Since my house is not very large, I suspended the twigs so my guests would see them, but the house would not look crowded. If you have small spaces, decorate above eye level. ornaments in apple green, silver and red for additional Christmas flavor. Breakage was zero! Talk about making an impression on my guests — their expressions said it all. No words had to be spoken. Adults became children,
