




At the Tuesday night Clinton City Council meeting, Clinton Police Chief Donald Edwards presented the Week of February 5-11, 2021

Strong, Resilient, Ready: Governor Cooper Proposes Emergency Budget Supplement to Turn Corner on COVID-19 and Invest in a Stronger Future for NC



RALEIGH: Governor Roy Cooper today outlined a plan for allocating federal COVID-19 relief funds for immediate needs and investing state resources to help North Carolina communities build back as the state turns the corner on the pandemic.

"North Carolinians have stood strong during this pandemic and we are ready to move our state forward. The past year has tested all of us but we must work together on a focused, responsible plan to help families and businesses survive and grow strong while we bolster our economy and health care system and make sure students and teachers are in classrooms ready to learn. We can emerge from these challenging times stronger than ever," said Governor Cooper.

The Governor's early plan calls for investing federal stimulus funds along with some state resources for immediate critical needs. Governor Cooper's plan would invest the state's share of the federal Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021 which was signed into law Dec. 27. The federal appropriation totaled more than \$4 billion for North Carolina. A fuller proposed biennial budget will be presented later in the legislative session.

The new federal funding is strictly proscribed, and with General Assembly appropriation will provide vital COVID relief such as vaccines, more supplies to slow the virus spread, help for rent and utility bills, and more funding to put food on the table. Federal funds will address:

Approximately \$2 billion for emergency assistance for public and private K-12 schools and higher education institutions.

\$336 million for childcare and development block grants.

Approximately \$700 million for access to vaccines and testing, tracing

In addition to the federal allocation plan, the Governor recommends investing \$695 million from the state's General Fund to address other immediate needs. Despite the pandemic, North Carolina's budget availability remains strong, with more than \$4 billion in unreserved cash in the General Fund. Among the needs facing North Carolina businesses and people, the Governor recommends addressing:

\$50 million for continued hazard duty pay for state employees on the frontlines of COVID-19, especially law enforcement and corrections personnel who face COVID-19 every day.

\$64.5 million for the replenishment of the North Carolina State Health Plan, which has incurred costs responding to COVID-19.

\$468 million for bonuses for educators and school personnel in public K-12 schools, community colleges and the university system. Educators have stepped up in extraordinary ways during the pandemic but were not a part of the raises approved in the last biennium for state employees.

\$30 million to extend high-speed internet to all corners of the state and other urgent connectivity initiatives, such as IT infrastructure, security for community colleges and enhancement of 35,000 hotspots used for education.

\$37 million to support small businesses that have suffered during the pandemic and often don't have large cash reserves, including small business counselling, marketing for tourism and hospitality, ReTOOLNC program for historically underutilized businesses (HUBs), and the business loan program at Golden L.E.A.F.

Expansion of state unemployment benefits, which are still among the lowest in the country. Despite the pandemic forcing thousands of people to lose their jobs – particularly in the restaurant and service industries - North Carolina's Unemployment Trust Fund remains healthy, with a balance of more than \$2.59 billion. North Carolina should increase the maximum duration of benefits to 26 weeks and increase the maximum benefit from \$350 to \$500 per week.

"I appreciate the work of legislators to quickly pass vital relief as the state responded to the pandemic last year and I believe we can work together to get the job done again. Our communities and people face serious challenges and we must come together to identify areas of common ground and help our people beat the pandemic and thrive once again," said Governor Cooper.

\$546 million for emergency rental assistance, which will build on North Carolina's current work. While this is the first dedicated federal funding for rental assistance, North Carolina recognized the extraordinary need to help people stay in their homes during the pandemic and created the HOPE program to pay back rent and utilities using last year's CRF funds.

\$258 million for Highway Infrastructure and \$65 million for airports.


\$47 million for Community Mental Health Services.

North Carolina Sees Dramatic Drop in Spread of Flu, Other Respiratory Illnesses Thanks to Preventative Practices to Slow Spread of COVID-19

North Carolinians have protected themselves and their loved ones from the flu along with COVID-19 by taking preventative measures such as wearing a mask, staying 6 feet apart from people who do not live with them, and frequently washing their hands or using hand sanitizer.

These preventative measures – known collectively as the 3Ws – have helped dramatically reduce the spread of the flu and other respiratory illnesses across the state, according to data from the North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services.


Compared to past years, North Carolina has seen very low levels of influenza and respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) this year, according to data reported to the department by seven of the state's largest healthcare systems. Similar trends are being seen nationally and globally.

Only four deaths from flu have been reported to NCDHHS so far this season, compared to 186 deaths last season and more than 200 deaths during the 2018-19 season. The data show these low levels of flu and RSV are occurring despite similar or higher levels of testing for both illnesses.

