







Local Health Officials Give Coronavirus Presentation

On Monday night at the Sampson County Board of Commissioners meeting, Wanda Robinson, Director of the Sampson County Health Department and Kelly Parrish, Director of Nursing at the Sampson County Health Department, updated the board of commissioners on the county's preparedness for the Coronavirus.

Both health officials stated that the health department was preparing for the ultimate spread of the illness.

Director of Nursing Kelly Parrish explained to the board exactly what the COVID 19 disease is. She stated, "Coronavirus disease 2019 is a respiratory illness that can spread from person to person. The virus that causes coronavirus is a "new" virus that **COVID 19, see P. 3**

2020 Primary **Elections Brings New Faces to Local Boards**



The 2020 Primary Elections are over and the ardent tasks of taking down all those election signs is upon the candidates. With 10372 Sampson County registered voters (out of 36217) casting their ballots during Early Voting and on Election Day on Tuesday. A large number of voters took advantage of early One Stop voting with 2607 ballots casts before Election Day.

Some new faces will be seen on the Sampson County School Board this year with the top 3 candidates receiving the nod: Sandra Carroll- 1910 votes, Eleanor Bradshaw-1787 votes, Glenn Faison- 1242 votes. Following up the winners were two other candidates that were on the 2020 ballot: Nathan Chabot- 499 votes and Shannon Naylor-1132 votes. Another candidate running for the seat was Raymond Hedrick Hayes Jr- who did not appear on the ballot. There were 446 write-ins.

Not seeking re-election to the Sampson County School Board this year was Tim Register, Tracy Dunn and Patrick Usher.

Dr. Linda Brunson (who is currently board chair) garnered the most votes for Clinton City School Board with 1341 votes. The other two seats went to Jeremy Edgerton- 489 votes and Oscar Rodriguez- 488 votes. Jason Walters with 460 votes and 21 write-ins. Current board member Mike Lanier did not seek re-election this year.

A new face will be sitting on the Sampson County Board of Commissioners, Mrs. Lethia Lee who received 957 votes to sitting board member Harry Parker with 551 votes. Both Lee and Parker ran as Democrats on the Primary Ballot.

Goldsboro resident Raymond Smith beat out Sampson County candidate Eugene Pearsall to take the Democrat Primary for District 21 NC House. Raymond Smith- 4559 votes (55.20%) and Eugene Pearsall- 3700 votes (44.80%). Among Sampson County voters however, Pearsall beat Smith 664 to 493.

Legislative Recap

This week, we will discuss the upcoming Short Session and how bills will progress through the process in 2020. There are a number of agenda items remaining from 2019 and it is likely that we will see them again. The Farm Act of 2019 was not passed by the House, but the key pieces of legislative action in the bill can be brought forward into 2020 with some updates to the technical details. The State Budget also falls into this category and contains important initiatives like teacher pay raises and project funding at the local and county levels.

Because the Short Session is shorter, we will likely see a lot of rapid movement in Raleigh come April. It is imperative for members to get their agenda items filed and passed quickly before the session ends and we return to the interim. Members will also be campaigning later in the year, so the policy aspect of the job must be prioritized and really focused on while everyone is together. In any case, it is sure to be an exciting session.

was first identified during an investigation into an outbreak in Wuhan, China. During the week of February 23, the CDC reported community spread of the virus that causes COVID-19 in California (in 2 places), Oregon and Washington. Community spread in Washington resulted in the first death in the United States from COVID-19, as well as the first reported case of COVID-19 in a health care worker, and the first potential outbreak in a long-term facility."

Sampson County health officials explained how the virus is spread:

"The virus is thought to spread mainly from person-to-person. Either between people who are in close contact with one another (within about 6 feet) or through respiratory droplets produces when an infected person coughs or sneezes. These droplets can land in the mouths or noses of people who are nearby or possibly be inhaled into the lungs. It may be possible that a person can get COVID-19 by toughing a surface or object that has the virus on it and then touching their own mouth, nose or possibly their eyes, but this is not though to be the main way the virus spreads."

