Hello all,

You have another letter from me this month. If you want to read what Claudia has written, her sermon for Pentecost is in the service for Pentecost Sunday, 28th May that came out with the monthly! What makes a church? We know that the church is the community of worshippers, rather than the building, but is that all? Perhaps I could ask what makes a good church, but that brings its own issues.



Perhaps I can throw in a few thoughts.

At the top of the list must come the obvious. A (Christian) church is a community of people who believe in God, and that they are reconciled with God through the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Of course, if we are reaching out to new people there may be some joining our community who are learning but have not yet accepted Jesus Christ.

What else? I think there should be a place or places for learning, and opportunities to question and discuss in good faith and with tolerance and empathy. I know at least 4 different interpretations of Jesus' death (Rev. David Hinson prepared a series for the Local Preachers.) Different people have different understandings. Consider the different responses to that verse in "In Christ alone".

What about places of mission and evangelism? Jesus told us to go into all the world. I think a church should facilitate that in a variety of ways as well as push us a bit to do it.

How about worship, a word which is used to mean different things by different people? Should we all look for the same thing or should we expect differences? If the latter, how do we create unity in diversity? Is it a matter of what we like, or is there an element of what we need? How do we cope when what I need and what you need seem to clash?

Then there is care, both for each other in the church and for those on the fringes or even outside the church. Are we structured to care? Better, are we inspired to care? It seems to me that a group of people who don't, at least care for each other can hardly be regarded as a community. That, by the way, is what lies behind "Creating Safer Spaces" and the work of safeguarding.

You may notice that these broadly follow the headings that Methodism is currently using. Do you agree with them? What would you change? What could be done better, to be a better church and community.

A church is not a building, not even a group who meet in a building. How are we doing?

ing a lovely group of 6 year olds joining after New Year. Currently the club children are mainly at the lower end of the age group. Crafternoon Tea has



were you, I wouldn't start from here" - but unless we do we have lost people before we even begin.

So we may want to review how we are going to undertake mission and where we are going with it.

Prayer

Lord God, send your Holy Spirit to us to empower and encourage us to go out. Help us to learn to bring you to others. Show us where to start and teach us what to say.

REFLECTION

The Acts of the Apostles, Chapter 2, Verses 1 to 8 inclusive. When the day of Pentecost came, they were all together in one place. Suddenly a sound like the blowing of a violent wind came from heaven and filled the whole house where they were sitting. They saw what seemed to be tongues of fire that separated and came to rest on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other tongues as the spirit enabled them.

Now there were staying in Jerusalem God-fearing Jews from every nation under heaven. When they heard this sound, a crowd came together in bewilderment, because each one heard them speaking in his own language. Utterly amazed, they asked, "Are not all these men who were speaking Galileans? Then how is it that each of us hears them in his own native language?"

The familiar story of the day of Pentecost is the start of the disciples' evangelism after Jesus' ascension. There are several points that come from it. For a start, the disciples had been told to wait until the Holy Spirit came. Until then they were to do nothing. We too can do nothing without empowerment; we need the Holy Spirit to be effective. The Holy Spirit gave the disciples courage and strength to take risks. We are often unwilling to do the same.

Then it must be remembered that the disciples went out. They went to where people were. We can find ways to bring people into our building, but we really need to think how we will meet them where they are. And the disciples were not at this time trying to create a church. They were trying to tell the people something they needed to know. There is a danger that we think of everything in terms of building our numbers when we should be thinking about meeting people's needs.

Next, consider that the disciples were speaking in the languages of their listeners. In a country where most people think they speak the same language, it is amazing how many variations there are. Often we are not speaking the language of our listeners, but are speaking our own church language. The crowd in Jerusalem were amazed by the disciples speaking their languages. Sometimes people are amazed by us, but for the opposite reason!

The story continues with Peter reminding his listeners what the prophet Joel had said. They would all have been aware of this. Peter, therefore, started where the people were. It can be difficult for us to do that. We may feel that they are so far from us that getting to where they are is too difficult—"If I
