sheet and let sit at room temperature until fully set, 20 to 30 minutes. Serve.

A pot of Republic Steel Chili brings back memories

epublic Steel Corporation (originally named Alabama Steel and Wire Company) came to Gadsden in the early 1900s. My father worked there as a pipefitter for 30 years.

The steel plant was known to be one of the hottest places to work during the summer and one of the coldest environments in the wintertime. No one

can agree on the details

of how this recipe came

to be other than chili was the subject one day, and various methods and likes and dislikes were open for debate and discussion.

The pipe shop foreman told the men to bring in their favorite ingredients, and he'd see what he could do with them. The result? What our family, and I'm sure several others, will always refer to as Republic Steel Chili. No hard-tofind ingredients here, just a working man's pot of chili.

Republic Steel Style Chili (Circa 1980)

- 2 to 2 ½ lbs. lean ground
- 3 tablespoons butter · 2 large white onions, chopped

- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 1 quart whole tomatoes
- 1 (28 oz.) can tomato sauce • 2 teaspoons Tabasco hot
- 1 or 2 package chili seasoning mix
- 1 cup water mixed with 1 ½ teaspoons flour for thickening

In a large Dutch oven, brown ground beef and drain. While meat is browning, melt butter in a large skillet over medium heat. Add onions and. stirring occasionally, let them cook 5 to 7 minutes until softened. Remove from heat and add to the ground beef.

And sugar, tomatoes, tomato sauce, Tabasco and chili seasoning mix(es). Bring mixture to a boil over medium-high

heat, breaking up whole tomatoes with a wooden spoon. Cover and reduce heat so that chili simmers for 1 to 2 hours. Stir occasionally to keep from sticking.

Mix water and flour to form a slurry and add to the chili to thicken. Let simmer another 30 minutes or so. Taste and add salt if needed. Serve hot with lots of saltine crackers.

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Carson Ellis Excited About Playing College Football at Barton



Earlier this month, Clinton High School's three-sport standout (football, basketball and baseball) Carson Ellis signed his letter of intent to play football for Barton College.

Although he received a lot of positive looks from other colleges, the tight-end/defensive end said he chose Barton College, who has recently resurrected their NCAA Division II football program that will kick off in 2020, for a few reasons.

"I really liked the coach (Chip Hester) there," the 6-foot 3-inch, 215 pound, Ellis admitted. "I like that they are currently building their program from the bottom-up. It's a first-year football program - I am guaranteed playing time and the proximity (to my family) is good too. I like the feeling of being there at the start of a program; making history at the school and I just really liked the feeling of being there."

Another benefit of going to Barton is their acclaimed business program, which Ellis will major in at the school.

"They have a 5-year business program that I will be able to get out with my Master's Degree," he said. "So, I am very excited about it."

Coach Hester said that he is expecting big things from Ellis when he comes to Barton in August.

"We are really excited about Carson," the coach said. "He is a great student with high character. He is the type of young person we want to build this program around. We feel like he strives for success on the field and off the field."

Hester continues, "He's an all-around ball player that can catch and block. I'm anxious to see how much he can develop over the next year."

By signing with Barton College, Ellis fulfilled a dream he had since he was a kid. Back then, the young Ellis would attend Dark Horse football games alongside his father, Kevin, who had been an assistant football coach at the school since 1998. Kevin also played college football - as a defensive end (Wingate University).

Which all came full circle when Ellis signed to become a Bulldog with his father, along with his mother Erin and younger brother, Peyton, coaches, teammates and friends surrounding him.

"It was special," Carson says. "To have everyone there my family, friends and coaches - but especially my dad because I really did grow up following him around to the practices and games ... It made it a really special moment for me."

Born in Fayetteville and raised in Clinton, Ellis said that his love of sports came at a young age - in addition to accompanying his father at Clinton games, he began playing at the Clinton Recreation Department when he was about 4 years old.

"I played multiple sports because I loved it," he said recently. "I eventually played travel soccer, travel baseball and AAU baseball. I think because of that, it helped me create a strong work ethic."

Ellis said that although he played other sports as he grew up, football has always been his favorite - by far. In recent years, he's attended camps at Wake Forest, N.C. State University, Campbell, Furman, UNC-C, and Wingate, to name just a few.

"I love to play football," he said. "I love sports, but I my focus is on football. I have always wanted to play college football and I am going to work hard to make that dream come true."

His final season on the high school gridiron was impressive - the Horses finished at 8-3 overall, falling to Kinston in the second round of the NCHSAA 2-A State Football Championships.

Defensively, Ellis finished with 36 solo tackles, 43 in total; 1 fumble recovery and a blocked punt on the season.

In his junior year, the Dark Horse football team went 6-6, once again falling in the second round of the NCHSAA 2-A

State Football Championships to Northeastern. In addition to the loss, it was also the final game of long-time, legendary Clinton head coach Bob Lewis.

