Linda Jane Collyer was born in Brooklyn, NY to Samuel and Rebecca Nisenson. Her father was an artist and illustrator, and her mother was a schoolteacher. She attended public schools in Long Beach, NY, and graduated from Mount Holyoke college, majoring in French. She then received a Master of Arts in Teaching degree from The Johns Hopkins University.

However, during her internship she soon decided that teaching irregular French verbs to bored teenagers wasn't going to be a rewarding career for her. So she capitalized on her passion for puzzles, and applied for a position at the National Security Agency. She quickly discovered that her love of enigmas was a good fit for her at NSA. But when her husband, Stan, got a job in Texas in 1970, she abandoned that career and moved to Houston, and later San Antonio. There she gave birth to their son, Mike.

After receiving her CPA certification she became a tax accountant for a small Florida firm.
