To * * do that, the Council must pass and implement meaningful limits on \star the Town's political activities, and make the Town's participation in * campaigns illegal. \star \star Obviously, there is not enough time to pass these needed reforms * prior to election day, but, in the interim, we call on the Town \star government to cease engaging in political activities on its website \star or anywhere else. We also ask voters to consider the wisdom of \star investing \$12.9 million dollars of your money in a bricksand-mortar library as we move into an increasingly digital world. * Our view is that borrowing this amount of money, for this purpose, \star would be unwise. \star That's why we are urging Scarborough voters to vote NO on the Library Expansion Bond.