Additionally, NC Medicaid has seen a 98.2% reduction in expense claims for Tamiflu, a drug used to treat the flu.

COVID-19 spreads more easily than the flu and other seasonal respiratory viruses, but mask wearing, social distancing and hand washing have been shown to help slow the spread of both illnesses.

"Altogether, this data tells us the preventative measures we're taking are working," said NCDHHS Secretary Mandy K. Cohen, M.D. "Not only are the 3Ws having a big impact on the spread of flu and other respiratory viruses, this data shows us that the spread of COVID-19 would likely be much higher if we weren't taking these measures."

Influenza can place a major strain on the healthcare system, causing between 9 million and 45 million illnesses and 140,000 to 810,000 hospitalizations in the United States each year. Reductions in flu and other respiratory viruses have opened up more capacity for hospitals to handle cases of COVID-19.

"Reducing hospitalizations because of flu and other respiratory illness has been critically important to helping NC's hospitals manage surges in COVID-19 cases," Cohen said. "We must keep practicing preventative measures such as wearing a mask,

STUDY SAYS **Bariatric surgical procedures** associated with increased risk of unhealthy alcohol use

A new study published in JAMA found that unhealthy alcohol consumption is more prevalent in veterans who undergo bariatric surgical procedures, such as laparoscopic sleeve gastrectomy.

"In this cohort study of 2,608 U.S. veterans who underwent a bariatric surgical procedure, the mean alcohol screening scores in patients without baseline unhealthy alcohol use and the probability of unhealthy alcohol use both increased significantly 3 to 8 years after the procedure, and the probability of no alcohol use decreased significantly 5 to 8 years after the procedure," according to the study. "In a small sample of patients with unhealthy alcohol use at baseline, the prevalence of postoperative unhealthy alcohol use was higher for patients undergoing gastric bypass than controls."

Among patients without baseline unhealthy alcohol use, the probability of unhealthy alcohol consumption increased significantly 3 to 8 years after laparoscopic sleeve gastrectomy or Roux-en-Y gastric bypass surgeries, compared with control patients, the study said.

CONDITIONS 101 What is keratosis pilaris?

Keratosis pilaris is a common but harmless skin condition. According to the Mayo Clinic, it causes dry, rough patches and tiny bumps that don't hurt or itch. These bumps usually appear on the upper arms, thighs, cheeks or buttocks. The bumps generally don't hurt or itch. It can be treated with moisturizers or prescription creams. Though keratosis pilaris can occur at any age, it is more common in young children. The condition often goes away by age 30.



Preemptive STRIKE?

Some supplements might be able to help prevent illness, but doctors say patients should do research

Instead of waiting to fight illnesses after getting sick, Pam Maltinsky tries to head them off before she catches them.

Maltinsky, 70, takes supplements to boost her immune system. It's a method Maltinsky swears by and one she said has become even more important as the coronavirus pandemic rages on.

Maltinsky takes a variety of supplements, including an elderberry syrup. Research has shown that elderberry may help decrease inflammation and can help ease cold symptoms.

"I've always leaned toward holistic medicine." Maltinskv said. "I started reading about it and decided there's nothing much in there that could hurt me." It's true that certain vitamins and supplements can benefit a person's immune system. But consumers need to make sure they know what they're buying, said Dr. Terri Wilkerson Riddiford, a primary care doctor at Mount Carmel Medical Group in Dublin, Ohio. Some of the most advertised products aren't necessarily the best ones to use, said Wilkerson Riddiford.

people can do to prevent falling ill is to wash their hands, get plenty of sleep and abide by COVID-19 recommendations such as wearing masks in public and keeping a safe distance, said Dr. Seuli Brill, a pediatrician and internal medicine doctor at Ohio State University Wexner Medical Center.

While Brill said there's some benefit to taking vitamins and supplements, they can also cause problems.

St. John's Wort, which has been used to treat a variety of conditions including poor sleep or appetite, can interfere with antidepressants, Brill said. And a supplement called Ginkgo biloba can cause upset stomach or skin irritation. Although supplements aren't drugs, patients should treat them similarly, Brill said. Anyone looking to try a new vitamin or supplement for any reason should first talk to their doctor. Maltinsky said she's not one to try something new on a whim that she heard about or saw advertised. "I will research it tremendously," Maltinsky said of anything new she's considering. "I'm not going to try just anything that I heard about through the grapevine. I'm very, very careful about that."

NUTRITION STATION What is spirulina and why is it good for you?

Spirulina is a type of algae sold as a supplement in tablet or powder form. It is high in protein for a plant and contains nutrients such as iron, potassium, zinc, calcium and B vitamins.

According to Well+Good, spirulina can help supplement a plant-forward diet and can be beneficial for healthy aging.