What are the symptoms?

Patients with COVID-19 have had mild to severe respiratory illness with symptoms of fever, cough, and shortness of breath. Sever complications from this virus have been reports of pneumonia in both lungs.

How can we prevent the spread of the virus?

Avoid close contact with people who are sick. Avoid touching your eyes, nose and mouth with unwashed hands. Wash your hands with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. Use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol if soap and water are not available.

If you are sick, stay home. Cover your cough or sneeze with a tissue, then throw the tissue in the trash. Clean and disinfect frequently touched objects and surfaces.

Is there a vaccine or treatment?

Currently, there is no vaccine against COVID-19. There is no specific antiviral treatment for COVID-19. People with COVID-19 can seek medical care to help relieve symptoms. Kelly Parrish and Wanda Robinson explained to the board the Sampson County Health .

Department's objectives and response plan:

- -Protect the public's health by identifying people meeting the case definition for Person Under Investigation, focusing on surveillance, management of persons under investigation, triage, movement, tracking, and laboratory testing.

 -Monitoring the public's concern by managing information and providing timely messaging to
- the public and media.
 -Understand and disseminate guidance specific to the COVIS-19 event relevant to providers
- and public facilities.
- -Planning for the next phase of the response to include widespread mitigation strategies as well as our own contingency plans.

Sampson County Board Chairman Clark Wooten expressed concern over the large amount of migrant farm labor that would be entering the state and county over the next month for agriculture needs. He asked health officials what would the plan be to prevent the spread of the illness in communal living situations. He also asked Robinson and Parrish to make sure that all farmers that fall in this category of housing large number of farm workers to be made aware of the symptoms and the precautionary measures of what they should do if they think one of their workers may have the virus.

First Case of COVID-19 in North Carolina

On Tuesday, A North Carolina person tested positive for novel coronavirus (COVID-19). The test, conducted by North Carolina State Laboratory of Public Health, is presumptively positive and will be confirmed by the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) lab. The person is doing well and is in isolation at home.

"I know that people are worried about this virus, and I want to assure North Carolinians our state is prepared," said Governor Roy Cooper. "Our task force and state agencies are working closely with local health departments, health care providers and others to quickly identify and respond to cases that might occur."

The North Carolina person from Wake County traveled to the State of Washington and was exposed at a long-term care facility where there is currently a COVID-19 outbreak. Local health department officials are identifying close contacts to monitor symptoms and contain spread. To protect individual privacy, no further information will be released.

While awaiting confirmation of results from the CDC, the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) will treat presumptive cases as positive and follow CDC guidelines to protect public health and limit the spread of infection.

Tuesday's announcement represents an isolated case, and COVID-19 is currently not wide-spread in North Carolina. Because COVID-19 is most commonly spread through respiratory droplets, North Carolinians should take the same measures that healthcare providers recommend annually to prevent the spread of the flu and other viruses, including washing your hands, avoiding touching your face, and covering coughs and sneezes.

Last month, Governor Cooper established the Novel Coronavirus (COVID-19) Task Force to support the state's ongoing effort to monitor, prepare for and respond to COVID-19.

State actions include:

-Aggressively pursuing containment strategy of rapid identification, testing and contact trac-

ing

- -Engaging in daily collaboration with federal, state and local partners to ensure rapid response
- -Mobilizing resources for our providers, local public health system, local emergency management, and other.
- -Developing detailed response plans for multiple sectors for a range of scenarios.
- -Developing guidance for planning for multiple sectors for a range of scenarios.
- -Preparing healthcare providers and facilities to streamline and standardize response activities.
- -Activating a Joint Information Center to provide timely information.
- -Testing patients in the NC State Laboratory of Public Health.
- -Leading regular calls with local health departments, hospitals and local emergency management.

Providing guidelines for health care providers, childcare, employers, schools, colleges and universities, and others.

- -Monitoring residents who have returned from China through local health departments.
- -Staffing a COVID-19 phone line to answer urgent questions from the public.
- -Maintaining an up-to-date website with information about COVID-19 disease, risk and guidance.

It is important to make sure the information you are getting about COVID-19 is coming directly from reliable sources like the CDC and NCDHHS.

Sampson Regional Medical Center

Sampson Regional Medical Center is also monitoring the risks. Amber Cava, MBA, VP of Strategy & Business Development with SRMC stated, "Sampson Regional Medical Center is closely monitoring risks for Coronavirus with guidance from the CDC, the State Health Department, and Sampson County Health Department. The hospital has prepared before for highly contagious infections, such as H1N1 and Ebola, and it is preparing for appropriate response to the Coronavirus, should it pose a greater threat to Sampson County. While the CDC is not currently recommending that we screen the general patient population, we do have the ability to screen patients. In the event of an epidemic, this would happen at the time patients present for services. The hospital will also be prepared to activate its procedures for isolation and determine a treatment plan for individuals who have been exposed to the Coronavirus (COVID-19). For suspected cases, the hospital coordinates testing through the State's health lab."

House Approves \$8.3 Billion Emergency Spending Package in Response to COVID-19 Coronavirus-Trump Admin. announces sweeping new guidelines for nursing homes.

The House of Representatives on Thursday approved an \$8.3 billion emergency funding package to combat the COVID-19 coronavirus and the Trump Administration announced new steps to protect seniors in nursing homes from the virus.

"This funding package will help ensure that our health care providers and public health professionals have the tools and resources they need to continue to address the outbreak," said Congressman David Rouzer (NC-07).

In addition, the sweeping new standards for nursing homes and long-term care facilities will help prevent the spread of COVID-19. Specifically, the Administration is implementing new guidelines for officials to follow when surveying facilities with confirmed or presumptive cases of coronavirus. All inspection efforts will focus on ensuring nursing homes in North Carolina and across the nation are complying with infectious disease protocols that have been put into place by the federal government.

"Based on data obtained to date, we know that seniors – particularly those with underlying health conditions – are particularly at risk," said Congressman Rouzer. "Properly implemented by long-term care facilities, these new standards will help decrease the exposure of seniors to this virus. I commend the Trump Administration for the many proactive measures taken to protect the American people."

Tuesday's action follows a series of other important steps the Administration has taken to aggressively respond to the coronavirus outbreak, including:

Making available test kits sufficient to test more than 1.5 million Americans for distribution across the country, including in North Carolina. Just yesterday, North Carolina announced that the State Laboratory of Public Health is now able perform testing for the virus, enabling the state to more quickly take steps to respond to a presumptive positive test result. Because of the greater availability of tests, the CDC has issued new guidance enabling any American to be tested if a doctor suspects the virus.

Restricted entry to the U.S. of any foreign nationals that have been to China or Iran recently. U.S. citizens and certain others who have returned from China are subject to screening, monitoring or possible quarantine for up to 14 days. Additional travel advisories have been issued for affected areas in Italy and South Korea, and airport screenings have been expanded to identify individuals showing symptoms of infection.

Declared COVID-19 a public health emergency and utilized reserve funds to support response

Mobilized multiple agencies, including the CDC, FEMA, HHS, HUD and others to assist state and local governments in dealing with the outbreak. The CDC is working hand-in-hand with the North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services. FEMA has readied more than 50 response teams available to deploy to states and territories that may need assistance.

Details of the emergency spending package approved by the House of Representatives

-More than \$4 billion to make diagnostic tests more broadly available, to support treatments to ease the symptoms of those infected, and to invest in vaccine development and distribution. -Nearly \$1 billion specifically for state and local response efforts – with half of the funds going

-\$300 million for the CDC's Infectious Diseases Rapid Response Reserve Fund to prevent, prepare for and responds to diseases.

The Senate is expected to pass the funding package this week and the President is expected to sign it into law.

Ray obtained a B.S. in Agricultural Education, magna cum laude, from NC State University. While at State, Ray also served as a National FFA Officer and was the student commencement speaker at his graduation. He has since been named a College of Agriculture and Life Sciences Outstanding Young Alumnus and more recently an Outstanding Alumnus (since he's apparently not so young anymore).

