In 1941 a group of women met to organize a club of former **TWA Hostesses** who had been gathering occasionally to cele-



brate weddings and babies. At that time hostesses had to quit when they got married. A name was needed and suggestions were called for. **Leah French Conquest**, having lived on a farm in her early childhood, recalled seeing her father clip the wings of hens to stop them from flying off their nests of eggs. The members of the club had stopped flying too, so why not "**Clipped Wings**?" That became the official name of the club. The club became international with chapters all over the United States and Europe. The friendships created were long lasting, sharing those special stories of careers in the sky.

TWA Clipped Wings International Inc. became strong in their philanthropic efforts donating to numerous charitable groups and awarding college scholarships annually. As well, the local chapters supported their various charities.

Clipped Wings began acquiring TWA Hostess/Flight Attendant uniforms and then began offering a vintage uniform presentation to organizations across the country and in Europe, always promoting and supporting TWA. The largest presentation was for 10,000 people at the Long Beach, California Air Show. Our presentation was always so nostalgic and brought back many wonderful, fun memories for the audience especially when the models came out in the "Paper Costumes." They were worn on long flights to promote TWA's International destinations.

After nearly 80 memorable years, the time came to say good bye and in late 2021 **TWA Clipped Wings** was dissolved. Some of the local chapters decided to continue on. The decision was made to donate all the assets of the international 501c3 organization to the **TWA Museum**, another 501c3 organization. A number of local chapters donated their remaining monies to the museum as well. The museum and its devoted group of volunteers have done so much to preserve the memories and memorabilia for the future. Clipped Wings is pleased to donate our complete uniform collection, monies, and other memorabilia. We are honored to share the historic collection that we cherished for so many years.

Thank you to the **TWA Museum** for receiving our history and carrying on this precious legacy.

Transatlantic Triumphs: TWA Launched Connie Flights To Europe 76 Years Ago

The Lockheed Constellation performed its first transatlantic flight with TWA 76 years ago this past February! The Lockheed Constellation was met with fanfare when arriving in the capital of France. The aircraft and the airline would become synonymous with each other during the mid-20th century, achieving several ambitious feats.

<u>Howard Hughes</u>, a majority stake holder, put his faith in the Constellation to take TWA to greater heights. He wanted the specifics of the project to be a secret and requested that his airline would be the only transcontinental carrier to operate the aircraft until it had 35 units delivered.

Hughes had a meeting with Lockheed Corporation president Robert Gross, chief research engineer Kelly Johnson, and chief engineer Hall Hibbard. The four were keen to overhaul operations and launch a large aircraft that would fly passengers to longer distances at low prices. The aviator outlined his requests, and Lockheed came up with the finished design, including the state-of-the-art features of the time. Lockheed Martin states the following:

"The Constellation would offer the first hydraulically boosted power controls, aviation's equivalent of power steering. It would be faster than most World War II fighters at 350 mph. And, using award-winning technology pioneered by Lockheed a few years earlier, it would feature a pressurized cabin for 44 passengers that allowed the plane to fly faster and above 90 percent of weather disturbances, what Constellation regulars would come to call smooth sailing."

Following its first flight on January 9th, 1943, the Constellation was deployed during World War II and given the designation of C-69. During the conflict years, Hughes didn't stop experimenting with the aircraft. He broke the transcontinental speed record on a flight from Burbank to Washington DC in April 1944, averaging 331 mph (533 km/h) in six hours, 57 minutes, and 51 seconds. Hughes was such a fan of the Constellation that after the war ended, TWA reacquired all the C-69s it could from the military. They were then converted and entered civil operations as Constellations.

Thus, on February 5th, 1946, TWA conducted its first commercial transatlantic flight. The airline's "Star of Paris" L-049 departed New York's LaGuardia Airport at 14:21. Registration NC96511 stopped at Gander, Newfoundland, and Shannon on the way to France. It then landed at Orly Field at 15:57 on February 6th.

This "Connie" would go on to have an eventful life in the years to come. It was damaged after the failures of two engines after taking off from Los Angeles International on November 18th, 1950. Nonetheless, it was repaired and continued service until a crash near Hinsdale, Illinois, on September 1st, 1961. Sadly, all 78 people on board died.

All in all, the Connie could be seen all around the world after TWA's order was filled. Major carriers in the US and

across the continents deployed the type on long-haul missions. TWA made sure that it continued to optimize activity with the aircraft. For instance, in October 1957, one of its L-1649As stayed in the air for 23 hours and 19 minutes on a transatlantic flight between London and San Francisco. This Connie boasts the record for the longest-duration, nonstop passenger flight on a piston aircraft.