Clinical herbalist and holistic health practitioner Rachelle Robinette recommends taking a teaspoon per day. Since it has a seaweed flavor, she also suggests adding to pesto or a savory recipe with greens, such as salad dressings, soups or dips.

Since spirulina is grown in water, Well+Good recommends checking that it comes from a clean water source.

ur move today is very simple: It is "jumping for joy!" All you need for this movement is a flat surface and plenty of energy.


Jumping for joy is great to get your heart pumping and the blood flowing. Any kind of jumping exercise is great for your lower body and your core as well.

1/2 cup honey

- 6 tablespoons unsalted butter
- 2 tablespoons creamy peanut butter
- 1/2 cup light brown sugar, firmly packed
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 2 cups rolled oats (quick or regular)
- 1 cup bran flakes
- 1 cup sweetened coconut flakes
- 1 cup dried fruit (raisins, blueberries or cranberries)
- 1 cup roasted peanuts, chopped

In large, shallow, microwavable dish, combine honey, butter, peanut butter, brown sugar, vanilla and salt. Microwave at 50% power 2 minutes then whisk to combine and microwave at 50% power 2 minutes.

Add oats, bran flakes, coconut flakes, dried fruit and peanuts; stir to combine. Microwave on high 1 minute. Stir and microwave 30 seconds.

Press mixture into 13-by-9-inch baking dish lined with parchment or wax paper with some extra hanging over edges to easily lift bars out. Use bottom of glass wrapped with plastic wrap to press granola mixture firmly into pan. Allow to cool completely 30-45 minutes. Cut into 12-14 bars.

(CLINTON, N.C.) – Katie Butler graduated from Clinton High School in 2012 and then went on to graduate from East Carolina University with a degree in Rehabilitation Services in 2016. Now, Butler is one of four Career Coaches recently hired with the Career and College Promise (CCP) program at Sampson Community College (SCC) and is stationed at Midway High School. Butler has already proved to be a key asset to one of the biggest high schools involved with the CCP program.

For Butler, joining the CCP program and working at Midway High School is about giving college access to every student that she encounters.

"I want everybody to be independent, successful, and accomplish everything that they want to accomplish regardless of their background, resources, or disability. Some people just do not have the resources at home to allow them to further their education or career," Butler shared when asked about what about her degree field interests her.

In 2020, Butler graduated with her master's degree in Rehabilitation and Career Counseling. During the time of working on her master's degree, Butler was able to spend time with her daughter. Butler then began to work part-time with the ACE program at Sampson Community College while working on her second degree. Before starting her new job as a Career Coach, Butler worked with the ACE program for two years.

When asked about Bulter, Perry Gillespie, Director of Career and College Promise

replied, "When you meet Katie, you can automatically tell she's a nurturer. What an awesome trait to have in my opinion. It makes you approachable and easy to talk with about any issue. This is half the battle when working with our CCP population. You want them to come to you when needed and have them feel like you're excited to help them. For some of these students, it will be their family's first interaction with a college and having someone like Katie ensures it to be a pleasurable one. "

Butler believes that anyone who is unsure about what they want to go to college for should consider attending SCC. Especially for those that are more afraid of going straight into a university setting. Butler would say that SCC allows you to get started on your college education in a smaller and more tight-knit environment.

Her love of working at SCC was one of the main reasons why Butler decided to join the CCP program as a Career Coach. By becoming a Career Coach, Butler has been able to utilize the degree that she recently received. Butler knew that as a Career Coach she be able to reach students that are not using the opportunities that the CCP program can provide.

Bulter stated, "I have already learned a lot and I have already built relationships with other employees that I have worked with before, but I didn't really know them that well. "

As the Career Coach at Midway High School, Butler has a personal goal to find the students that want to take classes that are more Career and Technical Education based. She wants to increase the number of students at Midway High School that might not qualify for the regular CCP courses, but instead would benefit greatly from taking the Career and Technical Education courses.

ACE Coordinator, Kimberly Testerman shared, "Katie is awesome at everything she does. She has a kind and caring heart, and she was definitely an asset to our ACE Program. I was saddened to see her leave, but I know she will do an amazing job at Midway."

Though Katie Butler has a new position in a different department at Sampson Community College her impact is already evident. The significant role that Butler will play in growing the Career and College Promise program has been apparent during her brief time as a Career Coach.

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NC Public School Teachers Encouraged to Apply for Educator Discovery Awards

*Program aims to give teachers more opportunities for professional development



RALEIGH: North Carolina public school teachers are encouraged to apply for awards to get additional training and experience. Governor Roy Cooper and the North Carolina Business Committee for Education are pleased to announce that educators can apply for the Governor's Educator Discovery Award which provides a stipend of up to \$1,000 for public school teachers to pursue professional development.