In baseball, Ellis plays third base and pitches. Last season,

Ellis had an on-base percentage of .737; a .340 slugging percentage; and a .360 batting average.

In basketball, Ellis is a power forward. Last season the team went 27-2 overall and fell in the NCHSAA 2-A Basketball Championship at Minges Coliseum to Greene Central 61-57.

This season the team, which is currently at 11-12 overall, played their final regular season game Thursday night (final results were not available at press time). The Dark Horse basketball team will head into the playoffs in the coming week (times/dates are TBA).

**Please contact the school in your district to schedule an appointment for your child to attend the clinic.

Copies of the child's birth certificate and immunization record are required for the clinic.

If your child has not had their Health Assessment done prior to the clinic date, please schedule an appointment with your child's physician or your local Health Department as soon as possible. These physicals are required by State Law to be completed within 30 days of the beginning of school and no earlier than one year prior to school enrollment.

At the present time, North Carolina State Law requires a Comprehensive Vision Screening by a health care provider prior to beginning Kindergarten. If your child fails the vision screening, the health care provider will refer your child to an ophthalmologist or optometrist for a complete vision exam.

**All children who reach age five on or before August 31 are eligible for entry into Kindergarten.

SCC Employees Get CPR Training

In an effort to make Sampson Community College an even safer place to work and go to school, all faculty and staff are required to be CPR-certified going forward. CPR stands for Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation.

"We are teaching everyone here basic life support and CPR," says Michelle Simmons, CPR trainer. We are going through the steps and procedures as it relates to saving lives from adults and children to infants as well. We want the employees here to know exactly what to do in a life-threatening emergency."

Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation is a procedure performed when the heart stops beating. Immediate CPR can double or triple chances of survival after cardiac arrest. According to 2014 data, nearly 45-percent of out-of-hospital cardiac arrest victims survived when bystander CPR was administered. Most out-of-hospital cardiac arrests occur in public settings.

"It is particularly important to have as many people on campus as possible know CPR," Simmons says. "So many people visit or work at the college that the chances of anything happening there obviously increases. This training will not only help the staff and students there but the community in general benefits from it as well." The US Occupational Safety and Health Administration reports that there are about 10,000 cardiac arrests in the workplace each year in the United States.

Hands-On Training Flies High at SCC

If you thought you saw a UFO hovering above Sampson Community College, you are not alone. SCC's Applied Animal Science classes were receiving hands-on training on drones this week. Not guite an unidentified flying object but definitely used to monitor livestock.

"We brought our drone out here and are allowing students to get experience learning to fly," says Chet Bass, Department Chair of the college's Applied Animal Science Technology program. "There are all kinds of different opportunities for agriculture as technology advances and drones will play a crucial role in agriculture going forward."

An agricultural drone is an unmanned aerial vehicle applied to farming to help increase crop production and monitor crop growth. Sensors and digital imaging capabilities can give farmers a richer picture of their fields. This information may prove useful in improving crop yields and farm efficiency. Drones allow farmers to see their fields from the sky. This bird's-eye view can reveal many issues such as irrigation problems, soil variation, and pest and fungal infestations.

"This technology gives us an advantage," says Bass. "We can use drones for topography and laying out maps. We can scout crops, analyze fields and count animals. Thermal cameras can be added. Technology always changes, and agriculture is no different. Farmers constantly have to stay up to date and this is an example of that through education.'

The addressable value of drone-powered solutions in all applicable industries is more than \$127 billion. With the world's population projected to reach nine billion people in thirty years, experts expect agricultural consumption to increase by nearly seventy percent over that time. 

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
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FAITH







One final 'Big One' at Daytona?

Final? Probably not. Yes, this will be the end of restrictorplate racing at Daytona (and Talladega), as NASCAR turns to "tapered spacers" to hamstring horsepower at all ovals a mile or longer. The spacers will tighten the competition and bring a bit of pack-racin' to the masses, but going forward at the two fastest speedways, the "Big One" will likely live on. The "Really, Really Big One," however, might become more rare.

What happens to the plates?

I'd suggest Christmas tree ornaments. Maybe wind chimes. Somewhere in a warehouse, NASCAR is bound to be storing a ton of old plates with varying sizes of holes — the airflow was manipulated many times since 1988. 1. Hendrick power

Rick Hendrick's race teams flexed their muscles in the first weekend of racing at Daytona International Speedway. His cars swept the top four positions in qualifying, led by William Byron, who nabbed the Daytona 500 pole. Jimmie Johnson captured the Clash later in the day.

2. Mustang debut

The Ford Mustang made its debut. It replaces the Fusion model in Cup Series racing this season. Joey Logano posted the fastest speed for Ford in qualifying. He was clocked at 192.382 mph, good for fifth overall. Logano and teammate Ryan Blaney were third and fourth in the Clash.

3. Petty's back

Thad Moffitt doesn't carry the Petty name, but he is a grandson to Richard Petty, "King of stock-car racing." The 18-year-old driver made his Daytona debut