Ray received his J.D., with honors, from the University of North Carolina School of Law, where he served as the Chief Justice of the Holderness Moot Court Bench, graduated Order of Barristers, was the recipient of the James William Morrow, III Award, and was inducted into the prestigious James E. and Carolyn B. Davis Society. Ray is a member of the North Carolina

After law school, Ray clerked for a State Supreme Court Justice, practiced law at an international law firm, and became the General Counsel to the North Carolina Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services. He was also a Marshall Memorial Program Fellow and later served as the General Counsel and agriculture policy adviser to the NC Speaker of the House.

In 2015, Ray moved to Washington, D.C. to serve as the Chief Counsel and agricultural policy adviser to United States Senator Thom Tillis and eventually became the Senator's Chief of Staff. In 2017, Ray was tapped to staff the National Economic Council at the White House as the Special Assistant to the President for agricultural policy. In this role, he was the top agricultural adviser to the President at the White House. He left that post in mid-2018 to serve as Chief of Staff to United States Secretary of Agriculture Sonny Perdue, helping lead an agency with over 108,000 employees and a \$140 billion annual budget. While in D.C., Ray and his family were active members of HTC McLean.

Ray returned to North Carolina in the summer of 2019 to serve as General Counsel to the North Carolina Chamber of Commerce and as President of the NC Chamber Legal Institute. He also promotes Starling Farms sausage, made from pigs raised by his brother, Willi, on the family farm in Autryville. He and his wife, Dr. Tina Starling, have one daughter, and reside in Raleigh.

"The rally is an annual event designed to present items of interest regarding agriculture and its importance to Sampson and surrounding counties," says Friends of Agriculture Chairman, Ronnie Jackson. "The aim of the Friends of Agriculture is to inform our community and others about issues that are important regarding agriculture."

Jackson explains who the Friends of Ag are, "We are not a group of Farmers and farm related businesses, but rather a cross section of the county's population. We are continually trying to get more people in our community to be concerned and be more knowledgeable about agri-

"Agriculture is what we do in Sampson County," concluded Jackson, "and we do it rather well if you compare our county to other counties in NC and other states. The more that people know and understand about agriculture, the easier it is to make them understand when issues arise that affect agriculture in our county."

The Sampson County Friends of Agriculture Rally, featuring guest speaker Ray Starling, is scheduled for Tuesday, March 17th, 2020, at the Sampson County Agri-Exposition Center. A complimentary dinner will begin at 6:30 PM with speakers to follow.

SAMPSON COMMISSIONERS URGE ADOPTION OF FY 19-21 BIENNIUM BUDGET



At their regular meeting last evening, the Sampson County Board of Commissioners unanimously adopted a resolution encouraging legislators to act on the proposed budget to ensure much needed funding is directed to their community. As the resolution states, H966 Appropriations Act includes over \$26 million in critical funding for education, community safety and economic development initiatives for Sampson County organizations and municipalities, including \$11.9 million to Sampson County Schools for construction, repair and rehabilitation, \$4.3 million likewise to Clinton City Schools and \$5.2 million to Sampson Community College. The budget also contains critical funding for water infrastructure: \$1 million for Sampson County's water system and \$150,000 for the Town of Salemburg's water system improvements.

Commission Chairman Clark Wooten noted that the Sampson commissioners collectively understood the impact the budget's funds have on the quality of life for their citizens, stating, "We hope that all members of the General Assembly can come together in recognition of the impact this budget has on the state's citizens. As a rural county with limited resources, Sampson County is particularly dependent on state funds to give our youth the best possible education, to meet the health and human services needs in our communities, and to develop infrastructure that delivers potable water to more of our citizens and promotes the industrial growth that drives our economy."



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



high heat, combine water, lentils, onion, chili powder, garlic and salt. Bring to boil. Reduce heat. Cover and gently boil 12-15 minutes, or until lentils are just tender. Uncover and boil 5-15 minutes, or until most liquid evaporates.