In total, 856 units of the Lockheed Constellation were produced 1943 and 1958. There were numerous variants of the plane, spanning from the original L-049 to the <u>Super Connie</u> models. The aircraft has undoubtedly had <u>a lasting legacy in the aviation industry</u>.

Filet Tips Stroganoff

1 1/2 lb beef tenderloin cut into 3/4 inch cubes 1 tsp paprika

Salt and pepper to taste 1 cup fresh mushrooms, cleaned and sliced

1/4 cup butter 1 TBL lemon juice

2/3 cup chopped onions 1 c. sherry

Sprinkle meat with salt and pepper. Heat half of the butter in a large frying pan until foamy and sauté half of the meat cubes until well browned on all sides. Pan must not be overfilled. If necessary cook meat in 3 batches instead of 2 batches. As meat is cooked place on serving dish and set aside retaining the butter. Add onions and saute until light brown, turning the heat down to medium. Add paprika, blend and stir while cooking for minute or so. Add mushrooms and lemon juice and cook until mushrooms are tender and all moisture evaporated. Add sherry, bring to a boil and pour over meat cubes. (Meat should be medium)

Sauce

1/4 cup butter 1/2 tsp salt

1/4 cup flour 1/8 tsp pepper

1/2 cup stock or consommé 1/2 cup sour cream

1/2 cup half and half

Melt butter and blend in flour. Stir over low heat until mixture bubbles. Add stock, stir until smooth; bring to a boil. Add half and simmer for 5 minutes. Season with salt and pepper. Whip sour cream in a bowl until smooth then mix in 1 cup of the sauce. Just before serving combine sour cream sauce with the meat and mushrooms. Blend well and heat to a boil. Accompany with rice or noodles. Yields: 6 servings

National Volunteer Month

This past April was National Volunteer Month, which is dedicated each year to honoring all of the volunteers in our communities as well as encouraging volunteerism throughout the month. The National Volunteer Month is observed in many countries, however, the history of the event is unknown to most people. President George H.W. Bush launched the 1000 Points of Light campaign in 1991 and established April as National Volunteer Month. President Bush showed his support of American Volunteering in his 1991 State of the Union Address, commending "a volunteer's generous gesture", and calling it "an idea that is simply right."

NVM is an extension to an already-established holiday-week, National Volunteer Week, that was first held in 1943 in Canada. The week was dedicated as a way to celebrate the contribution made by women on the home front to their efforts to World War II. It was in the early 20th century that organized volunteering reached its peak. Numerous groups opened up to escalate humanitarian services, many of which are still active today, such as the Red Cross. National Volunteer Week in the United States was first established via Presidential Proclamation 4288, signed by Richard Nixon in 1974.

Once World War II ended, volunteer celebrations were limited but saw a resurgence in the early 1970s. National Volunteer Week debuted in 1974 in the United States and was widely-accepted by the general public. Since then, National Volunteer Week, which later went on to become National Volunteer Month, has been celebrated every April. It was made official worldwide in 1990.

The benefits of volunteering have been well documented:

- 1. Besides the benefits to society, scientific studies have shown that individuals who volunteer enjoy psychological and physical benefits, including increased satisfaction, improved sense of belonging, lower blood pressure, increased protection from Alzheimer's, and decreased mortality.
- 2. It is estimated that in Canada, 13 million people, or half the adult population, volunteer some of their time.
- 3. Volunteer work can also be used to leverage valuable experiences where work experience is lacking, or to build on an area of interest and expertise when writing a resume for work or applying to schools.
- 4. Benefits of volunteer work are enjoyed by the community affected, but also by the volunteers themselves, in knowing that they contributed to the betterment of society in some way.

Volunteers should never be taken for "granted," and their efforts should never go unnoticed. Organizations should also never assume that volunteers are substitutes for paid employees. Actually, these workers compliment an organization's current workforce and offer some added personal attention to customers, which they normally would not receive. Our Museum visitors are blessed to receive tours from actual former TWA employees, who share their stories and experiences each step of the way throughout our wonderful facility.

Being an "all volunteer organization" (like the TWA Museum) requires a great deal of commitment and hard work from a very special group of people. Visitors are simply amazed by what our organization has been able to accomplish, in such a short amount of time, with only volunteer help. We are truly blessed by the unparalleled commitment of our volunteers who have given countless hours for the betterment of our museum.




From the Archives. . . Volunteers Needed!