PreK-12 traditional public and public charter school teachers can use the award to attend a workshop or conference that deepens their subject area knowledge or contributes to their development as an educator. This will be the sixth round of teachers to receive the award and brings the total number of grants awarded to fifteen.

"Teachers are the most important factor in improving student success in our public schools," Governor Cooper said. "We want to give them more ways to get the training and professional development they need to support their students."

Teachers can apply for the award now with selections announced in late April. To be eligible for the Governor's Educator Discovery Awards, teachers should submit a proposal that includes details about their teaching experience and the professional development activity they wish to pursue. The next round of awards will open May land the final round will open October 1.

The most recent winners of the Governor's Educator Discovery Award are teachers from Guilford and Johnston counties: Manessa Green, an elementary AIG educator from Ronald E. MacNair Elementary School, used the grant to complete her National Board Certification; Suzanne Sweat, an AP English Language and Composition educator from Smithfield Selma High School, attended the Center for Educator Recruitment, Retention and Advancement teacher leadership workshop.

The Governor's Educator Discovery Awards are funded by member companies of the North Carolina Business Committee for Education (NCBCE).

"The Governor's Educator Discovery Award gives teachers the flexibility to choose professional development opportunities that will help them become better practitioners and inspire and support their students", said Lilyn Hester, NCBCE Chair. "NCBCE members

know and strongly support the importance of professional development for teachers across our state, especially during this challenging time".

What? They're not pulling a tarp over Daytona's road course?

When Speedway and NASCAR founder Bill France Sr. added a road-course feature to his mammoth track, his vision included world-class sports cars, which we saw during this past weekend's Rolex 24, as well as worldclass motorcycle racing, which comes to town every March. Not sure if he'd ever considered using it for stock-car racing, but it's getting a full dose soon — the Busch Clash on Feb. 9, then all three national circuits (Trucks, Xfinity, Cup) from Feb. 19-21 to replace the originally scheduled Fontana (California) weekend.

You're still not sold on it?

Not 100%. I like the idea of NASCAR using Daytona's road course, as happened with a fill-in race last August. But last summer's Cup race became a spaced-out affair over the 3.56-mile layout (3.66 miles, actually, once they added a chicane off Turn 4), which tells me they might want to consider one of the shorter road-course configurations available within the infield. Hopefully I'll be proven wrong, but if not, break out the detour signs. — Ken Willis





What to watch for in 2021 NASCAR season

The NASCAR offseason is getting awful small in the rear-view mirror.

In fact, if you find yourself on I-95 between Charlotte and Daytona this week, don't be surprised if you see a hauler or two headin' south!

Before we officially get to Speedweeks, though, let's make sure we're all up to speed on the 2021 season.

Here's a cheat-sheet on the four big teams:

First gear

There will be no shortage of storylines at Hendrick Motorsports this season.

Kyle Larson is back in NASCAR after losing his Chip Ganassi seat last spring for using a racial slur during an iRacing event. He'll be in the No. 5 Hendrick Chevy, which is also back in the stable for the first time since the Kasey Kahne days.

Alex Bowman will be the new driver of the No. 48 after Jimmie Johnson's retirement, while William Byron will be working with his third different crew chief (Rudy Fugle) in four years.

son. Hamlin won seven races, but couldn't close the deal for the second year in a row, finishing fourth in the Championship race.

Kyle Busch, meanwhile, is coming off one of his worst seasons. The two-time Cup champion won just once in 2020, and wasn't a part of the Championship Four for the first time since 2014. Think he'll be motivated?

Same can be said about Martin Truex Jr., who also visited Victory Lane just once last season.

Finally, there's a new driver in the No. 20, where Christopher Bell will replace Erik Jones. Bell had seven top-10s in the No. 95 Toyota last year. year for the 2012 champion?

Ryan Blaney has long been viewed as one of NASCAR's rising stars, but he's won just four races in five years. He's coming off a solid 2020 season with 17 top-10s and 11 top-5s. He'll be looking for that breakout year in 2021.

Fourth gear

That brings us to Stewart-Haas Racing.

Kevin Harvick won a career-high nine races last season, yet stumbled down the stretch and somehow missed the championship race. The 45-year-old last won a Cup title in 2014, and figures to be plenty motivated as he starts his 21st Cup season. Aric Almirola had career-highs in laps led (305) and top-10s (18) in 2020, but he's currently in the middle of a twoyear winless streak. Don't be shocked if he's in the mix to break that at Daytona. And then there's Chase Briscoe, who will somehow have to replace NASCAR's best personality — Clint Bowyer. Briscoe, who will wheel the No. 14 Ford, won nine Xfinity races last year.