Remove lentils from heat. Stir in 1 cup tomatoes and 3/4 cup cheese. Spoon into taco shells. Stand filled tacos in 13-by-9-by-2-inch baking dish. Sprinkle tacos with remaining tomatoes and cheese. Loosely cover dish with foil. Bake 3-5 minutes, or until cheese melts.

Stir guacamole. Serve with warm facos.

Labneh Spread

- 12 ounces whole milk Greek yogurt 1/8 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon fresh lemon juice tablespoons olive oil
- pinch sea salt, for garnish fresh herbs, for garnish

pita bread, grilled assorted seasonal vegetables

In bowl, mix Greek yogurt, salt and lemon juice. Transfer mixture to fine mesh strainer lined with cheesecloth.

Wrap mixture in cheesecloth and strain over bowl in refrigerator 24-48 hours. Strain longer to make thicker.

Once thickened as desired, remove from cheesecloth

and top spread with olive oil, sea salt and fresh herbs. Serve with grilled pita bread and assorted seasonal vegetables.

"I was told that I should run by a person in my church," Alston said. "Then my pastor said something about it, and I thought I would give it a try. It was fun and competitive."

Alston continues, "I just went out and ran. I was able to keep up with the top girls ... since then I have been continuing to improve. Coach Jeff Klaves put me in the 200M, the 300M and the 400M. After my freshman year, Coach Charles Robertson gave us certain workouts that helped me out a lot."

Born in Goldsboro, Alston moved to the Hobbton area when she was 5-years-old. "I've been going to the Hobbton District School system since then," she said. "I have loved it here."

Which is why she said leaving the only school district she has ever known when she graduates later this year will be difficult.

"I know I will be sad, but also happy for entering my next chapter," Alston said.

When asked what she will miss the most, Alston says, "I will miss the track team the most."

That "next chapter" will include college, a place where Alston hopes to run track. "My coach has been given letters from different schools, but I haven't decided yet," she said. "My dream school would be N.C. A&T University. I really like the track team and they have a great facility there."

Alston said that she wants to study business. "I want to start my own cosmetology business. It is something that I've always wanted to do."

A 'B' student, Alston said that her favorite subject is math. "It has always come easy to me," Alston said. "Plus, I have a great teacher (Mrs. Carol King) who makes it fun at the same time."

When asked what her secret to her success is, Alston quickly says the support that she has received from her family.

"That is so important to me," she said. "My family has supported me and pushed me to be better. When I went to a track meet in Virginia, they drove four hours to support me, that means everything to me."

She continues, "My mother and my sisters have supported me all through high school. At a certain point I didn't think I was getting faster, but my mother pushed me and carried me to the gym ... At times I broke down at track meets and they were there to lift me up. It means a lot."

After living in New York for some time, she soon made her way back to Sampson County, where she began a long career as a nursing instructor at SCC.

Brown comes from a family of educators, but she never saw that quality in herself. Upon reflection though, she believes her passion for education always lingered.

Brown stated, "You know how toddlers fight over things. Well, my mother said I always shared my toys."

Brown says teaching is sharing—sharing knowledge. Since she began working and teaching at Harlem Hospital in New York, Brown has been sharing her knowl-

edge of nursing.

When she returned to Sampson County, she spent a year at Mary Gran Nursing Home. A year later, when she drove into the parking lot of Sampson Community College for her job interview, Brown says she prayed she would stay for five years. She ended up dedicating over 30 years of her life to a career at SCC.

During her time, she reached hundreds of students. She would come to understand the importance of having excellent, supportive leaders for the college to advance and improve.

Brown remarked, "I think what has been so great with Sampson County is having someone with the ability to maintain an upward bound approach. Moving into the 21st century with everything."

And she set the same standard for herself. During Brown's time, students began clinical rotations at home health sites, health departments, mental health facilities, and other areas to expand their growth and development beyond the hospital. She wanted her students to be well-rounded nurses when they exited the program.

