THE TABERNACLE Pattern for Prayer

The Old Testament Tabernacle provided a way for Israel, through the priests, to approach and serve God. We are told that this was a shadow of the real, Heb. 8:5; 9:23, 24.

Now the shadow is gone, and the real has come. All believers are now priests, 1 Pet. 2:5,9; Rev. 1:6; 5:10. And we are to minister before the Lord for His pleasure and on behalf of mankind.


We are given an infallible picture of our daily relationship with God, resulting in our most important ministry, the ministry of prayer. That ministry, by faith, takes place in the very presence of God, Heb. 10:19-22.

Every day the priest would go from one station of the tabernacle to the other, finally arriving at the altar of incense. All this was in preparation to minister at the altar of incense which was a symbol of prayer, Ps. 141: 1-2.

Here is the ministry of the tabernacle, showing our daily lives:
