From the Director, Pam Blaschum. . .

It's hard to believe that **March 2022** marks our 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary at 10 Richards Road. If you've not visited us previously, we are located in the art deco building that was TWA's first corporate headquarters and overhaul base. The building was completed in 1931.

The TWA Museum was officially established in 1986, however our roots go back further. Several years earlier, TWA employees at the Maintenance and Overhaul base in Kansas City had accumulated a collection of TWA memorabilia to display in a small space, in the lobby of the administration building. The collection, inspired by maintenance technician **Tom Perry**, continued to grow.

Former Flight Attendant Marie Trainer took care of the museum and all artifacts for 20 years and moved the entire collection four times from 1985-2009. The last destination was KCI Expo Center and that agreement expired in 2009.

It was then that I was asked to assume the directorship of the museum. I had such a passion for TWA's legacy and my desire to increase public awareness of the museum led me to pursue permanent housing at 10 Richards Road. After much preparation and hard work, the TWA Museum opened there in 2012,

A group of nine former flight attendants, Betsy Martin, Joy DeCoursey, Pam Dennis, Pat Brinkman, Karen Martin, Carol Emert, Zana Allen, Linda Maloney and myself met with Marie on a weekly basis learning about all the items that had been accumulated since the mid 80's when Tom Perry started his collection of artifacts.



In 2011 we acquired two rooms at 10 Richards Road. The nine of us renovated both rooms installing flooring, painting walls and ceilings, building display cases and opened for business in March 2012




Our Volunteers logged over **8415** volunteer hours in 2021. Thanks to all of our dedicated Volunteers. We could not do it without you.

ter, the annual free mammogram program at Samuel U. Rodgers, services at Cancer Action, and holds 200 free mammograms each year for women in underserved communities with Imaging for Women. Through the generosity of our donors, we have raised nearly \$3 million over the past 10 years and cared for more than 11,000 cancer patients. Their mission is to raise funds for the Greater Kansas City area to provide cancer care to uninsured/underinsured men and women cancer patients facing any cancer, and to focus on the cancer care disparity issues. John's knowledge will be missed by future museum visitors as well as his fellow volunteers who will miss his friendship.



## Did you know that TWA flew Cattle Charters?????

Yes! TWA flew a Cattle Charter operation in the early '70s, I worked as a cargo service supervisor at the TWA MCI air freight terminal. My manager, Frank Stephan, asked me to head up a new freighter operation moving cattle to Teran, Iran. Since I grew up on a dairy farm, he thought I would be a good candidate for this project. I worked with the TWA cargo department in New York and the TWA engineering department at MCI to come up with a loading ramp to offload the cattle safely from the truck into the cargo aircraft. The operation came together in late August 1977. We shipped 12 planeloads of 80 Holstein dairy cattle over a few months. The revenue was approximately \$1,000.00 per cow. We had no unhappy passengers. The 707 cargo aircraft was to layover in Philadelphia over the weekend, so we would not be taking a plane out of a revenue flight. It was cleaned and flown to London to pick up another revenue charter back to Philadelphia. The attached pictures show the process of getting the cattle across the ocean.



TWA's Cattle Drive in the Sky Takes KC Stockyards to the Shah of Iran 1977. Not for a harem but for the good of the country a charted jet cargoliner leaves Kansas City every Sunday with a load of 80 females for the Shah of Iran. In a modern-day replay of the cattle drives of the 1880's two-year-old first class heifers are driven by truck rather than trail drivers to Kansas City International Airport rather than the railheads of Sedalia, Abilene and Dodge City.




TWA 707 Jet Cargoliner being loaded with the two year old dairy heifers, each about six months with calf. The passage for these heifers was \$1,000.00 each. They weighed in at about 950 lbs each. Each load consisted of 80 heifers. This was the 12th shipment I supervised totaling 925 head. Gross weight of all the shipments at 887,381 pounds. Kansas City International Airport KCMO 1977.



Loading them pen by pen, the first pen to be loaded is in the front of the main cargo door. They will be first in, last off.

I guess they are first class!



These two year old first class dairy heifers are onboard the TWA 707 jet cargoliner. They will stop in New York, Shannon and Athens for fuel, no food service onboard. They will arrive in Tehran, Iran some 13 hours later. This cargo jet normally has a lay over in Philadelphia on the weekend. The aircraft charter is cleaned in Tehran and then flown to London for another charter back to the USA in time for the Monday evening flight

There is always a lot going behind the scenes at the museum. Joe B., Mark and John in the Library, Carol and Zana in Archives work ceaselessly to organize, catalog, and safely store TWA's history. Judy tiptoes through the uniform case to straighten and remove the silver serving pieces so that she, Marcia, and Belinda can clean and polish them at least once a year. Joe H. and other volunteers' dust and tidy other cases and our model airplanes. Larry C. keeps Miss Ellie (our Lockheed Electra) looking as beautiful as she did in her youth. Pam is always working in the back on many projects. Art and others are constantly working on the Connie simulator to keep it flying. Dennis C. keeps busy with repair projects as well as building items for our displays. All of this happens when we are not busy with visitors. The museum is so fortunate to have such a dedicated group of volunteers.

## **Archives Wish List!**

The museum collection has a shortage of the Royal Ambassador First Class white 22"x 18 ¾" linen meal service napkins and the 27 ½' x 23 ½" Royal Ambassador First Class linen tray tablecloths introduced in 1961 with the arrival of the jet age.

The napkin had a button hole in one corner to aid the gentlemen passengers in protecting their white dress shirts. In the center of the napkin was a circle of 4 embossed TWA twin globe logos on the linen fabric. The RA and crest was embossed in the center of the tray table-cloth.







# **Royal Ambassador Service**

#### **TWA Crab Imperial**



#### **Description:**

Wonderful Crab appetizer that we served coast to coast.

**Yields 14-3oz portions** 

2 lbs. 8oz lump crab meat

4 oz. butter

1 1/2 oz sauterne wine

1 1/2 pale dry sherry

1 oz cornstarch

Salt to taste

**Pinch MSG** 

Pinch rosemary

Pinch white pepper

Pinch mace

**Breadcrumbs** 

Dice crab into bite-sized pieces and saute in butter. Heat until crab meat is no longer opaque. Canned crab meat can be used as well. In this case heat just until warm.

Mix cornstarch with wines. Add to crab. Add seasonings. Heat for 3 minutes, stirring constantly.

Place 2-3 oz of the filling into a natural crab shell (or ramekin) Top with bread crumbs. Bake just until browned and set. Don't overbake. Garnish with parsley and lemon wedge. Can be made the day before and baked just before serving.

#### Otis Bryan Trans World Airlines

Chief Pilot, Vice President, a man of many talents. Otis transported VIP's during World War II (Roosevelt), helped setup Philippine Airlines, and later managed the Muehlebach Brewery.

This oral history recording, taken December 14-15, 1982, is courtesy of the Department of the Air Force, Air Force Historical Research Agency, Maxwell Air Force Base, Alabama. There are four parts to this oral history, each lasting about one hour in length. Includes: family background; early interest in aviation; appointment as a flying cadet in the Air Corps; work for Trans World Airlines; TWA government mail contract; flying mail airplanes; celestial navigation; establishing the Eagle Nest Flight Test Center to train Air Corps pilots; piloting flights taking Roosevelt to conferences at Casablanca, Cairo and Yalta; providing flight transportation for other prominent personalities such as Eisenhower, Marshall and President Inonu of Turkey; and his role as Executive Vice President of Philippine Airlines.