Dr. Veronica Stevens, a former student and current Division Chair of Health Programs, remembered Brown's devotion to student's learning.

Stevens stated, "Mrs. Brown was always intuitive about and responsive to the needs of the faculty, staff, and students. She gracefully offered encouragement, constructive criticism and positive feedback in a way that ensured growth."

In the time she spent in the nursing program at SCC, the program underwent a great deal of change. She saw the program shuffle from various locations around campus and around Clinton. She saw various leaders and students come and go. However, Brown and her former students and colleagues say a few things remained in the nursing program: support and love.

"We love each other. We first love Him, but we really love each other," Brown expressed emotionally.

Brown says that caring was the key to the rapport and connection that students and instructors felt while she was an instructor at SCC.

"We had time to care about family...We carried each other's burdens and each other's joys," she shared.

Wanda Capps, Vice President of Academic Affairs and Brown's former colleague, remembered the bonds that were created in the nursing program. Capps stated, "She was my mentor, friend, cheerleader and kept me in place when I needed it. She played a major role in not only my professional career but my personal life as well. One of the many shining pebbles in my path!"

Leaning on one another is how students found success in the nursing program at SCC when Brown served as an instructor and as the Director of the Nursing Program. Today, that's still the case.

Brown's former student and former colleague, Dr. Lisa Smith, now the Department Chair for the Associate Degree of Nursing, echoed these same ideals. The standards that Brown set over 40 years ago are still in place today.

"I had the distinct pleasure of beginning my nursing education under the leadership of Mrs. Mary Brown. I was even more honored to begin my role as nursing faculty under the same leadership. Mrs. Brown helped mold and shape me into the educational leader I am today. She facilitated a nurturing work environment while demanding excellence and professionalism, always showing care and compassion in her actions," Smith stated.

Brown's commitment to education was evident in her service to her community in other ways as well. From her involvement with the Sampson County Schools Board of Education, the Town of Garland, and with the SCC Foundation.

Lisa Turlington, Dean of Advancement and Executive Director of the Foundation says Brown's charm and devotion have been a bonus of her involvement with the Foundation. Turlington noted, "Mary Brown's heart and soul is dedicated to education, and she loves the students, staff, and faculty of Sampson Community College. We are lucky to have her as an advocate."

Brown's family even created an endowment with Sampson Community College for a scholarship. Further cementing her dedication to education. The Boykin Scholarship, established in 2009, is offered for students attending Sampson Community College.

A shining light of Mary Brown's career is her drive to enrich student learning. Dr. William Starling, President of Sampson Community College, says this is particularly evident in that way that many of Brown's former students remain at SCC as faculty members.

Starling remarked, "In so many ways, Mary has never left. Her gifts remain with us."


Brown's demand for excellence and her caring spirit set a precedent in the nursing program at SCC that lasts even until today—45 years later.


When it comes to caring for others, Brown said, "I just can't help myself."


Let's Draw a cute Cat!




Use ovals to make the paws.

THREE THINGS TO WATCH

1. Phoenix favorites

Unlike many NASCAR tracks, where an underdog can pull out a win here and there, Phoenix Raceway favors the driver elite. The most improbable victory was by Alan Kulwicki, who scored his first career Cup Series win there in 1988, the year Phoenix was added to the schedule. Since then the wins have gone to champions or near champions of NASCAR's marquee series.

2. Harvick's haven

There was a time not so long ago that you could almost count on Kevin Harvick winning at Phoenix. In one span, from 2012-16, he won six times over eight starts. He has nine career wins at the flat 1-mile oval. He needs a win to get his 2020 program on track. He's coming off a ninth-place finish at California. "I am just having a hard time getting the car to be balanced all the way through the corner," he said.

3. Performance test

For those keeping count, all three car manufacturers have scored a Cup Series win this season. Chevrolet has a big test at Phoenix, according to its latest winner, Alex Bowman. "At Phoenix I think we finished like 25th there in the fall last year," he said. "We were absolutely horrendous, so hopefully we can go there and run a ton better." It took Chevy 10 races to score its first win in 2019.
