A few years ago, at the church picnic, Harry Hoagland stood up in the Laury Barn out at Kennekuk Park and read *The Declaration of Independence* to all who were gathered there. The whole thing.

I'm sure some people were frustrated with him for doing that. Granted, it does take a long time to read *The Declaration*—even longer than the Athanasian Creed! And, admittedly, it is hard to listen to someone reading for a long period of time.

So why did Harry do that? He did it because he knew how important those words are, not were, ARE. He knew that *The Declaration* was not only a necessary defense for the rebellion and revolution out of which our country was born, but also the necessary foundation upon which our country continues to stand.

Some of the most familiar and cherished words of *The Declaration* are these:

We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty, and the pursuit of Happiness. That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men...

These truths are "self-evident." That means that they are part of the natural knowledge that God has written into our hearts, knowledge that God has programmed into every human person He has created. They are truths that we just know.

It is "self-evident" THAT our Creator has given us, endowed us, with certain unalienable rights—rights that cannot be taken away from us, rights that cannot be given away by us. It

is "self-evident" THAT to secure these rights, governments are instituted by God.

You can imagine how disappointed I was then when I read these words in an article published in the April 2024 issue of *The Lutheran Witness* addressing questions of individual rights. The article states:

First, recognize the distinction between manmade rights as granted by the Constitution and between rights as given by the Word of God.

Apparently the truths penned in *The Declaration* are not self-evident to everyone. According to *The Declaration*, our rights, including those spelled out in the Bill of Rights, are not "man-made," they are given to us by God. In the Bill of Rights our basic individual rights were enumerated (numbered) by our founding Fathers, not created or established by them.

Furthermore, *The Declaration* states that governments are instituted, not to GIVE us rights, but to SECURE the rights that have been given to us by God. If the government gives us our rights then they are not unalienable but can be taken away from us by the same government that gave them to us.

As you celebrate the 4th of July, you celebrate more than a document declaring our independence from England. You celebrate more than a nation established to be a place where people can live freely. You celebrate a God, the Triune God, who has given us unalienable rights, rights that are rooted in and supported by His Word.

So, celebrate the 4th of July! Exercise your rights! Pray for our nation! And, if you have a second, read the Declaration of Independence, like Harry did.

The Rewards of Godliness

It's no secret that you can't bribe your way into heaven. No amount of good works will impress God enough to open heaven's door for their sake. "For the wages of sin is death" (Rom. 6:23) and the person who "keeps the whole law but fails in one point has become guilty of all of it" (James 2:10). Rather, salvation is "the free gift of God ... in Christ Jesus" (Rom. 6:23).

So, your good works won't earn you the reward of heaven. But does that mean that there are no rewards at all? Consider what the Small Catechism says in the "Close of the Commandments":

What does God say about all these commandments?

He says, "I, the LORD your God, am a jealous God, punishing the children for the sin of the fathers to the third and fourth generation of those who hate Me, but showing love to a thousand generations of those who love Me and keep My commandments." (Ex. 20:5–6)

What does this mean?

God threatens to punish all who break these commandments. Therefore, we should fear His wrath and not do anything against them. But He promises grace and every blessing to all who keep these commandments. Therefore, we should also love and trust in Him and gladly do what He commands. (SC II)

God promises to bless you in keeping His commandments. What might these blessings be? Well, consider what Paul says about keeping the Fourth Commandment: "Children, obey your parents in the Lord, for this is right. 'Honor your father and mother' (this is the first commandment with a promise), 'that it may go well with you and that you may live long in the land" (Eph. 6:1–3).

And think about what your life would be like if you went around stealing (breaking the Seventh Commandment), telling lies about people (breaking the Eighth Commandment), and generally being cruel to those around you (breaking all the commandments!). That is obviously not a blessed way to live. In fact, you'd be miserable living that way.

And Jesus says more about what is in store for those who make sacrifices for His sake: "Jesus said to them, 'Truly, I say to you, in the new world, when the Son of Man will sit on His glorious throne, you who have followed Me will also sit on twelve thrones, judging the twelve tribes of Israel. And everyone who has left houses or brothers or sisters or father or mother or children or lands, for My name's sake, will receive a hundredfold and will inherit eternal life" (Matt. 19:28–29).

So don't grow impatient in doing good. Follow the Lord who has freely given you everlasting life.
